Academics under the microscope: three forums focus on real changes in a PLU education

"To be prepared against surprise is to be trained. To be prepared for surprise is to be educated," wrote author James Carse. PLU has long discussed education of the whole person, and not just training a student in a highly specialized professional degree nor in a liberal arts degree that has no tie to service, leadership and care. In that vein, PLU's Long Range Planning Committee has developed two initiatives for PLU's academic program: a focus on active learning and on the integration of liberal and professional studies, particularly through strengthened and complementary minors and second majors. This discussion is presented in the draft document "**Building a More Distinguished and Distinctive Academic Program: An Addendum to PLU 2000,**" and will be the topic of three forums this week.
