CHOIR OF THE WEST SCHEDULES WORLD PREMIER TUESDAY

The PLU Choir of the West will present its annual home concert, featuring the world premier of Miklos Rozsa's "The Vanities of Life," Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

Written especially for Prof. Maurice
H. Skones and his 61-voice choir, the motet
is based on the first chapter of Ecclesiastes.
Rozsa, who will attend the performance,
wrote the work in Rome last summer while he
was on a guest conducting tour of European
symphonies.

A native of Hungary, Rozsa has won three Academy Awards for his film scores. He has written scores for "Quo Vadis," "El Cid," "Ben Hur," "The Thief of Bagdad," and "Spellbound."

In addition to the new composition, the choir will sing another Rozsa motet, "To Everything There Is a Season," which is based on the third chapter of Ecclesiastes.

Other work to be included in the program are "The Nicene Creed," Gretchaninoff; "Benedictus," Paladilhe; "Trumpets of Zion," Olaf Christiansen; "O Magnum Mysterium," Victoria; and "Misericordias Domini," Durante.

Another group includes "Salvation Is Created," Tschesnokoff; "The Christmas Symbol," "Hosanna," F. Melius Christiansen; "Jesus, Jesus, Rest Your Head," traditional carol; and "Willie Take Your Drum," Burgundian folk song.

Saturday's participants include West Valley, Laughbon, North Thurston, Evergreen, Mountlake Terrace and White Pass.

The public is invited to attend the Festival. There will be no admission charge.
