Alumni Meet PLC On Grid Saturday

Two Marvs
Star-studded Alumni
Fitzpatrick Still Out

A nostalgia of old memories is certain to fill the minds of the combatants in tomorrow night's grid clash between the Gladiators and the Alumni. Just mentioning the names of the two rival coaches is enough to cause the recollection of old times. Once teammates, Marv Harshman and alumni coach Marv Tommervik will be standing on opposite sides of the field Saturday, calculating moves to thwart each other. From 1930 to 1941, these two, called the "Marvellous Marvs," led PLC to 20 straight victories. Harshman and Tommervik both gained deserved recognition in Little All-American backfields. Harshman led the Pacific Coast in scoring three years in a row. In January of 1947, Tommervik, known locally as "Tommygun Tommervik," and Harshman last played together. The game was the championship playoff of the now defunct Pacific Coast pro football league, pitting the Tacoma Indians against Los Angeles. Harsh was quarterback and Tommervik halfback for the pro club in the 1946-47 season.

Other outstanding names from PLC history are on the alumni roster. Oliver Magnuson, '53; Glen Huffman, '53; Harry Malnes, '50; Jerry Kluth, '56; and Jim Ball, '53, were All-Conference choices and in Rick Daniels, PLC had another Little All-American. Some names remind us of the days of two platoon football when teams employed a defensive unit. George Nowalnick, Glenn Werner, Don Morris and Forrest Wohlhueter were defensive specialists. Alumni graduating dates go back to 1919, when Eldon Kyilo received his degree. Jerry Kluth is the most recent graduate, having left here last spring.

The famous galloping "pony" backs of PLC will also see action. These are Art Swanson, 5'5", 155 pounds, and Frank Karwoski, 5'6", 155 pounds. They started at left and right halfback for the Lutes in 1952. Another little back is Tommy Campbell, 5'8", 150 pounds, a terrific football player despite his size.

Walt Fitzpatrick will sit out another game, as his ankle is not yet healed. Left halfback, Galen Nusbaum, may not be ready for action because of an ailing knee. Other injuries are minor. Halfback John Mitchell hurt his hand and Dave Rasmussen's arm was injured in the UBC game. Oliver Magnuson, who will be starting tackle for the alumni, has become the father of a baby girl.

Here is a forecast for those who like to squabble over who will win. The Yankees will take the series in seven games. College of Puget Sound over Western Washington, Whitworth over Central, Eastern Washington over British Columbia, and Pacific Lutheran over the Alumni, 27-6.

Two junior college transfers, Bob Rolko, and Tom Sahli, are enrolled here. Rolko, 6'3 1/2", and Sahli, 6'5", could be good bats to bolster the Lute basketball team, both having had high school and junior college experience.

A sturdy 5 foot, 8 inch, 170 pound senior plays left half for PLC—his name is Galen Nusbaum.

He has been quite an active athlete during his three years here. This is his third year on the football team, having won two other letters. He was also captain of the track team last spring and has three letters in this sport, having competed in the sprints, the pole vault and the broad jump.

During his freshman year Nusbaum was at WSC; he lettered in track there. In 1953 he came to Parkland, but was ineligible for football until the fall of '54. Nusbaum has used up his eligibility in track, winning his third letter here last spring.

Nusbaum is an off campus student living in Puyallup, where he went to high school in 1952. He majors in Education and P.E., and rounds out his academic program with math, science and history. He currently is coaching the upper class powder puff team and is quite confident of his team. "We have excellent material and we're going to win, so watch out frosh." Galen must find time for studies, too, as he has nearly a three point average.

Lutes Roll Over UBC With Passing Attack

Former Gladiator gridgers turn enemy as they tackle Pacific Lutheran in the first alumni game, this Saturday at 8 p.m., in the Lincoln Bowl.

It is expected that many of the freshmen on this year's squad will see much action in this non-conference battle. Taking this opportunity to fully recover, Walt Fitzpatrick, guard, will be sidelined from action. John Jacobson, freshman, and Al Cartwright, sophomore, who both put in good performances against British Columbia, will no doubt see much quarterbacking in this alumni game.

Glenn Huffman, a 1953 graduate, will be the starting quarterback for the Alumni. Halfbacks will be Harold Malnes, and Frank Karwoski, who lettered four years and was a high ranking football player for the Lutes. Fullback for the returning men is Jack Guyot.

Pacific Lutheran dominated play all four quarters as it rounced the University of British Columbia 34-0 in Vancouver last Saturday, September 29.

Pacific Lutheran outgained the Thunderbirds 500 yards to 138 yards, and all three of Coach Marv Harshman's quarterbacks got a hand at tossing long gainers to the backs and ends. Tom Gilmer connected for eight out of eleven passes, and the sum for the Lutherans was 12 out of 17. The Gladiators

scored in every quarter, and on the only big threat from UBC, the Lutes stopped them on the 14.

PLC drew first blood when Ron Storaasli intercepted a Thunderbird pass in the first quarter, and five plays later Jack Newhart, fullback, dashed 17 yards for a touchdown. In the second quarter Pacific Lutheran tallied twice. Gilmer passed to Galen Nusbaum for 45 yards and six points, and later Vern Clark pushed over from the two-yard line following a 51-yard pass from Jacobson to Gilmer. At the end of the first half, the Lutherans led 20-0.

In the third quarter, a 25-yard pass resulted in six points, and Tom Rasmussen, a freshman, pounced across the goal during the final quarter for a touchdown.

Fellows — you're outnumbered! There are 654 women and 659 men enrolled this semester to make a total of 1313 students, according to the registrar's office.

The freshman class is the largest with 262 men and 232 women for a total of 494. Sophomores number 310 with 182 men and 148 women. There are 370 juniors, 150 men to 101 women. The senior class has 102 men and 108 women, adding up to 210.

The graduate category has 66 students, 32 men and 34 women. There are five women in the special division, while two men and 36 women make a total of 38 extension students.

Washington residents make up the greatest percentage of the student body. California is next with 116 students, while Oregon follows with 110. Other states represented and the number of students from them are: Montana, 28; Idaho, 21; Minnesota, 10; North Dakota, 4; Utah, 3; Colorado, 2; South Dakota, 2; and Wisconsin, 2. These states have one person from them: Alabama, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Texas, West Virginia, and Wyoming.

From Alaska we have 11 students and there are 7 from Hawaii. Other countries represented are Canada with 6, Iraq with 4, and Korea 5.
