Specific cases which may come to the court of the new justice of the peace are those of destruction of property, drunken driving, vagrancy, game law violations, and many other minor offenses.

Although Lou doesri't relish the idea, state law also prescribes that the justice of the peace shall marry people who so desire and can meet the requitments of the law.
The justices of the prace throughout the state have the important job of handling the thousarsds of civil and criminal cases of lesser importance which othenwise would unduly burden the superius and supreme fourts of the state.
