

# Dahle explains Mast editorial policy

Although the **Mooring Mast** tries to stay current, this is the **Mast's** 50th year and a bicentennial one as well. In honor of the occasion we are printing an old story; it dates back from the 1800s. The story was printed in the first **Harper's Weekly**; how long before that it was circulating, I have no idea.

An angry western reader sent a complaint to her paper's editor. "I don't want your paper any longer," she wrote. Equally concise, he shot back, "I like it the length it is and wouldn't make it longer even if you did."

Western towns in those days were not large enough for businesses to have enemies; the editor no doubt did more with the complaint. Still the comment typifies how some

people deal with complaints. They ignore them.

The **Mooring Mast** has two ways of dealing with criticism. Frankly, one is the way of the western editor. Sometimes we ignore it. The reason is that some people do not like the role of the press: to inform the people. Occasionally, a person does not want the public informed, and they ask that a story not be run. Nixon certainly would have suppressed all of Watergate if he had had the chance. Fortunately, in our society people have the right to know.

The **Mooring Mast** will exercise judgement in the stories it prints; we are not about to print stories normally found in **Midnight Secrets**. We will print stories the **NY**

**Times** might print. Criticism of this practice is rarely tolerated; our democracy is founded on the principle of the public's right to know the issues and then reach a well-reasoned decision. Thus when the **Mast** is asked to squelch a story, we usually ignore the request, as the western editor would have done so long ago.

Aside from comments of that type—made by people who do not want us to do our job—we are open to criticism, comments and suggestions. Runnoe Connally is our editor; he is open to format suggestions or comments on news stories. All the reporters are open to ideas for articles or news; call the **Mast** office to make sure we know of a story of interest. Your help in this way is greatly appreciated.

Finally, I am open both to your ideas for new editorials and your comments on ones already printed. I live in C-7 Hong; my extension is 1752.

All of us on the staff are looking forward to this year. We believe **PLU** offers an exciting atmosphere few schools can match. A large part of that atmosphere is the friendliness of the campus. Feel free to call the **Mast** and comment; most of the time we are as friendly as the rest of **PLU**. Above all, remember: we need feedback. If you like a syndicated column, let us know; we'll discontinue it if you do not. If you see a problem, call us. Your roommate can sympathize, but we can do something about it. The **Mast's** usually friendly extension is 436.

Activities marking the opening of a new academic year and the inauguration of your new President will culminate on Friday, September 12, with two events to which you are cordially invited. Specifically, it is the hope of Mrs. Rieke and myself that you will attend the Inauguration/Opening Convocation at 10:30 a.m. in Olson Auditorium and also the reception from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. that afternoon in the University Center. University offices will be closed during the Inauguration/Opening Convocation, and classes will be cancelled during third period so that the time from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. should be available for all to attend the morning ceremony. In the afternoon, classes and other activities will resume, but the nature of the reception is such that you will be welcome whenever you find a few convenient moments between 3 and 5 p.m. to stop by.

Because of the Inauguration/Opening Convocation, the first Chapel Exercise for academic 1975-76 will be held in Trinity Lutheran Church at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, September 15, rather than on Friday, September 12. As in past years, the closing of University offices and the interruption of routine activities will be encouraged from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays so that the time may be used by everyone for attending Chapel. Although attendance is neither "required" at Chapel nor at regular classes, an essential part of the total experience which this University provides will be denied those who consistently miss either. I urge all to join me in planning for Chapel attendance just as we plan for other activities. I hope that faculty, staff, and administrators will be particularly cognizant of this thrice-weekly opportunity to join with students in order to gather a united **PLU** community devoted to worship, study, and Christian celebration.

## ASPLU President reports

The ASPLU President is the primary representative of PLU students. He serves as official spokesman for the actions of Student Senate to the University administration, faculty, and other groups on and off campus.

Representation is one of the most important functions of a student leader. At PLU, the student body president is included at Board of Regents meetings, administrative staff meetings, and faculty meetings. He may also be invited to attend Provost's Council, which consists of the Provost, deans, directors and divisional heads of the schools and divisions within the University.

Serving on Student Senate allows the President to interact with fellow representatives. Suggestions to and from the constituency, all PLU students, are discussed. It is up to the ASPLU President to provide guidance and a list of priorities as new ideas and special projects are brought before Senate. He must be alert to the feelings and needs of the student he serves in order to best coordinate the year's activities.

This year I am most concerned with academia and what happens after a student leaves PLU. I've left extracurricular activities for the most part up to Jim Clymer, Activities Vice President. While I desire to make each student's experience at PLU great this year, I think individuals must always be attuned to what's happening beyond the campus boundaries.

Through the efforts of Sue Hildebrand in Career Planning and Ron Coltom, Alumni Director, there will be notebooks available soon in the Career Planning and Placement office which describe the various occupations in which PLU alumni are now engaged. Students may look up alumni in their chosen major and see what kind of opportunities might be available after graduation. Many alumni will be available for interviews if a student is particularly in his experience after PLU.

The academic experience at PLU should be augmented through ASPLU's efforts this year. I hope to have students sit in on

departmental meetings associated with their major. These students, chosen by the department, would meet together with me regularly to discuss some of the common problems departments are facing relevant to students.

Because of many student applications, the School of Nursing has had to turn away PLU students who applied to enter their program. This alerted me to a need for providing information about alternatives to nursing within the University program as a whole. These informative sessions could eventually be expanded to include alternatives for students in other majors who cannot or do not wish to continue their present line of study.

There are many other ideas and activities which need student involvement to be successful. I invite every member of the PLU community to speak up (not all at once, though!!) when things aren't going the way they'd like, and to volunteer suggestions to make the student experience at PLU in 75-76 the best ever.

## ASPLU Exec. VP expounds

The job description reads:

Preside at all ASPLU assemblies in the absence of the President.

In case of vacancy in the presidency, assume office and serve with power for the remainder of the unexpired term

Preside over the student senate

Coordinate all student-faculty committees

Serve as the President's alternate to the Board of Regents

Last but not least—Serve as the President's alternate to the Board of Regents. Well, as it is, I'm an active member. Whether Martha is there or not, I attend. I also serve on Academic Affairs sub-committee, which is basically an extension of Educational Policy Board, and some more.

Now for the "but not least" category—I work on the Day Care Center Board. I'm a representative to faculty meetings. This summer I worked with Dr. Huber promotion NEH classes. The list goes on.

For the 75-76 year some things I'd like to accomplish or see attempted: a minor's program reestablished, students getting to vote on faculty-student committees, Washington Association of Independent School Governments started again and seeing some of Senate's goals achieved. # Activities VP defines post

The ASPLU Vice President is responsible for coordination all campus student activities. This job includes organizing the different committees involved in Freshman Orientation, Entertainment Series, Homecoming, Movies, the Artist Series, Lecture Series, Outdoor Recreation and working with the RHC Activities Chairman to provide worthwhile entertainment for the campus.

This year some new things are being tried. A Student Activities Board (SAB) is being formed, consisting of all of the activities

committee chairmen, the Activities Vice President, RHC Volunteer Chairman, Dr. Philip Beal (VP and Dean for Student Life), and Marv Swenson (Director of UC). This board will be the main idea gathering body for campus activities. This body will also make decisions concerning activities where more than one committee is involved.

Dorms will also be more involved in campus-wide activities in an attempt to get more people involved in the fun of participating.

The Associated Student government at PLU attempts to serve the entire student body through a variety of activities and services. Its affairs include sponsoring campus events and promoting the academic welfare of students.

Committees perform specific tasks to make campus events run smoothly and to assure good attendance by PLU students. This requires continuous gathering of student opinion, i.e., activities committees must know what type of events students would like to attend. Special Events, Outdoor Recreation, College Bowl, Dad's Day, Parent's Weekend, Homecoming, Movies, Games, Entertainment, CAVE, Artist Series, and Lecture and Convocation fill up the academic year's calendar with activities for all students.

Service to the community as well as to PLU students is provided by three other committees. University Social Service Action (USSAC) and Charity Coordination use student volunteers for

tutoring, fund raising, sharing, and caring within the surrounding area near PLU. Legal Services retains a lawyer and employs student volunteers to advise fellow students on legal matters.

Students also serve on faculty and university committees. These positions are designed to involve students in university decision-making processes and provide student input where new ideas may be heard and acted upon. Educational Policies and Rank and Tenure are two of the most important committees on which ASPLU representatives serve. Academic Concerns engages students in a liaison role between faculty members and students with complaints. Its members also direct those in need of academic assistance to an appropriate faculty member or university office for advice.

In order to coordinate the ongoing pursuits of all sectors of student government, the ASPLU Senate meets regularly. It consists of eight senators,

four officers, a freshman representative, off-campus representative, Residence Hall Council representative, and BANTU representative. Two faculty members and two administrators serve in an advisory capacity.

Senate serves as a facilitating body for new ideas and special projects. Senate itself initiates a variety of programs throughout the year and is sensitive to the suggestions which arise from dorm meetings and informal student gatherings on and off campus.

With the help of Elections and Personnel Board, Senate governs the actions of committee members and others under its jurisdiction. 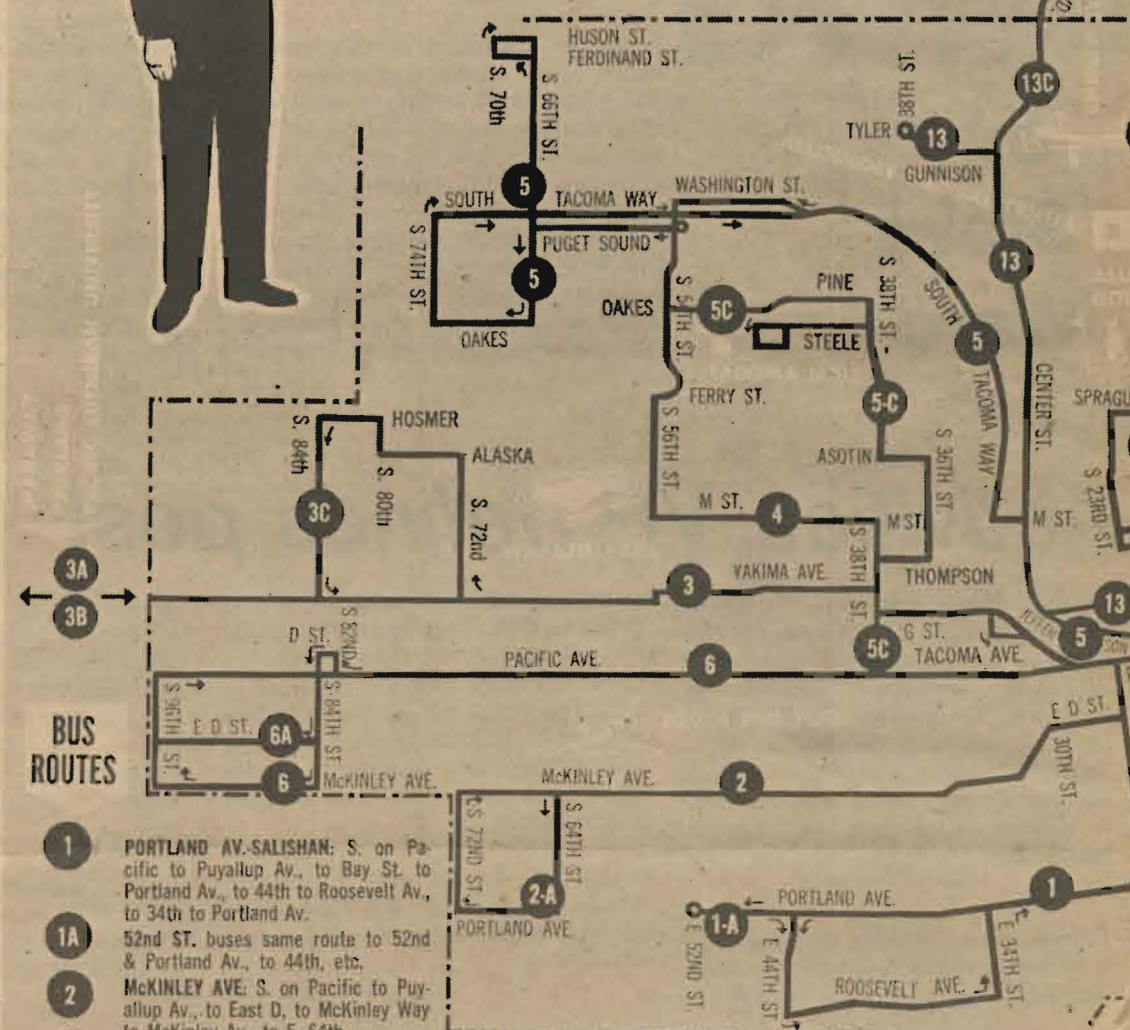

## Mini-courses begin Monday

Have you ever wondered—

As an experiment in education, PLU has received a grant from the National Endowment for the

Humanities to conduct a number of new projects in higher education. This fall series of mini-courses is part of the plan.

A series of nine mini-courses will be offered in the week beginning Sept. 15. Each will be team-taught by two professors who have recently constructed these courses as experiments in interdisciplinary education.

Students may register now for any one of the courses (one only, of course), for which there will be no tuition fee. They may be taken for a grade or pass/fail and one elective credit will be registered on your transcript if you participate. Each class will meet for about 12 class-room hours and should not interfere with a normal load of other work.

In addition to learning something in a new way, students will have the opportunity of helping the faculty evaluate this approach to education and in that way help shape the course of curricular development at PLU.
