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
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Committees Chosen Innerarity Is Now For Frosh Picnic

College Precinct of Pierce County. A pre-law student majoring in speech, Lou was appointed by county commissioners Harry Sprinker, Les Hudson, and Paul Neuman to hold office in the new district comprising the Parkland area.

As justice of the peace, Lou will be empowered to hold court in cases involving misdemeanors (violations of Lute Nine Wins 3 state law punishable by 90 days or less in jail), gross misdemeanors (violabust, Carol Schuler, Al Fink, Cornelius tions punishable by jail sentences up Garrison, Joan Gardner, and Helen to a year's duration), and civil cases involving \$100 or less.

Specific cases which may come to the court of the new justice of the peace are those of destruction of property, drunken driving, vagrancy, game law violations, and many other minor offenses.

Although Lou doesn't relish the idea, state law also prescribes that the justice of the peace shall marry people who so desire and can meet the requitements of the law.

The justices of the peace throughout the state have the important job of handling the thousands of civil and criminal cases of lesser importance which otherwise would unduly burden the superior and supreme courts of the state.

Editorship of the Profile is rotated among Washington colleges and universities. The May issue was edited jointly by Washington State and Whitworth colleges.


