U. Of Michigan Prof To Address Faculty Meeting

Dr. Wilbert J. McKeachie, chairman of the psychology department at the University of Michigan, is the main speaker today at Pacific Lutheran University's annual Faculty Fall Conference.

The three-day series of meetings begins this morning with a welcome by PLU President Robert A. L. Mortvedt. Following introduction of new faculty members, Dr. McKeachie will speak on "The University as a Community of Scholars and Teachers."

The conference is held each fall prior to the start of classes to acquaint new teachers with the policies of the University and to make plans for the coming year.

Two PLU faculty members will also address the conference. Dr. Curtis Huber, chairman of the philosophy department, will speak on "The University as a Community of Professing Christians." Grace Blomquist, associate professor of English, will talk on "The University as a Community of Neighbors."

Dr. McKeachie is a graduate of Michigan State University. He received his master of arts degree and his doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Michigan. He has been a faculty member of the latter institution since 1946.

PLU Expects Record Number Of Transfers

A record number of incoming transfer students coupled with a high number of re-entries will join the student body at Pacific Lutheran University this fall.

J. E. Danielson, director of admissions, said his staff expects 165 transfers and 645 freshmen to start classes Sept. 21. This combined figure of 810 compares with 765 a year ago.

He added that 55 former PLU students have decided to re-enroll. These are students who have gone elsewhere and have now returned. In all, about 2,100 students will begin classes at the University this fall.

Cal Lutheran is a new opponent, but the coaching staff has the highest regard for its ability. Next the Lutes take on defending Evergreen champion Eastern Washington. This game is followed by Willamette University which is a contender for the Northwest Conference crown. And on Oct. 14 the Lutes take on cross-town rival University of Puget Sound.

A husky, big squad met Carlson last Monday during the team's first workout. Back are all-conference end Jeff Carey; three-year lettermen Al Fruetel (right), Mike Arkell, Bill Krieger, and Chuck Lingelbach.

Carlson has good men at all positions, and by Saturday he is hoping to have found a replacement for the quarterback slot. He lost his two quarterbacks from last year, but several freshmen and a top transfer might ease into the position.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Michael Ramsey, will receive an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree Sept. 22 at Pacific Lutheran University, announced PLU President Robert Mortvedt.

The honor will be bestowed upon the Leader of the Church of England at PLU's first official convocation of the academic year.

Dr. Mortvedt said the University's board of regents and faculty decided to confer the degree upon the Archbishop in recognition of his great service to all Christians.

The church head will arrive in the United States on Tuesday for an ecumenical service in New York City. From there he will go to Chicago to meet with church leaders.

His tour will bring him to Seattle where he will address the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church. His visit to the United States will end on Oct. 15.

Included in his traveling party will be his wife and personal chaplain, The Rev. John Andrew. Area church leaders and city officials will coordinate his travel plans in the Northwest.

Appointed At PLU

A total of 33 new faculty members have been appointed for the coming school year announced PLU President Robert Mortvedt.

In addition, several administrative positions have been filled. These include Bill Sandler, dean of men; Charles Nelson, registrar; Dr. Seiichi Adachi, director of counseling and testing; William Lennon, director of men's residence halls; Mary Kay Heisler, assistant dean of women; and Mark Andersen, admissions counselor.

Four new faculty members were hired to the departments of business administration and mathematics; and three to nursing and foreign languages.

Summer Is About Over; Orientation Draws Near

The residence halls will open and students will arrive Sunday, Sept. 17, for the start of Pacific Lutheran University's 81st year of operation in the Pacific Northwest.

The annual orientation week, operated by the office of student affairs, will begin Sunday afternoon with a president's convocation for parents. Dr. Robert Mortvedt will talk to the students' parents about the University and what they can expect from it.

Following the convocation Dr. and Mrs. Mortvedt will host a reception in Chris Knutzen Fellowship Hall. That evening the new students will be formally welcomed to campus.

Following breakfast on Monday Dr. Mortvedt will speak to the students about "Counting Cats in Zanzibar." The academic deans, Dr. Richard Moe and Dr. Charles Anderson, will be introduced along with the president of the student government, Stanley Stenerson.

During the three-day orientation the new students will read and discuss Lionel Trilling's book, "Of This Time, Of That Place." On Tuesday a faculty panel group, consisting of Dr. Curtis Huber, Dr. Paul Reigstad, Judd Doughty and Dr. John Schiller, will present their views on the book.

Other activities during the week include library orientation; band, orchestra, choir and chorus auditions; class placement tests; introduction to various student organizations; and get-acquainted sessions.

Some of the social activities are a Monday evening movie; Wednesday evening activity night; and a Tuesday evening visit at a faculty member's house.

"This latter event is one of the highlights of the entire orientation period," said Dr. Daniel Leasure, vice president--student affairs. "It gives the students a chance to get acquainted with the faculty in an informal setting."

Orientation ends Wednesday evening following the freshman activity night in the gymnasium. Classes begin at 7:50 a.m. Thursday.

As of Wednesday noon, 1,975 students had enrolled for classes at Pacific Lutheran

University. With this figure in mind, registrar Charles Nelson estimated that the total enrollment would reach the expected level of 2,825.

The registrar's office had filled the class needs of nearly 1,400 students the first two days. Wednesday morning they accommodated an additional 520.

Complete enrollment figures will not be known until next week, but it is expected that over 2,100 persons will have registered as full-time students.

Lasansky, who is chairman of the Department of Graphic Arts at the State University of Iowa, will be present at 10 a.m. Saturday for the opening of the show.

Lasansky came to the U.S. from his native country of Brazil in 1943 and has been at Iowa since 1945.

His prints portray a world convulsed in agony, almost Goyaesque in their sense of nightmare.

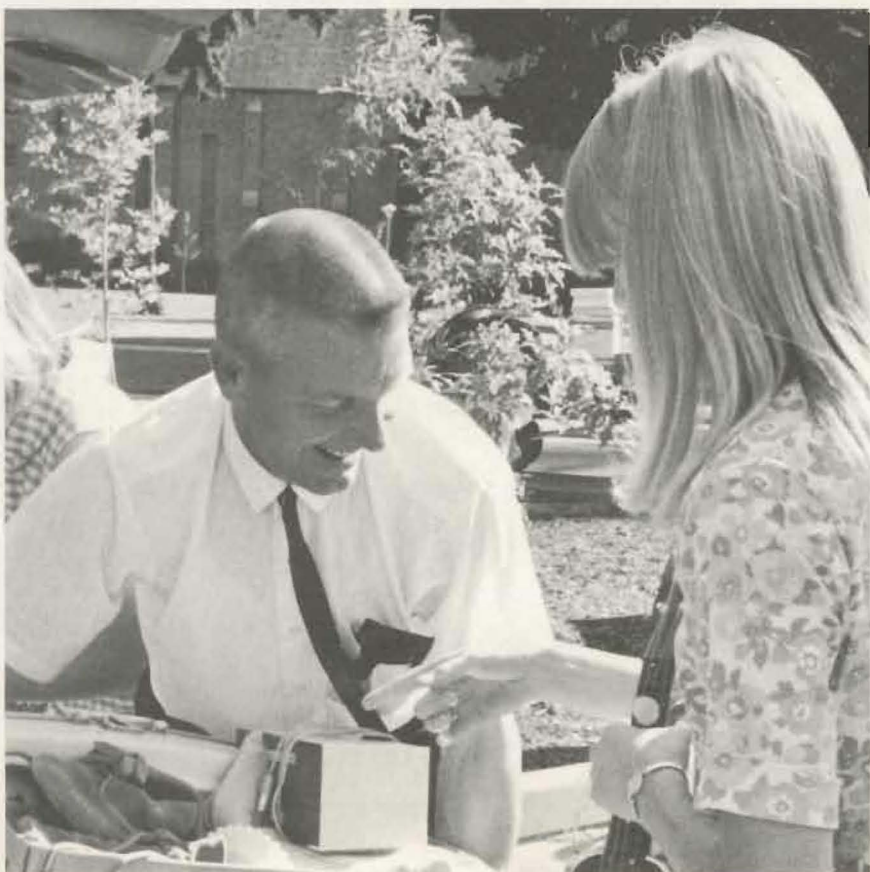

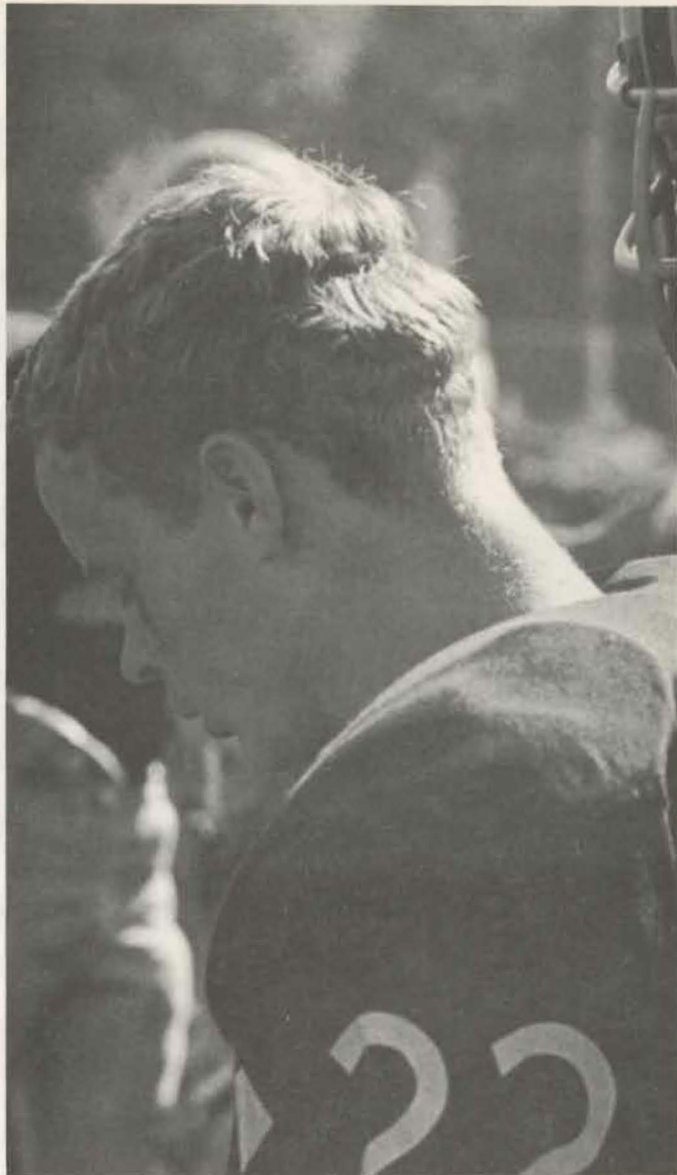
Tripped ...
