## **Men in Service** Write Regarding War Experiences

**250** Alumni in Uniform **Appreciate School Paper** 

From word coming to PLC directly and indirectly, it is certain that no one appreciated the December alumni issue of the Mooring Mast more than did the boys in service. The largest percentage of responses, either letters or contributions, have been from the more than 250 alumni now scattered all over the world who represent PLC in the armed forces.

Of these 250 or so, a recent tabulation showed that about 140 are students who have been leaving PLC directly for service since Pearl Harbor. The others are graduates or ex-students who had been out of school for awhile. Many of the boys whose college careers were interrupted by the war are definitely planning on returning to PLC at their first opportunity.

Writes Capt. Walter Simonson, to faculty member, "I still intend to be a teacher: so when it is all over look for me in the front row of your classes. I'll be the one wearing a green beanie." And Bertil Eklund, sending Christmas greetings from a far-flung outpost says. "One of the things I plan on after the war is over is returning to PLC

He describes their Christmas there, highlighted by services in an old church supposedly built around 1670 by the Spanish. 


