# An early Christmas gift for PLU: Phase II of the music center receives funding

Santa stopped by PLU a little early this year, carrying philanthropist Mary Baker Russell in his sleigh. The spirited and compassionate Tacoma woman has agreed to support a substantial portion of the \$3 million Phase II project of the music center that bears her name. New teaching studios, practice rooms, rehearsal facilities, faculty offices and administrative space can be added onto the building, thanks to the generous gift, supplemented by contributions of others and a portion of PLU's capital funds. Construction is scheduled to begin in February 1997, and to be completed in November 1997, following a ceremonial groundbreaking early next month. "Completion of the music center will realize the dream of uniting in one facility our daily educational mission with our commitment to public performance," said David Robbins, chair of the music department. "The students, faculty and staff of the music department are grateful to Mary beyond measure."
