Two Marvs Star-studded Alumni Fitzpatrick Still Out

A nostalgia of old memories is certain to fill the minds of the combattair in tomorrow night's grid clash between the Gladistors and the Alumni. Just mentioning the names of the two rival coaches is enough to make the recollection of old times. Once teammates, Mary Harshman and alumni couch Mary Tommervik will be standing on opposite sides of the field saturday, calculating moves to thwart each other. From 1830 to 1941, these two, called the "Marvellous Marvs," led PLC to 20 straight victories. Harshman and Tommervik both gained deserved recognition in Little All-American backfields. Harshman led the Pacific fourt in scoring three years in a row. In January of 1947, Tommervik, snown locally as "Tommygun Tommervik," and Harshman last played logether.
