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MR. & MRS. PETRULIS TO APPEAR IN CONCERT NEXT THURSDAY

Mr. and Mrs. Stanley D. Petrulis will appear in concert Friday (Jan. 14) at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium. The program is complimentary to the public.

Petrulis will play the bassoon and Mrs. Petrulis will join her husband on the cello.

A graduate of the Eastman School of Music, Petrulis has a master of music degree from Catholic University of American, Washington D. C. and has done advance study at Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, Indiana University and State University of Iowa.

He has been a bassoon student of Leonard Sharrow, Sol Schoenbach and Vincent Pezzi.

Petrulis has appeared as soloist with the Baltimore Symphony, Philadelphia United States Air Force, Northern Illinois University, Eastman-Rochester, American University orchestras as well as the PLU orchestra.

Mrs. Petrulis, a graduate of Lawrence (Wis.) College, has a master of music degree from the Eastman School of Music and has done advance study at the Music Academy of the West, Santa Barbara, Calif, and Indiana University.

Her concert work includes solo, ensemble and orchestral appearances in Wisconsin, Maryland, Washington, Oregon and California.

Mrs. Petrulis will open their program with Bach's "Sonate #2 for Piano and Cello" followed by W. C. Debussy's "Sonato for Cello." Miss Kathryn Seulean will accompany Mrs. Petrulis.

"Sonatne for Bassoon and Piano" by Robert Schollum and "Pre'lude de Concert" by Gabriel Pierne' will be performed by Petrulis with Calvin Knapp furnishing the accompaniment.

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PLU GETS \$550,000 GRANT FOR LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION

Good News!!

The library fund is \$550,000 richer today!

The state Higher Education Facilities Commission at its meeting in Seattle Thursday granted that half million dollar-plus sum to Pacific Lutheran University toward construction of the new library.

This cash, which the University will receive, is an outright grant, not a loan.

Funds for this grant come from the federal government under the action of Congress known as the Federal Higher Education Facilities Act.

The funds are appropriated by Congress and are allocated to each state. The state commissions in turn act on applications from institutions of higher education.

Goodwin Chase of Tacoma, president of the National Bank of Washington, is chairman of the Washington state commission. Dr. Robert Mortvedt is a member of the commission.

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UNIVERSITY RECEIVES \$75,000 IN GIFTS FOR LIBRARY FUND

During the past few weeks, the University has received a total of \$75,000 in gifts from individuals and firms for the library fund.

These gifts are over and above annual year end gifts which the school receives from industry and others.

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PLU SWIMMERS OPEN FIRST SEASON
OF INTERCOLLEGIATE COMPETITION

PLU will launch its first intercollegiate swimming program Tuesday (Jan. 11) when the Klights entertain Lewis and Clark and the University of Puget Sound in a double dual meet in the new PLU swimming pool. The first event will begin at 3 p.m.

Coach Richard Alseth has named 11 swimmers, most of them competing for the first time in intercollegiate competition, to the meet lineup.

Only Glenn Graham, a senior from Walnut Creek, Calif., and Tom Fenn, a junior from Alameda, Calif., have previous intercollegiate experience. Graham, who will captain the PLU team, represented PLU in last year's Evergreen Conference meet.

Fenn, is a transfer from Merritt Junior College where he competed in swimming in the Golden Gate Conference.

Graham will enter the 100 and 200-yard freestyle events and the medley relay while Fenn will compete in the 200-yard freestyle and backstroke contests and the freestyle relay.

Other entries include: Pat Alderin, 200-yard butterfly and freestyle relay; John Bustad, 200-yard butterfly, 50-yard freestyle, medley relay; Bill Cronrath, diving; Paul Diehl, 200-yard butterfly and individual medley; Karl Frandsen, 200-yard backstroke, freestyle relay; Larry Lundquist, diving; Wally Nagel, 200-yard backstroke and individual medley, medley relay; Rich Owings, 100-yard freestyle and freestyle relay; and Dave Ward, 50-yard and 500-yard freestyle and freestyle relay.

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TETLIE WRITES FROM TEXAS

Rev. Harold Tetlie, former instructor in business administration, is serving a parish in Alice, Texas. Excerpts from a letter to the alumni office follows:

"The years since 1959 have been so varied and full--because I have lived in several worlds and through several lifetimes--doctoral study at Cornell University; a year at home in Montana; entry into Luther Theological Seminary; and internship of teaching in New Guinea; and traveling in Mexico three months this past summer to improve my language and culture for the big adventure. Yes, I am now writing from my first parish, as Pastor Harold Tetlie, serving the people of Mexican background in southern Texas, 45 miles west of Corpus Christi and 115 miles north of Renosa, Mexico. I was ordained into the ministry at Big Timber October 10 in a beautiful and moving ceremony.

"I have fallen in love with my work. Yet it is the hardest work I have ever attempted. I am actually doing all the jobs I have done before, only now I'm doing them all at once. My congregation is so small that I'm actually assistant pastor for the large Lutheran congregation here in Alice, Emanuel Lutheran; they called me to minister to this younger church. We are poor and struggling, but we are just like the rest of you. I keep telling my Mexican friends that they are so much like my people up north. This helps us to feel like we are one family.

"We are experimenting in ways which would be startling to many of you. Our whole emphasis centers in preaching the good news that Jesus Christ has saved each of us from our badness and that he wants each of us to accept him in an active way. But important in the message is that this salvation is now, today--not tomorrow (manana). I speak Spanish when I need to, but almost all my members have no great difficulty in understanding English. Some of the adults don't read at all, and the children don't read Spanish, so they want English services. Concerning the language problem, I'm grateful for both the public schools and for television."
