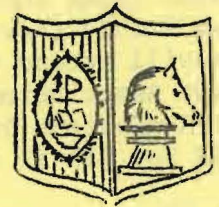

LEONA SIEGLE, ASSISTANT TO DIRECTOR OF FOOD SERVICE, DEAD AT 52

Miss Leona Siegle, 52, assistant to the director of food service and member of the staff since 1948, died Tuesday evening in a Seattle hospital. Funeral services will be held Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock in Trinity Lutheran Church.

Leona had been ill for some time, but had been doing some work in the kitchen of late. She was there last week and assisted some last Saturday. She drove to Seattle Sunday to visit her sister and was hospitalized Monday. A Lutheran pastor was called to her bedside Tuesday evening, Leona said, "Thank you," after the devotional, and then she died.

Leona was a hard-working cheerful person who was a friend to many generations of students and also of the University staff. She will be missed, and her devotion to duty and selfless attitude of service will remain with us. Blessed be her memory.

DR. NODTVEDT PENS LETTER OF HIS TRAVELS IN EUROPE

(EDITOR'S NOTE--The following are excerpts from a letter by Dr. Magnus Nodtvedt to Dr. Philip E. Hauge. Dr. Nodtvedt retired this summer after 16 years as professor of history at PLU.

After spending several weeks visiting relatives in Colorado, California and Minneapolis, Dr. Nodtvedt departed from Tacoma on Sept. 29 by train for a trip across Canada. He sailed from Quebec Oct. 4 on the Empress of Britian arriving in Liverpool, Eng., Oct. 10. He spent four days visiting friends there.)

"We took a thirty mile bus tour to the old Roman Chester. The old Roman wall intrigued me. It was the Roman legions bastion to keep the wild Welch out of their England. The cathedral church was especially blessed by St. Anselm, "the father of Scholasticism". In Liverpool the University of Liverpool is in a vast building program.

The train from Liverpool to London threaded its weary way slowly thru "the midlands" but finally left us to push our way into the mad city of 8,500,000 Londoners. I spent only two days in London. I hope to return next Spring. The most competent guide I have ever had on any tour enriched our historical lore in a two hour meandering thru famous Westminster Abbey. Most unusual is, e.g., the tomb of Queen Elizabeth I in splendor above the floor, then Queen Mary Tudor "bloody Mary", her half-sister lies in a tomb below the floor and directly under Elizabeth's tomb. A broken stairway symbolizes Mary's tomb. Guide: Protestantism over Catholicism in England.

I shall not trouble you with details of travel. The overnight ferry from Harwich to "The Hook" near The Hague on The North Sea was smooth not like customary journeys on this boisterous shallow sea. I had to employ all the German that I could muster to keep on the right train from "The Hook" to Hannover and again to Wolfsburg. I possessed my new 1964 VW and drove up to Lilbeck, the one-time headquarters of the Hanseatic League. A night in a quaint little German hotel was an experience. The "marks" mean much to the small businessman. Fortunately I had my own soap. Many hotels do not furnish soap in guest rooms, as you may know. One can easily drive 60 mph on excellent German highways. At Futttoarden the ferry took us to Lailand in Denmark. Now my Norwegian gave me an easier manner of communication, that is, with the Danes. "De er egentlig Dansk", I was told. Of course honesty required that I dare not even claim to be "Horsk" but just an American trying to recover my Norwegian vocabulary. I bypassed Copenhagen and took the ferry from Helsingør to Haesingsborg, Sweden. Then I drove to Göteborg and finally up to Oslo. I found that I had driven 725 miles from Wolfsburg, Germany to Oslo. (I drove 590 miles one day from Tacoma to Hayward, California only a few days ago).

Perhaps the point of my letter is this: My address for the time being is this: Gabelshus Hotell-Pension, Gables Gate 16, Oslo.

I did not learn until just before leaving Tacoma that the Saga had conferred on me a signal undeserved honor. I shall try to make due acknowledgment of this unexpected favor shortly.

If any of our colleagues inquire about me, kindly bring my warmest greetings and tell them that thus far I am in excellent health. I hope to begin some work now when a little rest has been made possible. Thank you, dear friend Dr. Hauge, for all kindness and continuous favors.
