Canadian Opera To Appear Here

The Canadian Opera Company, Canada's first professional company, is performing at Eastvold Auditorium Tuesday, Dec. 3, at 8:15 p.m. with a full-length production of Rossini's "Barber of Seville," one of the universal favorites of the operatic stage.

The appearance is the third of five Artist Series programs to be presented at PLU.

The Company's great success with its previous tours has made a return engagement a "must." This is the Company's 16th tour.

The new production features the best of Canadian and International operatic singers and is made possible by federal and provincial grants. This is also the first time the cast has been accompanied by a touring orchestra.

The musical direction for this famous opera is provided by John Fenwick and the stage direction is by Dr. Herman Geiger-Torel.

Fenwick, Ontario born and a graduate of Toronto spent several years as an orchestral musician, studying with Boyd Neel and later under the guidance of Leonard Bernstein. Formerly music director of the Halifax symphony, he became associate artistic director of the Charlottetown Festival in 1967 and the same summer conducted CBC's Summer Symphony in Toronto.

Geiger-Torel is a name synonomous with Canadian Opera. In 1950 he was the moving force in the formation of the Canadian Opera Company, acting as its first stage director and producer. In 1958 he became its general director and under his guidance Canadian opera has attained invaluable stature throughout the music world.

Among the members of an outstanding cast are Richard Braun as Fiorello; Cornelis Opthof as Figaro and Sheila Piercey as Rosina.

U IVERSITY CHORALE SCHEDULES TWO CONCERTS

Pacific Lutheran's University Chorale, under the direction of David Urness, will present its first two concerts of the season this Sunday, Nov. 24.

The first will be given at 3 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church. The second concert will be held at the University Methodist Temple, 43rd St. N.E. and 15th Ave. in Seattle, the same evening.

Appearing with the 45-voice select choir will be a chamber orchestra consisting of members of the Pacific Lutheran Symphony. They will be heard with the Chorale in performances of the Bach "Cantata #196, The Lord Smile on You," and "Missa Brevis in F Major K. 192" for soloists, chorus and orchestra by W.A. Mozart.

In addition to these two major works, the Chorale will present a group of Renaiasance motets by Palestrina, Thomas Morley and Jan Sweelinck. The final work of the concert will be the "Lamentations of Jeremiah" by the contemporary Argentinian composer Alberto Ginastera.

The public is cordially invited to these concerts.

Knight Cagers To Open Against CWSC

Coach Gene Lundgaard's court wizards open the 1968-69 basketball season on the road at Central Washington State College.

The Knight's will be out to break Central's two-year hex which has resulted in six straight wins for the CWSC quintet. Last season the two teams clashed twice in the first three games as they will this season, Central winning both by substantial margins, 68-63 and 97-73.

Knight chances are considerably improved this year as all but one of last year's starters have returned. The PLU roster includes two all-conference choices, Leroy Sinnes and Al Kollar, along with Tom Meeks, Kevin Miller, Ron Groth, Rick Ancheta and Bruce Shamp.

To replace graduated Dennis Buchholz, Lundgaard has a 6-8 freshman from Sweden, Ake Palm, a 22-year old with all the moves. The Knight coach, as well as the team, figure to improve on last year's 17-9 winloss mark and bring home another Northwest Conference championship in the process.

Following the opening game the Knights return to PLU for two games. They face Western Washington State College here Dec. 6, followed by a second tangle with Central Dec. 7.

PLU Gridders Fail In Upset Bid

. Pacific Lutheran University football fans watched a group of young men grow this season.

They grew, not only as gridders, but as men. As the season wore on they learned teamwork, drive, that second effort. In spite of setbacks, several of those "almost" wins, they finished the season with a winning attitude. There were no doubts in any of their minds that they were as good as any team in the Northwest Conference.

There was genuine disappointment after the 21-20 loss to Willamette Saturday. The Knights were convinced they were capable of winning that game.

The team, ranked near the bottom of the pack at the beginning of the season, improved to a point where they were only three-point underdogs before the Bearcat game.

The first quarter was nearly over when Willamette hit pay dirt for the first time Saturday. After several turnovers, Bearcat quarterback Mike Shinn hit halfback Bob Riley with the third of his 13 record-setting completions. The play carried to the PLU one-yard line.

On the second play halfback Osa Morgado dived over for the score.

The Bearcats continued to dominate the game. On their 30th play (PLU had 13), Shinn tried to hit Riley again. But the Lutes' Jack Irion picked off the pass and raced 38 yards for the score. Hammer's kick made it 7-7.

Following the kickoff Willamette drove for 17 more plays to the PLU nine before Tim Chandler intercepted a Gib Gilmore pass on the two and returned it 30 yards. Gilmore had faked a field goal.

PLU gave up the ball shortly thereafter only to retreive it again as Ross Boice pounced on a Bearcat fumble at the Willamette 14. A Lovell to Hammer aerial was one yard short of a first down on the five but PLU got the ball back four plays later.

In the third quarter Willamette took only two plays to tie the game after a Mike Robbins punt went out of bounds on the PLU 24. Shinn hit Riley again for 22 yards and the score.

PLU came back with the help of a fourth down Bearcat penalty to march 88 yards for the go ahead touchdown. Lovell set up the score with a 62-yard romp around left end to the Bearcat 10. Grant Spencer went over from the two. The kick failed; the score was 20-14 with 8:31 left in the third quarter

Another two-play drive gave Willamette their winning score as the final period began. Shinn tossed to Morgado, who rambled 62 yards to pay dirt after Tim Chandler almost intercepted the pass. The ball bounced out of his hands into Morgado's.

Dave Halstead, running on a badly sprained ankle throughout the game, fell continued on page 6

PLU's other H-bomb, Gary Hammer, finished the season with 594 yards rushing, second or third in the conference. The two sophomore halfbacks tied for team scoring honors, each with 42 points.

Several PLU defenders had their best game Saturday. Senior Bill Tye was in on 12 tackles, junior Neil Bryant had 11, and junior Paul Ferguson was in on 10.

Tim Chandler and Doug Jansen shared 11 interceptions for the season. Chandler finished with six.

A 16-man PLU swim team, including nine lettermen, is working out for the Knights' season opener against Western Washington in the PLU pool Dec. 6.

Coach Rich Alseth's veterans are led by John Bustad, senior from Mount Vernon, and Steve Bennett, junior from Scottsdale, Ariz.

Bustad is Northwest Conference 100yard butterfly record-holder (59.4 sec.) and swam the third leg on the 400 medly relay foursome which holds the circuit mark. Bennett is conference diving record-holder of both the one and three-meter boards.
