## **PLU Honors Distinguished Alumnus**


A 1945 graduate of Pacific Lutheran University has been selected as the third recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award, presented by the PLU Alumni Association.

Dr. Lloyd M. Nyhus will be honored at the annual alumni banquet Saturday evening in the Columbia Center Dining Hall begining at 6 p. m. A reception in Pflueger Lounge will be held in his honor following the banquet.

Dr. Nyhus has been invited back to the campus as one of the two featured speakers participating in a symposium, "Organ Transplantaion: Blessing or Curse?" held Friday afternoon at 3:30 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel.

The speakers will explore the moral, psychological, legal and medical implications of the issue.

Dr. Nyhus, a native of Mt. Vernon, Wash., is the Warren H. Cole Professor of Surgery and head of the department of surgery at the University of Illinois College of Medicine. He served on the University of Washington School of Medicine faculty from 1954-1967. He is internationally recognized for his work in surgery of the stomach and duodenum.

Two Pacific Lutheran University faculty members were elected to national boards of the American Lutheran Church at the ALC's biennial convention in Omaha, Neb., this week.

Dr. John Schiller, chairman of the department of sociology, was elected to a three-year term on the board of social service.

### NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIPS FOR 1969-70

Each year the National Research Council advises the National Science Foundation on the selection of candidates for certain of the Foundation's programs of graduate and postdoctoral fellowships. Panels of prominent scientists are appointed by the Research Council to recommend candidates to the Foundation after a careful review of each applicant's qualifications. In 1968, of a total of 9,400 applicants, 2,045 extremely well-qualified candidates were selected for awards in both programs.

Fellowships are offered again this year for advance study in the basic and applied sciences, the social sciences and in the history and philosophy of science. Awards will not be made in clinical, education, or business fields. College seniors, graduate students in a degree program, and persons interested in postdoctoral research are eligible to apply.

# Knights Ramble To 40-0 UBC Win

October was Pacific Lutheran's month of 'frustration, but the hex finally was broken Saturday as the Knights exploded for a 40-0 victory over University of British Columbia's T-Birds.

On October 5, a two-touchdown lead evaporated at College of Idaho and the Knights had to settle for a 20-20 tie. The next week they matched powerful Lewis and Clark play for play in the mud but ended up on the short end of a 6-0 score. Two weeks ago they held previously undefeated Linfield to a 7-7 standoff.

They clicked in Vancouver. On their second offensive play they scored, Gary Hammer sweeping right for 57 yards. Near the end of the quarter Jack Irion intercepted a UBC pass on the host's 32. Hammer gained 17; a penalty against UBC and two plunges put the ball on the one. Bob Lovell faked beautifully and was all alone on a keeper to the left as he trotted into the end zone. Score: 13-0.

The second quarter was more of the same. PLU took over on the UBC 44 and scored in eight plays with Lovell scoring from the 14. With 40 seconds left, Mike Murphy took a Lovell pass from the 13, the third play after Doug Jansen intercepted a UBC pass on the 36. Score: 26-0.

After Vic Eaton scored on a 27-yard pass from Lovell early in the third quarter, Coach Roy Carlson began using his bench extensively. The final score came late in the fourth quarter as Jansen again intercepted a UBC pass and sped 68 yards for the score.

Dave Halstead and Gary Hammer again led the PLU offense. Hammer gained 126 yards on eight carries, giving him 381 yards for the season, which should be good enough for third place in the conference. He was fifth going into the contest.

Halstead picked up 81 yards in 15 carries, but had some 40 yards nullified by penalties. His total of 486 yards is


tops in the NWC. With three games left, the Hillsboro sophomore has an excellent chance to break the all-time PLU rushing mark of 695 yards, set by John Fromm in 1955. With 103 total carries, he could eclipse Fromm's mark of 150.

Speaking of records, Knight end Vic Eaton is no longer in the N C record book. His mark of 12 pass receptions in a game, which he held along with several others, was topped Saturday by Gib Gilmore of Willamette who snagged 13 in the Salem club's win over College of Idaho 47-18.

Doug Jansen, who grabbed his second and third interceptions of the season, came within seven yards of a school record with his 68-yard touchdown return in the fourth quarter. Marv Harshman set the mark in 1939 with a 75-yard scoring interception return against Oregon College.

Neil Bryant, defensive end, was in on 10 tackles at UBC to lead the PLU defense and gain Lineman of the Week honors. Hammer was named Back of the Week.
