Regents Approve University Center

Construction of the new University Center building at PLU will be started in May, according to a schedule adopted by the board of regents at its Feb. 10, 11 meeting.

The project will be put out for bids on April 1 and the bids will be due April 24. It is expected that the contract will be awarded by May 15 and groundbreaking ceremonies will be held shortly thereafter. Completion of the structure is slated for August, 1970.

To be located on the west side of Park Avenue between 122nd and 123rd Sts., the two story frame, brick and concrete structure will have 85,800 square feet of floor space which will make it the largest building on campus.

RABBI TO DISCUSS THE JEW AND MODERN LITERATURE AT PLU

Rabbi Jacob Singer of the Congregation Temple De Hirsch in Seattle will speak at Pacific Lutheran University Thursday, Feb. 27, at 9:50 a.m. convocation.

The Rabbi, representing the Jewish Chautauqua Society, will discuss "The Jew in Modern Literature."

The Society is an organization which creates better understanding of Jews and Judaism through education.

The center will house the university's food service and dining areas, a bookstore, offices for student government and publications, a coffee house, multi-purpose rooms for various types of social activities and special interest rooms including bowling alleys, billiard and table tennis rooms, music listening areas and meeting rooms.

President Robert Mortvedt said that the center will be an essential unit in the growth of PLU and will enable the university to supplement its rigorous academic schedule with a planned program of social, recreational and cultural enrichment activities under professional direction. "Because our campus is 80 per cent residential," he continued, "it is vital that we provide an extensive program of co-curricular activities. The center will permit the fullest extension of this program and it will be the 'living room' of the campus."

According to A. Dean Buchanan, vice-president for business and finance, the center will be financed through a gift of approximately \$1 million from the LIFE campaign of the American Lutheran Church, a pledge of \$250,000 from the Associated Students of PLU, gifts from individuals and foundations, and loans from private sources in the area.

The gridgers led 19-12 at the end of the first quarter, their biggest lead of the game. The Brains grabbed their first lead at 24-23 and finished the first half ahead 31-29.

It stayed close through the third period with Tim Langevin hitting a bucket off a special scrimmage play to give the Brains a 43-42 third quarter edge.

With 2:19 left the score was 56-all but Gene Lundgaard, who paced himself the first three quarters, popped four of his six points as the Brains reeled off eight straight for the victory.

Knights Struggle For Break-Even Year

Rapidly approaching the twilight of the basketball season, Pacific Lutheran University's Knights find themselves still trying to reach the elusive .500 mark, a rather modest goal not in the least anticipated at the beginning of the season.

After a horrendous start during which the Lutes lost nine of their first 12 games, the squad rebounded for six straight victories to even the mark at 9-9. Whitman scored a 57-56 upset before the Lutes stopped Pacific to move even again at 10-10.

Then last Saturday, following five days of rest, the Knights suffered another one-point setback, this time at the hands of the Willamette Bearcats, 87-86.

Willamette repeatedly worked the ball inside to build a 53-37 halftime lead. PLU made up the difference with a 30-7 streak early in the second half, but the Bearcats finally put it away behind Dave Steen and Jon George.

The Lutes outshot and outrebounded their hosts by substantial margins, but the Bearcats made up the difference by dropping a better percentage of shots, both from the floor and the free throw line.

Doug Nixon had the "hot hand" for PLU, scoring 20 points, followed by Al Kollar with 17 and Leroy Sinnes with 16. Kollar pulled down a career high of 23 rebounds.

Nine different players have taken game scoring honors for the Lutes this season, with a 10th man making double figures and an 11th man hitting nine points. Coach Gene Lundgaard's problem has been foreseeing who will be hot when. "Hot hand" offensive leaders have included Kollar (6 times), Sinnes (5), Ake Palm (5), Nixon (2), Ralph Whitman (2), Bruce Reichert, Kevin Miller, John Rankin and John Krummel (one each).

A breakdown of men in double figures shows Sinnes (14 times), Kollar (12), Palm (11), Reichert (7), Nixon (5), Whitman (4), Miller (4), Rankin (2), Krummel (2) and Ron Groth (once).

Kollar moved into a tie for the PLU season scoring lead after the Bearcat game, a lead he relinquished early this season when he missed four games due to illness and a sprained ankle. He also leads the team in rebounds (190) and field goal percentage (.504).

For the lack of three baskets at the right time, PLU could be sporting a 13-8 record rather than 10-11.

Kollar's 23 rebounds were five short of the PLU school record set by Curt Gammell in 1965.
