1970 Distinguished Teacher Selected

Dr. Jane Williamson, professor of education, has been selected as PLU's Distinguished Teacher for 1970. She will be honored during a special Awards Day Convocation in Eastvold Auditorium Thursday, May 14, at 9:50 a.m.

Dr. Williamson is the fourth recipient of the award, which is presented annually by the Washington State Automobile Dealer's Association.

The Distinguished Teacher is selected each year, based on a tally of student and faculty recommendations, by a committee composed of former DTA winners, students, academic deans and the two most academically outstanding members of the senior class. This year's senior representatives are Mikkel Thompson and Linda Simundson.

Specializing in the field of human relations and development, Dr. Williamson has been working, not only within the university framework, but in the community and the state, stressing the need for understanding of and concern in these areas.

She has attended and participated in numerous workshops and today is considered one of the leaders in this field.

Her course responsibilities in the school of education graduate program deal primarily with guidance and behavioral studies.

Dr. Williamson received her doctor's degree in education from Colorado State College in 1959, She joined the PLU staff in 1964.

Dr. Philip Nordquist, associate professor of history, will also be honored during Awards Day as the recipient of the Blue Key Service Award, A PLU graduate, he received masters and doctor's degrees in history from the University of Washington and has been a member of the PLU history faculty since 1963.

Two Bach works and one of Manz's own compositions will be among the program features.

Currently chairman of the Division of Fine Arts at Concordia College in Saint Paul, Minn. Dr. Manz's training has included study in Belgium with Flor Peeters and in Germany with Helmut Walcha under a Fulbright Grant.

The recital is made possible by Pacific Lutheran University, with the help of Trinity Lutheran Church and the Tacoma Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. A free-will offering will be received to help meet expenses. A reception for Dr. Manz will follow the recital.

Student, Faculty Musicians Present Unique Bach Program

PLU student and faculty musicians will present "The Musical Offering of J. S. Bach" Tuesday, May 12, in Eastvold Auditorium at 8:15 p.m.

The program is a one-and-a-half hour Bach composition based on a single theme presented to the composer by the king of Prussia. Tuesday's performance includes the entire musical offering with commentary by Prof. David Robbins, the program producer.

The program features unusual lighting and staging effects designed to heighten appreciation of the unique work of art. Performers include PLU music faculty, students and members of the university orchestra.

The first part of the program begins with a trio sonata, performed by Genevieve Baird, flutist; Ann Tremaine, violinist; Vicki King, cellist; and David Dahl, organist. Dahl will play the three voice fugue.

The final portion of the program features the eight canons with colored lights intensifying the effect, followed by orchestra members playing an orchestration of Bach's six-voice fugue, arranged by Anton Webern.

This part of the program features Dahl, Robbins on the vibraphone, cellist Diane Gendusie and trumpeter Thomas Anderson.

The program is complimentary.

Lute Spikers Place Third In Conference Meet Here

Darkhorse Willamette University ran away with the 1970 Northwest Conference Track and Field Championship Saturday as co-favorites Lewis and Clark and Pacific Lutheran looked on in chagrin from second and third place, respectively.

It was the first time in four years and only the third time in 12 years that the Pioneers went home without the title. PLU, the meet host for the first time, was also disappointed after being placed in the favorite role prior to the meet.

Bearcat spikers came through with six first place finishes, three of which were upsets. They also scored consistently in other events where the Lutes and Pioneers were considered favorites.

There were bright spots, however. Phil Tundel took the javelin event with his second best toss of the season. The mile relay team of Neil Martin, Doug Jansen, John Oberg and Frank Wilson, won with the fastest time of the season. PLU's depth in the weights accounted for 17 points in spite of the failures to place first. Distance man Rob Gray erased the school record in the three-mile, finishing second to Lewis and Clark's David Fix, and finished behind Willamette's Ed Wallace in the mile.

The Lutes found plenty to be pleased about. Most of the budding Lute stars, John Oberg, Neil Martin, Dan Pritchard, Glen Higgins, and Scott Fiddes, are freshmen. Only two seniors are on the 1970 squad, 440 man Doug Jansen and weightman Randy Jorgenson, so PLU will be a factor to reckon with for several years to come.

Final team scores: Willamette, 92½; Lewis & Clark, 83; PLU 76; Linfield, 31½; College of Idaho, 25; Pacific, 10; and Whitman, 5.

LUTE PAIR TAKES CONFERENCE TENNIS DOUBLES TITLE

PLU's Mike Linnabary and Dale Trompeter upset Lewis and Clark's defending champions in the quarter finals, then defeated Willamette's second-seeded pair in the finals to win the Northwest Conference tennis doubles title during the conference championship meet at PLU Saturday.

The PLU pair reached the finals by defeating Whitman's Don Phillips and Steve Yose, 6-0, 6-4, then defeated Bruce Love and Ron Rainger of the Bearcats in the finals, 6-4, 6-1.

Mark Menze, Lewis and Clark, successfully defended his singles title with an 11-9, 0-6, 6-2 victory over Love.

Willamette won the team title with six points; PLU and Whitman each had four and Pacific scored three. Linfield and College of Idaho were scoreless.

LUTES NEAR END OF DIAMOND SEASON

Two games, a double header with Lewis and Clark Wednesday, will bring to an end one of the most disappointing baseball seasons in PLU history.

The Lutes dropped a double header to Seattle Pacific Saturday to give them a season mark of 2-21. The Falcons won the first game 7-3 and took the nightcap 7-1.

SPC scored early in both contests, with with four runs off loser Ron Jones in the first two innings of the opener and three runs in the first inning off Dave Bennett in the second game.

Gordy Gunderson leads the Lutes in hitting with a .303 average (.533 in conference play), followed by Ron Toff (.287 and .347). The leading hurler is Doug Nixon with a 1.42 earned run average. Doug Wenk and Dave Bennett have hurled the Lutes' two victories.
