One sculpture of Jesus bearing a cross of humanity has a permanent place in the lobby of the PLU Library, and other pieces of his work have been featured in shows in Minnesota, California and Washington. David Christian and **Lowell Kiesow** (both KPLU) have been busy putting some of the final touches on the new Emergency Alerting System for western Washington. The alert replaces the old Emergency Broadcast System, and features changes such as a new alert tone and digital monitors, special box-shaped devices capable of interpolating a digital message and even broadcasting it, said Christian. The EAS has the same basic plans as the old EBS, but with a little tweaking. Christian and Kiesow were involved with tracking down all the AM, FM and TV stations in the western part of the state, to know what regions would be able to receive what kind of messages. The new system went into effect on Jan. 1. Cable stations will be added to the EAS web by 1998.
