**UNIVERSITY ORCHESTRA TO APPEAR
IN CONCERT SUNDAY AFTERNOON**

Works by Bach, Beethoven and Barber will be featured in a concert to be given Sunday by the PLU Orchestra. Complimentary to the public, the program will begin at four o'clock in Eastvold Chapel.

To open the program Director Stanley Petrusis has chosen J. S. Bach's "Fifth Brandenburg Concerto in D Major." Appearing as soloists with the 60-piece orchestra in this rendition will be Kathryn Seulean, harpsichord; Susan McGee, violin; and Karla Miller, flute. Miss Seulean is a member of the PLU music faculty and the others are students.

The first movement of the Bach work includes a virtuoso passage for unaccompanied harpsichord. The second movement is for the three solo instruments without accompaniment and the last movement is like a spirited jig.

Beethoven's "First Symphony in C Major, Opus 21," will be the second work on the program. Written in 1800, this composition follows the form of the classical symphony of Mozart and Haydn, but also has innovations which were startling to audiences of that day.

Final selection of the concert will be "First Essay for Orchestra" by Samuel Barber, contemporary American composer. Written in 1938, the Essay is based on two contrasting ideas, the first a slow tempo and the second a lively scherzo-like tempo.

Pacific Lutheran University will confer an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws upon Myrl Alexander, director of the Bureau of Prisons, U. S. Department of Justice, Sunday during a program at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel Auditorium.

Alexander, who has had more than 30 years experience in the Federal Prison Service, will speak here during PLU's Social Life Series program on "Crime and Its Prevention."

The series will open Sunday with a lecture on the subject of "Crime and Delinquency: Whose Responsibility." This lecture will follow the conferring of the honorary degree.

He also will speak Monday and Tuesday at 4:30 p.m. on the respective subjects of "The Role of Higher Education in Crime and Prevention Control" and "Current Concepts of Corrections."

All sessions are open to the public and will be held in Eastvold Chapel.

BOARD OF REGENTS NAME DEAN, TWO VICE-PRESIDENTS

In a nutshell, here are the results of the recent Board of Regents meeting held Monday and Tuesday:

Dr. Charles D. Anderson, chairman of the department of chemistry, was chosen Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, replacing Dr. Erich C. Knorr who has reached the mandatory retirement age for administrators.

A. Dean Buchanan, business manager since 1962, was named to the post, vice-president for business operations.

The Rev. Milton Nesvig, director of public relations, was chosen for the position, vice-president for university relations.

A third vice-presidential post created was that of vice-president for student personnel services. It will remain unfilled until a later date.

The three new appointments are effective on September 1.

The university owned residence at 601 So. 121st St. will be converted into the Student Health Center during the summer. The present center is located on the site where a new residence hall for women is to be erected starting in June.

A parking fee of \$5.00 per semester will be charged students with automobiles, starting in September.

A new six-year term was voted for Dr. Robert Mortvedt as president, although his initial six-year term does not expire until 1968.

An operating budget of \$4,138,540 for the 1966-67 academic year was adopted. Salaries of \$1,933,000 for faculty and staff is the biggest item in the budget. Compensation for faculty members will be \$1,086,400.

Preliminary drawings for an addition to the science hall as well as for the two new dorms were presented. No action was taken on these matters.

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PLU CAGERS MEET FALCONS, VIKINGS IN IMPORTANT NON-LEAGUE CONTESTS

PLU puts a six-game winning string on the line tonight when it travels to Seattle to meet Seattle Pacific College in a non-league basketball encounter.

It will be the second meeting of the season between the two Northwest small college cage powers. PLU stopped SPC 72-68 in the previous meeting in Tacoma.

Since then PLU has gone on to a 17-4 record while the Falcons are 20-3 for the season.

The Knights have another important engagement Saturday night when they meet Evergreen Conference leader Western Washington in Bellingham.

PLU will be seeking revenge in this one. WWSC stopped the Knights 66-58 in overtime in the season opener.

The men of coach Gene Lundgaard will return home Monday to face College of Idaho as they make a final bid for at least a share of the Northwest Conference title.

PLU will close the regular season schedule Feb. 24-25 against Whitman in Memorial Gymnasium. The two-game set has been moved back one day to allow PLU to enter the District I NAIA playoff Feb. 26.

Curt Gammell continues to pace the Knights in scoring and rebounding with respective averages of 19.8 and 14.2 .

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DR. FRAUENFELDER TO LECTURE ON PHYSICS HERE

Dr. Hans Frauenfelder, professor of physics at the University of Illinois, will lecture and visit with physics students and instructors at PLU Tuesday and Wednesday.

A graduate of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich, Dr. Frauenfelder will present a public lecture on "The Elementary Particle Zoo" at 8 p.m. Tuesday in Jacob Samuelson auditorium.

In 1958-59 he had a Guggenheim Fellowship and was a visiting scientist in Geneva and in 1963 was with CERN in Geneva working in high-energy physics.

His field of interest is nuclear physics. He organized the first Mossbauer Conference.

He will visit under the auspices of the American Association of Physics Teachers and the American Institute of Physics.

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HIGH SCHOOL DEBATE TOURNAMENT SCHEDULED FOR NEXT WEEK

Several hundred students from high schools in the Pacific Northwest will attend the 12th annual high school debate tournament which starts next Thursday (Feb. 24) on the PLU campus. Sponsored by the Washington Debate Coaches Association, the event is being hosted and directed by the PLU Pi Kappa Delta chapter.

This is the largest tournament of its type to be held in this area.

The tournament is of a restricted nature with a limit on entries. Each school may enter no more than four debate teams and no more than two person in each event.
