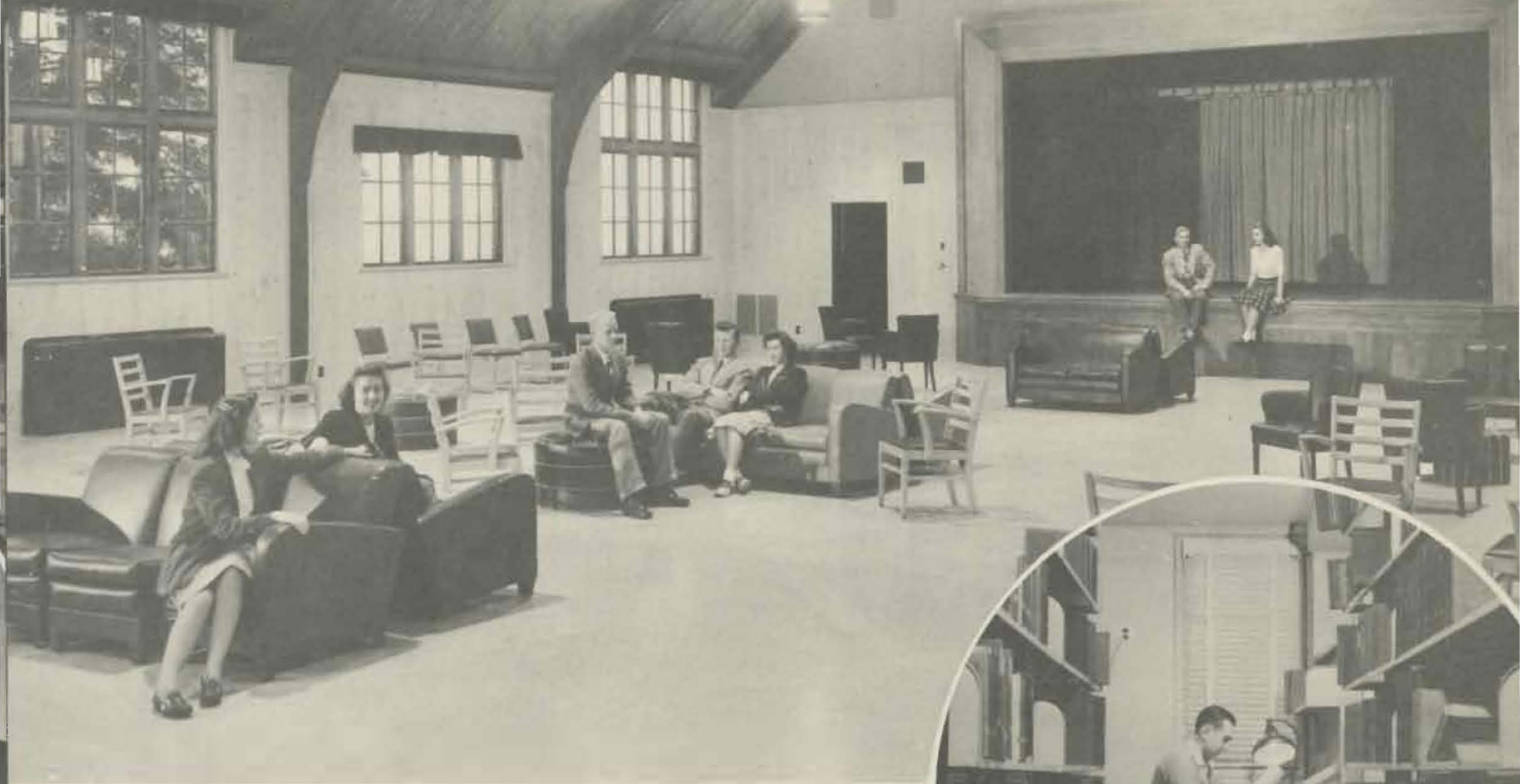

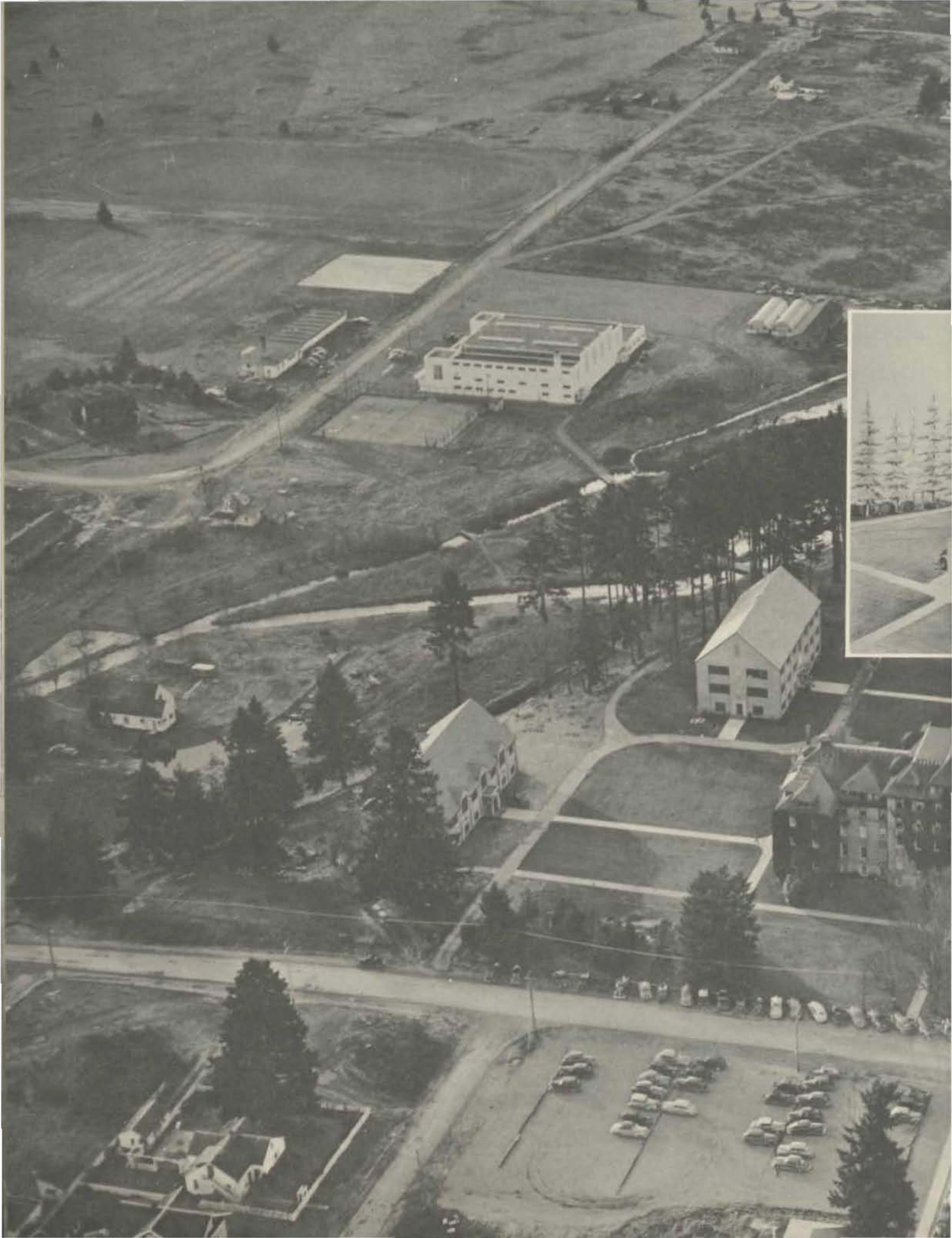

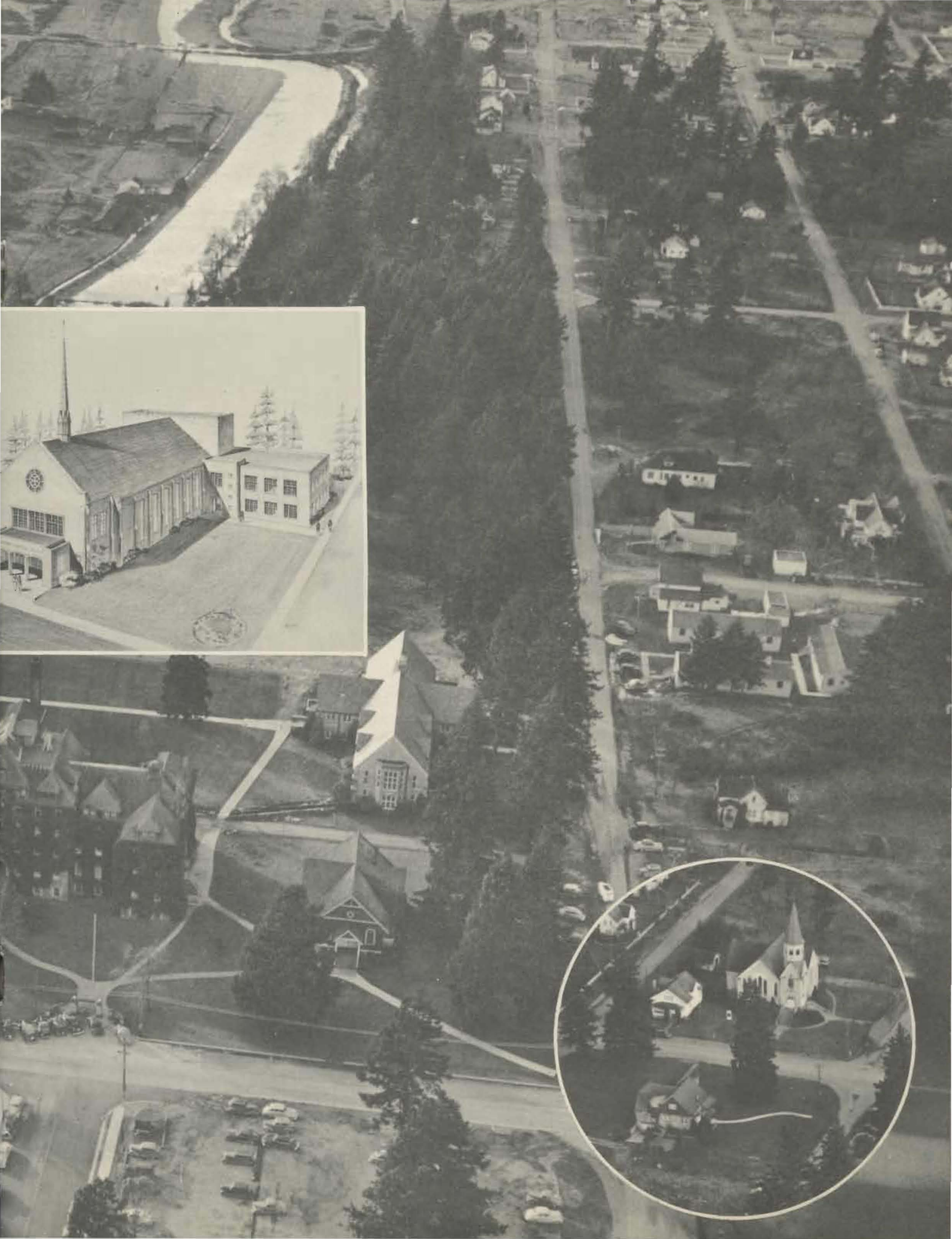

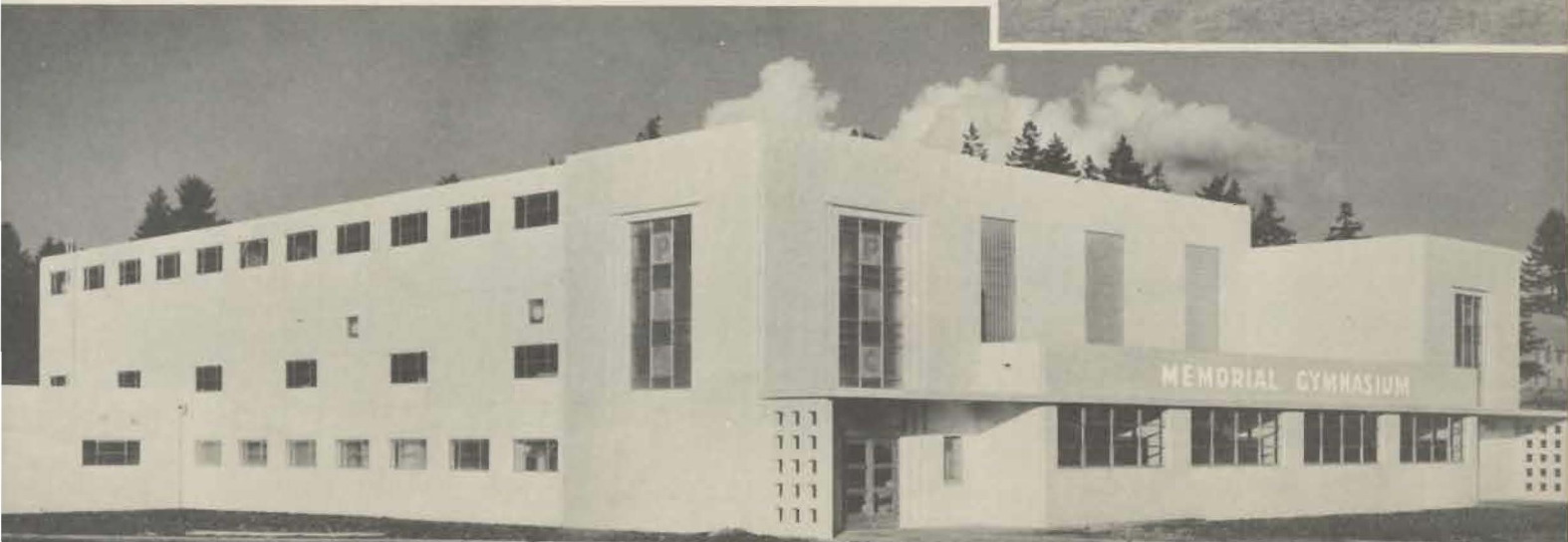

PACIFIC LUTHERAN COLLEGE TO HAVE NEW CHAPEL-SPEECH-MUSIC BUILDING

The American Lutheran Church at its 1944 Convention adopted a program of Christian higher education to meet the needs of our growing Church and authorized an educational appeal for its institutions of learning in 1950.

The Development Associations of the various institutions of learning, either owned or subsidized by the American Lutheran Church, are directed to conduct the financial ingatherings in the various areas as a thank offering for the blessings that have come to the Church through Christian higher education. The plan is simply to contact every member of every congregation for a generous gift for the school in the given area. This solicitation shall take place throughout the year, with special emphasis on Sunday, June 11, 1950, or some other later date selected by the congregation.

The Northwestern District of the American Lutheran Church has voted a minimum goal of \$100,000 for Pacific Lutheran College during this 1950 appeal. This amount of money will be added to that raised by the Evangelical Lutheran Church, and to other gifts and grants that have come to Pacific Lutheran College for

this purpose. The total goal from all sources is \$500,000, which is the estimated amount needed to set up the new building pictured herewith.

The new building will occupy the center of the campus. It will be 212 feet long and 143 feet across the section where the classrooms will be located. The auditorium will hold 1200 people. The little chapel on the third floor, under the rose window in the front, will hold 75 people. The stage platform will be used for many purposes such as graduation exercises, music festivals, dramatics, speech, concerts and other activities. The daily Chapel exercises will be held in the auditorium. Sound proof rooms will be provided for band, orchestra, choir, broadcasting, offices for the Chaplain, studios for music teachers, with 18 sound proof piano practice rooms and 2 organ rooms. Space has been provided for a big organ which will cost approximately \$30,000.

With an average of about 1,000 students at the College every school year, the building will be of great importance and of tremendous value in the whole process of Christian higher education.
