SCHOOL YEAR BEGINS WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT A record number of students were on hand at Pacific Lutheran University this week for the opening of the Parkland school's 77th year.

Two thousand two hundred fifty-six students were registered as of Tuesday morning, with predicitions indicating a final full-time enrollment of slightly over 2,400 for the fall semester. Along with more than 600 students registered for late afternoon and evening classes, total enrollment is expected to exceed 3,000 for the first time in the history of the school.

Last year the full-time enrollment was 2,219 with a total enrollment of 2,831. Freshman enrollment is up from 640 to 676, and returning students or transfers brings new student enrollment to 1,034.

The school year officially began Thursday, with the opening convocation and the first regularly scheduled classes.

President Eugene Wiegman's convocation address was highlighted by the announcement of the university's theme for the 1970-71 school year. More than 100 community leaders were on hand for the address, along with a full academic processional and announcement of honors and faculty promotions.

Students began arriving on campus Sunday. Parents of new students participated in a convocation and reception with President Wiegman that afternoon. On Monday the president met with the new students.

Registration occupied many of the daytime hours of the students with visits in the homes of faculty members scheduled for Wednesday.

Ten new administrators and staff members joined the university community, along with 33 new faculty members. Heading the list was Dr. Richard Jungkuntz, provost.

"CHOICE" SCHEDULES DAY CARE WORKSHOP "Discipline and Freedom in the Care of the Young Child" will be the theme of an intensive weekend workshop conducted for 40 area day care personnel Oct. 9-10.

Prof. Robert Menzel, Director of Pacific Lutheran University's Center for Human Organization in Changing Environments (CHOICE), will head up the training project, according to Eugene W. Wiegman, PLU president.

Dr. Wiegman notes, "This program reflects one more aspect of the school's thrust into the community arena of social and civic concern."

The Pierce County Child Care Coordinating Services Committee (4C's), one of three such umbrella community agencies in the state, has initiated the program requests. Frank Owens of the Financial Advisory Office, Pacific National Bank of Washington, is chairman.

The training workshop, which is funded by a grant from the Children's Bureau of the Office of Health, Education and Welfare, is the second in a year's time awarded PLU for day care in-service training.

Participants in the workshop will include day care teachers, aides and parents as well as instructors in early childhood education from the comunity colleges and vocational schools. Workshop coordinator is Mrs. J. L. "Pat" Woodard. Keynote speaker and workshop stimulator will be Prof. Gary Cooke of the School of Education at the University of Oregon, who is a specialist in early childhood education. He will address the group and participate in discussions on "Trust Between Child and Adult."

Participants will follow up the weekend with an evening meeting in which they will individually evalresults of their discipline techniques in the day care situation.

UNIVERSITY CENTER OPENING SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED "The most exciting" building on the PLU campus, the new University Center, will be opened in stages this fall, according to A. Dean Buchanan, vice-president for business and finance.

Rather than press the contractors beyond reasonableness for the sake of a couple of weeks, it has been decided to delay the opening of certain areas, Buchanan reports.

He also asked that members of the university family cooperate by withstanding the temptation to wander into unauthorized areas or to visit uncompleted areas.

Schedule for opening of the new center is as follows: information desk, ain lobby, and administrative offices, Sept. 6; bookstore, Sept. 8; game room (bowling and billiards), Sept. 21; balance of first floor ("commons," kitchens, meeting rooms, Christ Knutzen Fellowship Hall and faculty/staff dining room), Oct. 5; and coffee shop, Oct. 30.

Dedication is set for Nov. 8.
