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PLU NAMES NEW ALUMNI DIRECTOR

Rev. Harvey Neufeld, pastor of Galilean Lutheran Church at Ocean Shores and former director of church relations at

PLU, has been appointed alumni director at PLU, Dr. Eugene Wiegman, PLU president, announced.

Rev. Neufeld, who became the first pastor at Galilean Lutheran two years ago after fours years on the PLU staff, assumes his new duties in June.

His selection from 19 candidates was recommended by a special selection committee headed by Dr. Ray Tobiason of Puyallup, PLU Alumni Association president. Neufeld succeeds Jon Olson, who resigned last fall to become a development official at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif.

A native of Waldheim, Sask., Neufeld graduated from PLU in 1954 and from Luther Seminary, Saskatoon, Sask., in 1957. He has done additional graduate work at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., and Union College, Vancouver, B.C.

He served mission parishes in Saskatchewan and Alberta and was director of development at Camrose (Alta.) College before accepting his first appointment at PLU in 1965.

While serving at PLU, Neufeld was North Pacific area director for the American Lutheran Church's Lutheran Ingathering for Education (LIFE) fund campaign. More than \$1 million were contributed by the North Pacific District.

He assumes direction of a revitalized Alumni Association which has increased its annual giving from \$4,000 to \$50,000 annually during the past five years. The 1970-71 goal is \$60,000. Rapid strides are also being made by the Association in continuing education and alumni service programs.

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Seven days of intensified musical training and performing experiences, along with a diversified recreation program, are planned for students enrolling in the 2nd Annual Northwest Summer Music Camp at PLU July 18-25.

Applications are being accepted now. The camp is open to students in grades seven through 12.

According to camp director Lawrence Meyer, two bands and one orchestra will be organized. Clinics, sectionals, individual lessons and theory sessions will be offered under the direction of guest instructors.

A concert featuring the three large instrumental groups is scheduled as the final camp event.

Swimming, picnics, golf, bowling, excursions, socials and camp meetings are among the recreational activities offered.

PLU OFFERS SECOND ANNUAL MUSIC CAMP

Jerry Kracht, conductor of the PLU Symphony Orchestra, will direct the camp orchestra and will teach woodwinds. Larry Curtis, director of bands at California State College, will be in charge of the music camp bands. He will also give lessons in his own specialty, percussion instruments.

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DR. JOHNSTON SELECTED FOR JOB CORPS TEACHER EDUCATION PROJECT

Dr. Kenneth Johnston (educ.) has been selected as an "AACTE Summer Professor" by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

Dr. Johnston was one of 35 selected for the program from among 225 applicants nationwide and one of only three selected from the Northwest.

The "Project 35: Summer Professor" program is a part of the AACTE Job Corps Teacher Education Project. recognition of Job Corps centers as resources for teacher education, the 35 educators selected will spend four weeks in centers learning new methods for teaching disadvantaged youth.

The professors will observe Job Corps teaching techniques and materials, teach Corpsmen and consult with the Job Corps educational staff.

Dr. Johnston will begin his project experience June 14 in Albuquerque, N.M.

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CHOICE CENTER RECEIVES \$17,000 GRANT FROM ALC

The American Lutheran Church Board of College Education this week approved a grant of \$17,000 which would extend ALC support of the community service agency into a fourth year.

When the CHOICE Center was created three years ago the ALC Board of College Education earmarked \$50,000 to fund the center for three years. The new grant extends that support.

CHOICE director Robert Menzel has been in Minneapolis this week for the board's semi-annual meeting.

This year's tour schedule includes concert appearances in California, Oregon, Washington and Canada. The band is under the direction of Larry G. Curtis assisted by David G. Martin.

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CHOIR OF THE WEST TO PERFORM FOR MUSIC EDUCATORS PLU's Choir of the West left Tuesday on a four-day "mini" concert tour of Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Highlight of the tour will be a clinic performance at the Northwest Music Educator's Convention in Boise March 25. The 72-voice choir, under the direction of Maurice Skones, will also present concerts in Yakima, Kennewick and Baker, Ore.

During the convention Skones will conduct a clinic session on methods of introducing new music into choral repertoires.

Among the 31 musical organizations participating in the convention clinics will be the Curtis High School A Cappela Choir from Tacoma under the direction of Robert Northrop. Participants are selected by the Northwest district music educators, Rodney Eichenberger, director of choral music at the University of Washington, chairman.

The regular annual Choir of the West concert tour begins April 11 and will include performances in Washington, Oregon, Utah, Idaho, Montana and Colorado, with the annual Homecoming Concert slated for April 22.

Last summer the Choir completed a five-week 31-concert tour of five European countries, including an appearance during the 900th anniversary celebration in Bergen, Norway.

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LUTE NETTERS OPEN SATURDAY AGAINST COLLEGE OF IDAHO At this level of tennis competition, where numbers one and two single players are often in the limelight, while three through six are generally categorized as "they also played," PLU Tennis Coach Mike Benson is finding greater depth than ever before as he attempts to trim his squad down to the six man player limit for the College of Idaho match here on Saturday, March 27. Action commences at 1:30 p.m.

With only one senior on the squad--Dave Anderson from Portland, Benson is putting many new faces through the paces and the outcome of early week intersquad matches should determine the rotation for Saturday's opener.

At this stage, the Lutes top four appears to be Ted Carlson, Jim Sheets, Tim Thies, and Dave Anderson, although not necessarily in that order.

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Lewis & Clark, a pre-season favorite in the Northwest Conference golf ratings, lived up to its advance billing by taking both ends of the back-to-back PLU Tee Off Tourney and the Northwest Small College Golf Classic opening round match, Thursday and Friday at the Spanaway Course. PLU finished third both days.

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PLU's four man with cox shell skimmed over the American Lake course in near record time as the Lutes outrowed the UPS crew by 10 seconds in a practice run preparatory to opening the spring season this Saturday at Vancouver, B.C.

The 7:06 run was only a second off the Lutes' best 1970 effort, the winning heat in the West Coast Sprint Relays.

PLU bested UPS by 45 seconds in heavy eight competition while the frosh eight stroked to a 25 second win against the UPS clocking.

PLU's Dave Hansen, three time-Northwest Conference diving champion from both the one and three meter boards, finished fifteenth in one meter competition, eighteenth in three meter, while teammate Terry Ludwig's 5:12 timing in the 500 yard freestyle was good for twentieth place at the NAIA National Swimming Meet at Clarion, Pennsylvania March 18 20.

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PLU warmed up for Northwest Conference competition in track and field by finishing third in the PLU Invitational Relays March 20 at Spanaway's Sprinker C mplex. The Lutes go up against Pacific in Forest Grove this Saturday.

Western Washington finished on top with 55 points followed by Seattle Pacific 48, PLU 42, Puget Sound 40, and Simon Fraser 27.

Scored on a team relay basis, rather than individual winners, the Lutes collectively took top honors in the shot, high jump, and discus. Steve Harshman, with his father, Sterling Harshman on hand to receive the Salzman award for meritorious service to track, broke his own school record with a 50'4" heave in the shot.

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PLU battled Pac-8 University of Washington for eleven innings Friday before three Husky hits and Lute pitching wildness opened the gates for six big runs and a 10-4 UW win in twelve innings.

The Lutes face Western Thursday in Seattle and return home for a single game Friday against Whitman followed by a Saturday twin bill opposing College of Idaho.

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
