The third annual PLU orchestra concert featuring student soloists will be held Tuesday, March 18, in Eastvold Auditorium at 8:15 p.m.

Six of the top soloists on campus will perform. They include Joyce Johnson, soprano; Dalwyn Olberg, violinist; Jill Farver and Garrett Allman, pianists; Joan Norburg, flutist; and Sharon Rodkey, mezzo-soprano.

Miss Johnson will open the program with two arias by Handel: the lyric "Care Selve" from the opera Atlanta and the coloratura aria "Alleluja" from one of Handel's first oratorios, Esther.

Miss Olberg will then play the technically demanding third movement of "Concerto in E Minor" by Mendelssohn.

The first half of the program concludes with the beautiful first movement of Mozart's "Piano Concerto in C Major, K. 467," played by Miss Farver.

After intermission Allman will perform the first movement of Tchaikowsky's "Concerto No. 1 in B Minor," followed by Miss Norburg playing Kennan's hauntingly beautiful "Night Soliloquy" and "Vivaldi's Concerto No. 1 in F" for flute.

The final work will be Mahler's "Songs of a Wayfarer," sung by Miss Rodkey.

PLU TEAM SECOND IN TALK TOURNEY

Pacific Lutheran University's forensics squad finished second in senior sweepstakes Saturday at the 36th annual Linfield Tournament of Champions, McMinnville, Ore. The University of Oregon placed first.

PLU team members won five individual events: Patty Cowell, sophomore, won the junior women's extemporaneous and impromptu speaking; Pam Peterson, freshman, won junior women's after dinner speaking; Lynn Moody, junior, won senior women's extemporaneous speaking; Miss Moody and Cathy Collins, junior, tied with Wyoming University for first in senior men's debate.

Other PLU participants who placed were Harry Wicks, senior, third in senior men's interpretive speaking and second in oratory; and Miss Collins, third in senior women's oratory. Miss Cowell and Jim Collins, freshman, finished in the quarter finals in men's debate.

PLU placed fourth in grand sweepstakes. Coach for the 16-member squad is Prof. Theodore O. H. Karl, and assistant coach is Mrs. Mickey Revis.

Forty-five teams from as far east as Ohio competed in the tournament.

Lutes Gear For Spring Sports Season

TENNIS

PLU has enjoyed its two most successful tennis seasons in 1967 and 1968, gaining the Northwest Conference Championship both years. In 1967 the squad won nine and lost five, more wins in one year than the Lutes won in the preceding five years. Last spring the squad record was 11-6.

Lundgaard To Conduct Cage Clinic In Sweden

Gene Lundgaard, PLU basketball coach, has accepted an invitation from the Swedish Basketball Federation to conduct a series of basketball clinics in Sweden during June and July.

Lundgaard received the invitation from Hans Albertsson, a former PLU basketball great and now assistant coach of the Swedish International Team.



Two-week clinics are presently scheduled in Stockholm and Ystad, according to Lundgaard. Approximately 230 youngsters between 14 and 18 years of age will participate, divided into groups of 20 according to age and ability.

Lundgaard is the fourth American coach to conduct the clinics in the seven years since they were organized.

A former PLU cage star himself, Lundgaard has served as the university's head basketball coach for 11 years and has never had a losing season. His overall record is 195-198.

He has coached five little All-Americans including Albertsson in 1962.

A big reason for last year's success was Keith Johnson, now graduated, who went to the national tournament last year. Coach Rich Alseth has three lettermen returning this year: Dave Beam, a junior, last year's number two player; Gary Landvatter, junior, number three last year; and junior Mike Benson returns after a year layoff. Benson won district doubles two years ago.

TRACK

Paul Hoseth takes over the reins of a track team that had its troubles last year, finishing at the bottom of the Northwest Conference.

With 37 men cut for the cinder sport this year including 10 lettermen, Hoseth sees a considerable improvement in the offing.

Rich Slatta, a senior field events specialist, is back for one more year, along with Jeff Tompkins in the 440, Doug Jansen in the sprints and Randy Jorgenson in the shot put.

BASEBALL

For the first time in recent years the PLU baseball team will have depth. There are returning lettermen at every position except first base with promising freshmen and transfers pushing the regulars for starting assignments.

Three year lettermen include captain Bill Ranta, shortstop; outfielder Al Fruetal, catcher Jim Flatness and third baseman Dave Johnson. Two-year lettermen are outfielders Ron Toff and Bill Disbrow and pitcher Erick Steinman.

Other lettermen include second baseman Eric Godfrey, outfielders Red Burchfield and Dennis Gagner and catcher Bill Tye.

The big questionmark is pitching. Steinman is the only returnee. If Coach Joe Broeker can find a couple of good hurlers the Lutes will be in contention.
