Grievance policy orientation dates set

The University Grievance Policy is a tool used by PLU to resolve internal disputes. The policy has been revised by the University Grievance Committee with input from student, staff and faculty bodies. The new policy covers all grievances except grade disputes, academic dishonesty, student conduct issues covered by the Student Code of Conduct, faculty tenure and discipline, or other issues covered in the Faculty Constitution Bylaws. The plan outlines grievance steps and time periods for the steps' completion. The grievance committee will hold orientation sessions to aid in understanding the policy from 1 to 2 pm on April 9 in CK West and from 4 to 5 pm on April 14 in the CK. Supervisors are encouraged to attend. Further dialogue with the university community about the issue will take place in fall.
