The new MRS degree program has been enthusiastically accepted by both male and female students according to the Academic Standards Committee. The program, initiated second semester, is an interdepartmental course taught by the school of nursing, psychology and political science departments. "Because of its popularity, we have decided to devote 69 per cent of the academic budget for the 1979-80 school year to it, in addition to retroactive budget cuts in programs not directly related to the MRS program," according to an ASC memorandum.

"What this means is that most departments will have to forfeit their budgets for the next four to five academic years, at least." Courses offered in the program are Marriage as a Second





Steve Reaky, newly appointed ASPLU President, fell off the U.C. mezzanine balcony recently and died.


