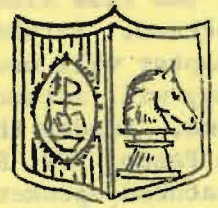

## PLU ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT HONORED FOR 32 YEARS SERVICE TO COMMUNITY

Pacific Lutheran University was presented with a plaque Saturday night for its contribution to the athletic program of Tacoma and Pierce County. The presentation was made by Russ Mead, long-time promotor of youth athletics, during the intermission of the PLU-UPS game. Athletic Director Mark Salzman accepted the plaque.

The inscription reads as follows: "1932-1964 To Pacific Lutheran University and Staff For Invaluable Assistance in the Athletic Program of Tacoma and Pierce County. Russ Meade and Kids."

Meade has been a backer of youth athletic programs for 32 years, sponsoring boys baseball and basketball teams. Almost anywhere you go, you can find an army of kids following him. Several of the boys that started out on his teams are now coaches in Tacoma area high schools.

Through the years PLU has provided assistance in coaching and managing these teams through interested students. The university also has cooperated in various other ways.

The presentation of the plaque was Meade's way of saying "thank you" for the assistance from PLU.
