KNIGHT FOOTBALLERS OPEN HOME SCHEDULE WITH LOGGERS

Unsuccessful in its Northwest Confernce debut, PLU takes a crack at an old Evergreen Conference foe, crosstown rival University of Puget Sound, Saturday at the Franklin Pierce High School Stadium. Kickoff time is 1:30 p.m.

Coach Roy Carlson's Knights, who saw a six-game winning streak snapped by Linfield 17-0, will attempt to start a new victory string against the Loggers who open the 1965 season under new coach Bob Ryan.

This will be the 42nd meeting between the two rivals. Although UPS holds a commanding 28-8 edge in the series, the majority of the battles have been close contests. A check of the record indicates that 17 of the games were decided by a touchdown or less while five others have ended in ties.

The two teams split in 1964, UPS winning the opener 7-6 while PLU took the match 27-7.

PLU showed signs of brillance in their opener against Linfield but were unable to put together a consistant effort to offset the power-ladened defending Northwest Conference champions.

Five time, four of them in the second half, PLU was within scoring range, but each time its effort was thwarted--twice by fumbles and another time by a penalty.

The Knights actually held the edge statistic-wise in the second half, outgaining the Wildcats by 124-99 yards. However, a 139-37 yardage edge in the first half gave Linfield a 59-yard spread for the game, 238-181.

FACULTY ART EXHIBITION
OPENS IN CUB COFFEE SHOP

The first in a series of art exhibitions, sponsored jointly by the PLU Associated Students Artist Series and the PLU department of art, opened Thursday in the College Union Building, Coffee Shop.

The exhibition, which is open to the public, will continue through the first week of October.

Works by members of the PLU art faculty are included in the first exhibition. Some 25 items, ranging from watercolors to mink fur, are represented.

Participating in the show are George Roskos, chairman of the department of art, who is exhibition five sculptures; George Elwell, assistant professor of art, six constructions; Lars Kittleson, assistant professor of art, four oil paintings; and Sydney Engeset, assistant in art, 10 water-colors.

Other shows include an exhibition of woodcuts by world renown contemporary Kiyosni Saito of Japan; in October, a series of lithographs by the dramatic, young Mexican lithographer Jose Luis Cuevas; in November, a show called "The Edge of Pop"; during the winter months representing works by a number of West Coast Artists, along with an exhibition by Virna Haffer, local experimental photographer.

ALVIN THIESSEN (library) has been engaged as a consultant to participate in the expansion of the bibliographical classification of seismology according to the Universial Decimal Classification (U.D.C.) of the Federation Internationale de Documentation. He has been invited to attend a two-day conference in Washington, D. C., at which plans for this expansion will be drafted. Thiessen has had eight years in meterology with the Canadian government and 10 years in aeronautics with the International Civil Aviation Organization. Seismology has suddenly risen into prominence as a tool in the detection of underground nuclear weapons testing. It is hoped to devize means for dealing with the flood of literature and data now joining the information explosion....
