PLU SWEEPS NORTHWEST PUBLICATIONS AWARDS COMPETITION

Pacific Lutheran University swept the honors in the annual Northwest District American Alumni Association--American College Public Relations Association Publications Competition.

Of the nine publications entered by PLU, eight received awards of excellence and the other an honorable mention rating.

Fifteen colleges and universities from five northwestern states and British Columbia entered the competition. Reed College of Portland was the only other school besides PLU to receive more than one award of excellence with two such awards.

Receiving awards of excellence for PLU were the following publications: President's annual report, catalog, brochure on nursing, general brochure for student recruitment, viewbook for student recruitment, fact sheet on the University, promotional brochure on the development program, and a series of posters, programs and dodgers on the Choir of the West and the PLU concert band.

The university's quarterly magazine, "Reflections," received an honorable mention award.

Other schools receiving an award of excellence for one of their publications were Fort Wright College, University of Oregon, Western Washington State College and Washington State University.

Howard Miller, manager of the publication services at the University of Washington and his staff were the judges for the competition.

Milton Nesvig, director of public relations at PLU, and his staff will be the judges of the 1966 competition.

KNIGHT BASKETBALLERS FACE IMPORTANT ENCOUNTERS

PLU will try to fan its flickering Northwest Conference basketball title hopes this week when it travels to Pacific University tonight and returns home Saturday to encounter league-leading Linfield.

The Knights, who now sport an 8-3 league record, must win both contests to keep their title hopes alive. PLU is 12-4 for the season.

Linfield, which has divided two previous outings with the men of Gene Lundgaard, leads the NWC pack with a 7-1 record.

The Wildcats dropped the league opener to PLU 91-72 but have won the last seven contests, including an 82-63 conquest of the Knights.

PLU disposed of Pacific twice, 88-53 and 89-76, earlier this year.

The Knights lead in the all-time series with Pacific 12-3 and with Linfield 21-5.

Besides trying to move back into the thick of the conference race, PLU will try to add to two home winning strings Saturday when it hosts Linfield. It has won seven straight at home and has won 26 straight games in Memorial Gymnasium from NWC teams. The Knights have yet to lose in their present gym to a NWC team.

Curt Gammell continues to lead the PLU scorers and rebounders with respective averages of 20.1 and 14.1.

Gammell scored 56 points in the weekend series with College of Idaho and Whitman to boost his career point total to 1,499, replacing his coach Gene Lundgaard as the number four scorer in PLU basketball history.
