

Lutherans To Open Basketball Schedule With Centralia J. C.

Nilsen, Leask, Tommervik, Solie, Jensen to Start Home Game Dec. 18

Pacific Lutheran's hoop schedule will get under way with a bang December 18 when Coach Olson's casaba tossers tangle with Centralia J. C. in a scheduled conference game on the Parkland floor.

Augmented by the addition of two new members, Longview J. C. and St. Martins College, the Washington Junior College Conference now includes seven colleges and promises to be much stronger than in previous years. Coach Olson and his crew will be out to win the Conference championship for the third successive year and gain permanent possession of the trophy, donated by the Yakima Chamber of Commerce, which goes to the school which is first to win the title for three consecutive years. However, P. L. C.'s chances of repeating this year must remain a matter of conjecture, until after the Centralia game.

Coach Cliff Olson is driving his men hard in preparation for a long, difficult season. Faced with the necessity of developing a scoring punch, the Lutheran mentor has placed Leask and Solie at forward berths with Nilsen, lanky center, using much needed six feet four inches of height under the enemy basket to follow up shots. Tommervik will remain at his guard position to give the Lutherans four veterans in the starting lineup. Mary Jensen, smooth ball-handling freshman from Silverton, Oregon, has been holding down the other back-court slot, although he is getting plenty of competition from Stan Ford, a last year letterman.

Running on the second five Olson has Frye, at center, who is much improved in his general all-around floor play this year. Hal Votaw and Lloyd Thompson are stationed at forwards, while Simon Anderson and Ford round out the five.

Major Changes Listed In 1936 Hoop Rules

To aid P. L. C. hoop followers in keeping abreast of recent rule changes in basketball, the *Mooring Mast* is herein printing two major modifications in this year's rule book.

Quoting from the new Section 5 of Rule 13 we give the new rule on the putting the ball into play after a successful free throw. This rule is expected to add several minutes of actual playing time to the regulation game.

"If the free throw following a personal foul is successful, any opponent of the free thrower shall put the ball into play from any point out of bounds on the end of the court. If a multiple throw has been awarded, this applies only to the last free throw.

After the last free throw following a double foul, or following one or more technical fouls, the ball shall go to the center whether the last goal is made or missed."

The second major change is aimed to eliminate some of the fogginess caused by the "center block" where the center hands the ball to an incoming forward in the Free Throw Area and then blocks off opposition while the forward shoots.

Rule 14, Section 12—Penalties: "A player shall not remain in his free throw area, with or without the ball for more than three seconds while the ball is in play and in possession or control of his team."

Girls' Basketball Turnouts Announced For Next Week

According to Manager Edna Kelsey, the interclass basketball season for girls will not be opened until January. Turnouts are being held to line-up prospective players. Next Monday noon, the first year normal and liberal arts girls will meet for practice. Tuesday the second and third year normals will turn out, and on Wednesday high school and liberal arts girls are scheduled for practice.

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Lutheran Educators Study Christian School Curricula

About three hundred educators from a score of Lutheran colleges and seminaries were present at the Educational Conference held at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, November 29 and 30," states Dr. O. A. Tingelstad.

Representing Pacific Lutheran College were Prof. J. P. Pflueger, Christianity instructor, Rev. Alf. M. Kraebel, president of the Board of Trustees, President O. A. Tingelstad, and Prof. Paul R. Highb, science instructor on leave of absence.

The program dealt with general education on the basis of a printed report of the curriculum studies made by a representative group in the Lutheran seminar held at the University of Minnesota last summer. This study was under the auspices of the Commission of Higher Education of the American Lutheran Conference. Dr. J. C. K. Press, educational director of the Norwegian Lutheran Church of America, Dr. George Svardrup, president of Augsburg College and Seminar at Minneapolis, and Dr. O. H. Pannkoek, director of publicity and research of the commission outlined the program for this convention.

This conference undoubtedly made educational history. It proved the possibility of joint approach to fundamental problems of Lutheran Higher Education. The college presidents, in special meeting, voted to recommend the continuation of joint study, and to accept the invitation of Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois to hold a similar conference there a year hence," remarked Dr. Tingelstad.

The conference emphasized the inter-education of Christian higher education with the life of today and with Christ. The goal is the integrated personality in the individual person.
