## GENERAL REGISTRATION DIRECTIONS

## PLEASE INDICATE THE SYSTEM CODE NUMBER FOR EACH COURSE REGISTRATION.

1. All students currently in school who plan to register for the following semester (summer excepted) should register by Advance Registration. Note: Interim and Spring registrations are combined and conducted simultaneously.
2. Full-time new and re-entry students may advance register if a clearance has been received from admissions. Part-time students are encouraged to advance register.

## 3. SELECTIVE SERVICE-ATTENTION ALL MALE STUDENTS

If you want your local draft board notified of your full-time enrollment ( $2 \frac{1}{2}$ courses) at P.L.U., it is your responsibili $y$ to complete a form in the Registrar's Office. This is normally done only once a year.

## 4. V.A. BENEFITS

If you expect to receive any type of veteran or war orphan benefits, you must file your certificate of eligibilty in the Registrar's Office. Forms and information concerning veteran benefits are available in the Registrar's Office. Make application when registering. A student must be registered for 3 courses to be eligible for full-time V.A. Benefits.
5. Obtain your registration materials at the Registrar's Office.
6. Ob ain an appointment with your adviser. DO THIS IMMEDIATELY.
7. Print with a BLACK LEAD PENCIL on your official program.
A. Fill in all personal information including your Social Security Number. If you do not have a Social Security Number, you must secure one prior to registering.
B. Indicate SYSTEM CODE NUMBER for each course registration.
C. Print an " $A$ " before audit courses, " $R$ " before repeat courses
D. Check to be certain that you have the pre-requisites, as indicated in the University Catalog, for each course you select.
E. LIST ALTERNATE COURSES which can be substituted if courses on your original schedule are closed. The listing of alternate courses may prevent a change of registration later.
F. Obtain the signature of your adviser if you are a full-time ( $2 \frac{1}{2}$ courses) student.

## ADVANCE REGISTRATION ONLY

A. Leave your registration materiats in the Registrar's Office.
B. Advance registration will be processed by class in the order they are received with seniors first, then juniors, sophomores, and freshmen. Every effort is made to comply with your requests. If a course is closed, an approved alternate will be substituted. Note: Seniors will receive priority in interim courses for the first week of registration only.
C. You will be mailed a statement of charges including the fee payment deadline, a copy of your scheduled classes, additional instructions, and cards.
D. Return your payment and the other information requested to the P.L.U. Business Office by the due date indicated.

## IN PERSON REGISTRATION

A. Obtain the necessary cards at the Registrar's Office.
B. Complete all cards. Obtain adviser's approval if full-time (see "F" above).
C. Report to the Registrar's Office to be scheduled.
D. As soon as you are scheduled and receive a copy of your program, report to the Business Office to pay your fees.

## INDEPENDENT STUDY REGISTRATION

A special independent study registration card must be submitted to the Registrar's Office with each independent study registration. These cards may be obtained at the Registrar's Office.

## PASS~FAIL OPTION for UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

A Pass--Fail Agreement form is available to all undergraduate students desiring a course on the pass-fail option. Secure the form from the Registrar's Office.

## CHANGE OF REGISTRATION, WITHDRAWALS

Any addition or withdrawal from a course must be made in the Registrar's Office. Changes in registration due to conflicts or errors in registration may be made without charge during the first week of the semester. To withdraw from a class and/or add a class, the following procedure is to be followed:

1. Obtain the change of registration form from the Registrar's Office.
2. Obtain the necessary signature and, if applicable, a withdrawal grade.
3. If after the first week, pay the $\$ 5.00$ change of registration fee at the Business Office.
4. Return the change of registration form to the Registrar.

The student is responsible for completing the above steps within one week after obtaining the change card.
Students withdrawing officially from a class after the fourth week of a semester will receive either a WP (withdrawal with passing). a WF (withdrawal with failure), or a WM (Medical Withdrawal). None of these grades will be used in calculating grade point average, but they will appear on the semester grade point report and be included in review of academic status. The grade of W will replace WP, WF, and WM on the transcript.

## STUDENT MOTOR VEHICLE REGULATIONS

## GENERAL INFORMATION:

Each student must complete a vehicle registration card, whether or not he is registering a vehicle.

The University suggests to all students that there is normally no requirement for on-campus students to maintain private vehicles while in attendance at Pacific Lutheran University. However, in case you are working or living off campus or if there is other special need for a vehicle, strict compliance with the following regulations will be enforced.

## REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES:

All students who bring cars or other motorized vehicles to the campus must register them with the Security Office. Any unregistered vehicle on campus property is subject to "tow away"; the tow away fee is payable by the owner of the vehicle.

## DECALS:

Pick up your decal at the Security Office. Temporary decals may be acguired in the Security Office for replacement vehicles, loaners, etc., without charge. During registration week there will be a period of grace so students will have proper time to register vehicles. This is done in order to save embarrassment or loss of revenue to the student.
