SEWER BOND VOTE

SET FOR TUESDAY, JULY 27

The Pierce County Commissioners have authorized a July 27 election of a \$1.2 million bond issue for construction of the South Suburban Sewer District, originally the Pacific Lutheran University Sewer District, which was formed about two months ago.

If the issue passes at the polls, then the District will have the legal right to go ahead with plans for the expansion of the present district to include other areas of the community besides the PLU proper which the district now encompasses.

LARSGAARD NAMED UNIVERSITY CHAPLAIN

The Rev. John Larsgaard, who has been Student Congregation Pastor since January 1959, has been appointed as the chaplain of the University, according to an announcement by Dr. Robert Mortvedt.

Dr. Mortvedt stated that authorization to make such an appointment was given the president by the Board of Regents at its June meeting.

Berkeley, Calif. July 12-15.....GORDON GILBERTSON (Music) attended the String Workshop at the University of Washington, featuring the Suzuki method of teaching violin. This method is based upon the principle of learning a language; in that a child learns to talk by imitating those he hears. So the violin pupil learns to play by imitating his teacher, and, as with language, learns to read music only after he has gained considerable competence on the instrument. This was one of only four appearances of this internationally known teacher in the U.S. this summer. On Aug. 9 Gordon will attend a band music workshop at Birch Bay, north of Bellingham. This is sponsored by Johnson-West Music Co. of Seattle and by Western Washington State College. At the workshop band directors from throughout the Northwest and Canada join together to form a sight-reading band, directed by Lorris West. During the week-long session about 125 pieces of new music are played and evaluated, giving assistance to the planning of a bands program for the coming year.....HAROLD MACKEY (sociology) has passed the final hurdle toward his doctor's degree at Washington State University.....Welcome to JOHANNES C. Are you adequately insured? Due to direct jury awards or as a result of past awards, personal injury settlements are becoming larger. It would pay everyone who drives a vehicle or who has accumulated any assets to note with care the following information.

Awards of \$100,000 or more for the benefit of a single individual have been reported in 38 states. Of these 38 states, 11 have just recently joined the group. In the past 10 months over 200 judgements have been reported--all but 14 of them were in excess of \$100,000. The breakdown follows: 17 verdicts, \$500,00 and up; 39, \$300,000-\$500,000; 49, \$200,000-\$300,000; and 85, \$100,000-\$200,000.
