"Voice, Text and Hypertext @ the Millennium" -- at PLU

Explore "Voice, Text and Hypertext @ the Millennium" in a free conference at PLU and the University of Washington Oct. 29-Nov. 1. Issues surrounding text of all sorts are discussed in workshops such as "History of Book Culture," "Editing the Romantics" and "Hypertext and Digital Culture," as well as in the keynote address on "The Function of [Textual] Criticism and the Present Time" by David Greetham of the City University of New York Graduate Center. Two of the featured conference speakers will give presentations at PLU on Oct.29. At 2 pm, Randall McLeod, professor of English at the University of Toronto, will speak on "The Shape of Sonnets." McLeod will explore the roles that editors, printers, and publishers play in determining the texts of Shakespeare's work. At 4 pm, Jonathan Rose, professor of history at Drew University, talk on "Down and Out in Bloomsbury: Bohemia and the British Working Class."
