War spurs Christians to daily repentance, to humility, and to greater efforts for God and country. "In God we trust." It is in this spirit that we gratefully report progress as indicated below.

1. Contrary to our expectations, the student enrollment at Pacific Lutheran College, for the sixteenth successive year, shows an increase, despite the unavoidable falling off in the second semester. Last year's total was 523; this year's, to date, is 535.

2. On February 3, 1942, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees voted, "because of the demands of the war emergency," to recommend "that the Board of Trustees grant the B. A. degree in Liberal Arts in the spring of 1942." Approved as a four-year College of Education in 1940, Pacific Lutheran College will, when this recommendation is adopted by the Board of Trustees, also become a four-year College of Liberal Arts.

3. The College will revise and expand its Summer Session offerings in such a way as to effectuate its promise to high school graduates: "If you enroll now and can continue college without interruption, it is possible to earn your B. A. degree in three years (and possibly less) by attending the regular sessions and summer sessions." The College is also in position to expand its offerings in the High School Division to offset withdrawals in the upper years of college, if war-time needs make such shift of emphasis necessary or desirable.

4. Because of war-time need, the College for the first time in years is soliciting the renewed or continued support of all who have ever given a dollar or more to the Development Association, in harmony with the published appeal of the Director of Education of our Church: "No sacrifices that Christians, members of our Church, can make offer a promise of more lasting blessings than the sacrifices made in the interest of our Christian colleges. It is through these institutions that we as a Church in the present crisis may expect to make our greatest contribution to the advancement of God's Kingdom, to the support of our country's war effort, to the establishment of a permanent peace, to the rebuilding of a world-wide Christian civilization, bringing freedom and happiness to all."

5. Payments on endowment pledges of 1927 are still coming in; library building pledges of 1936 are still being paid up; and the Golden Jubilee Campaign in its preliminary phases is prayerfully getting under way. *Soli Deo gloria!* "For God and country" let us try to do our full duty day by day!

PAID-UP LIBRARY PLEDGES List No. 2

The first list of paid-up library pledges, published as of February 29, 1940, made public the names of the donors of 1,888 paid-up pledges to the Pacific Lutheran College Library Building.

In the subjoined list the College gratefully acknowledges the full payment of 231 additional pledges, which bring the total number of fully paid-up pledges to 2,119.

The total amount of these 2,119 fully paid-up pledges is \$80,554.77. Partial payments on additional pledges total \$5,514.06, increasing the total sum received for this project up to and including February 5, 1942, to \$86,068.83.

It is estimated that the College needs an additional \$20,000 to complete the building, which has been in partial use since May 1, 1939. The completion of the building is one of the four main objectives of the Golden Jubilee Campaign, now in progress. The College respectfully and earnestly solicits the continued cooperation of its friends in this necessary enterprise.

PACIFIC LUTHERAN COLLEGE FACES NATIONAL DEFENSE

(From *The Golden Jubilee Bulletin*, February 2, 1942)

For almost fifty years the College has contributed to American life by training Christian home-makers—defenders of American civilization at its source. Of late years it has furnished the public schools with hundreds of fine teachers, Christian men and women who have helped influence the youth in the direction of the right kind of citizenship. Thus, in a very real sense, has the College been engaged in National Defense.

Now These Defenses Are Threatened

With ninety percent of the world engaged in a death struggle between paganism and Christian civilization, the inner spiritual defenses of our land are threatened as never before. The current war is not simply a war interested in material destruction—grave as the threat of such destruction is—but it is interested in the substitution of a new way of life, the heathen, materialistic, autocratic way of ultimate destruction. **AND, UNLESS WE CAN NOW FIGHT TO PRESERVE A CHRISTIAN AMERICA, THE FIGHT ITSELF WILL NOT BE WORTH WHILE.**

A Twofold Duty Faces Us

As Christian citizens we are, therefore, faced with a twofold duty: TO PRESERVE CHRISTIANITY, and TO PRESERVE THE KIND OF A STATE IN WHICH CHRISTIANITY MAY FLOURISH.

Intelligent Planning Is Urgent

Courage and vision are at a premium these days because all matters of defense are URGENT.

The forward look which the approach of the Golden Jubilee Year 1944 stimulated has already become focused in well-laid plans for a major effort to build a GREATER P. L. C. to serve the young people of the Second Half Century.

What Is The Golden Jubilee Campaign?

It is an effort to raise at least \$150,000 net for Pacific Lutheran College by asking every member of every congregation in the Pacific District to give as much in cash or pledges as possible by Pentecost 1942, and to ask as many generous people as we can find inside and outside the District to give gifts of \$500 or more each in the *Big Gifts Campaign*, which is already under way.

What Will Be Done With The Money Raised?

The money raised will be used for four purposes:

- To pay some of the College's most troublesome debts, and to provide, in general, greater financial stability.
- To build a new Girls' Dormitory and heating plant as soon as conditions permit.
- To complete the library building, by providing it with needed steel stacks for the books, finishing the inside walls, floors, etc., and putting on other finishing touches—all as soon as practicable.
- To equip the newly purchased Beckendorf Residence with hospital beds and other equipment so it may be used as an infirmary for students who may be ill.

A Slogan Outmoded

In World War No. 1 we became familiar with the slogan, "Give till it hurts." Let that slogan be outmoded! Do not give till it hurts; give past the point of hurt until you reach the deep-hidden point of inner satisfaction that comes from having done your utmost for the ultimate welfare of your fellow Christian of the rising generation. . . . If that be "high pressure," so be it!
