Her work with children and young people was extensive, and as the executive aide, she had served on social service boards and in an office of many church organizations.

# "The Stairway of Learning"

**W**isdom is the principal thing: therefore, get wisdom: and with all thy getting get understanding." — Proverbs 4:7.

We are celebrating our sixtieth anniversary as an institution of learning. It gives me a great deal of pleasure to greet the faculty and student body and the Class of 1954.

Innumerable events and decades have prepared for this historic event. The fleeting feet of time have made many strides before they brought so much distinction to this beautiful campus.

We look back to the beginning of Pacific Lutheran College, and, almost impatiently, we think on the slowness with which we have made our progress. But wait—the great Library of Congress waited 1500 years after Christ's birth before it started, and then an additional 97 years before it was completed in 1897. But it is not yet finished, nor will it ever cease to grow as long as human life and reason are left among men on the earth. Indeed, in comparison, the great achievements of the past have been snail-like in their time of accomplishments when compared with the speed which has been given to civilization on this great west coast during the past ten decades.

The stairway to this sixtieth anniversary has been long and winding. Courage was first clad in lion's pelt, equipped with shield and studded war club. Valor, fortitude, and achievement were first in the armor of victorious troops. Look down the stairway as far as you can and you will see on the steps thereof the hunter, vintager, farmer, fisherman, soldier, mechanic, cook, gardener, entomologist, student, printer, chemist, musician, physician, electrician, astronomer, and, most of all, the Man of Galilee on an "Old Rugged Cross."

In the short space of a college career, the ambitious student sweeps through the ages, down into the bowels of the earth, and up into the spheres, and thus adds millenniums to his intellectual and spiritual stature.

If this nation shall survive, it will be because of institutions like this, with the Bible at the center of all learning. Without this, the factory chimneys will become smokeless in the distance; anarchy, despotism, totalitarianism, and such isms will clutch the cup of madness, and will be the presiding satanic power amid the wreck and ruin of human civilization. These monsters of madness will then rest one terrible foot upon the downfallen arch of the state, and the other upon religion, learning, art, and freedom.

The stairway of learning starts way down in the bottom of human depravity. It starts there because man fell as far from the heights as he could fall. Purely human learning can never lead man higher than himself, even with the help of all libraries.

We have built this college during 60 years around a library with the Holy Bible at the center. We charge the faculty, now and always, with the responsibility to make plain to every student that ever crosses this threshold that the learned lumber in man's books will only add fuel to the flames of hell if the saving knowledge found by faith in the Holy Bible is left out of the curriculum upon this Stairway of Learning. With the sacred knowledge found in the Bible we make our way up the Stairway of Learning which leads from this world of dying men into eternal life with God.

Reverend Herbert G. Loddigs

Throughout the week of February 7 to 12 Reverend Herbert G. Loddigs of Concordia Lutheran Church, Los Angeles, California, described life in a prison camp, and how unbearable it could have been without a reassuring faith in Christ. A dynamic speaker, Rev. Loddigs spoke daily in chapel, conducted evening services in the CMS, counseled with the students privately, led the evening devotions in the dormitories, and to conclude the week, gave a lecture on marriage and marriage counseling.

From 1945 to 1945 Pastor and Mrs. Loddigs were Japanese prisoners in the Philippine Islands. Following their liberation they went to the interior of China, only to be forced to flee the Chinese Communists.

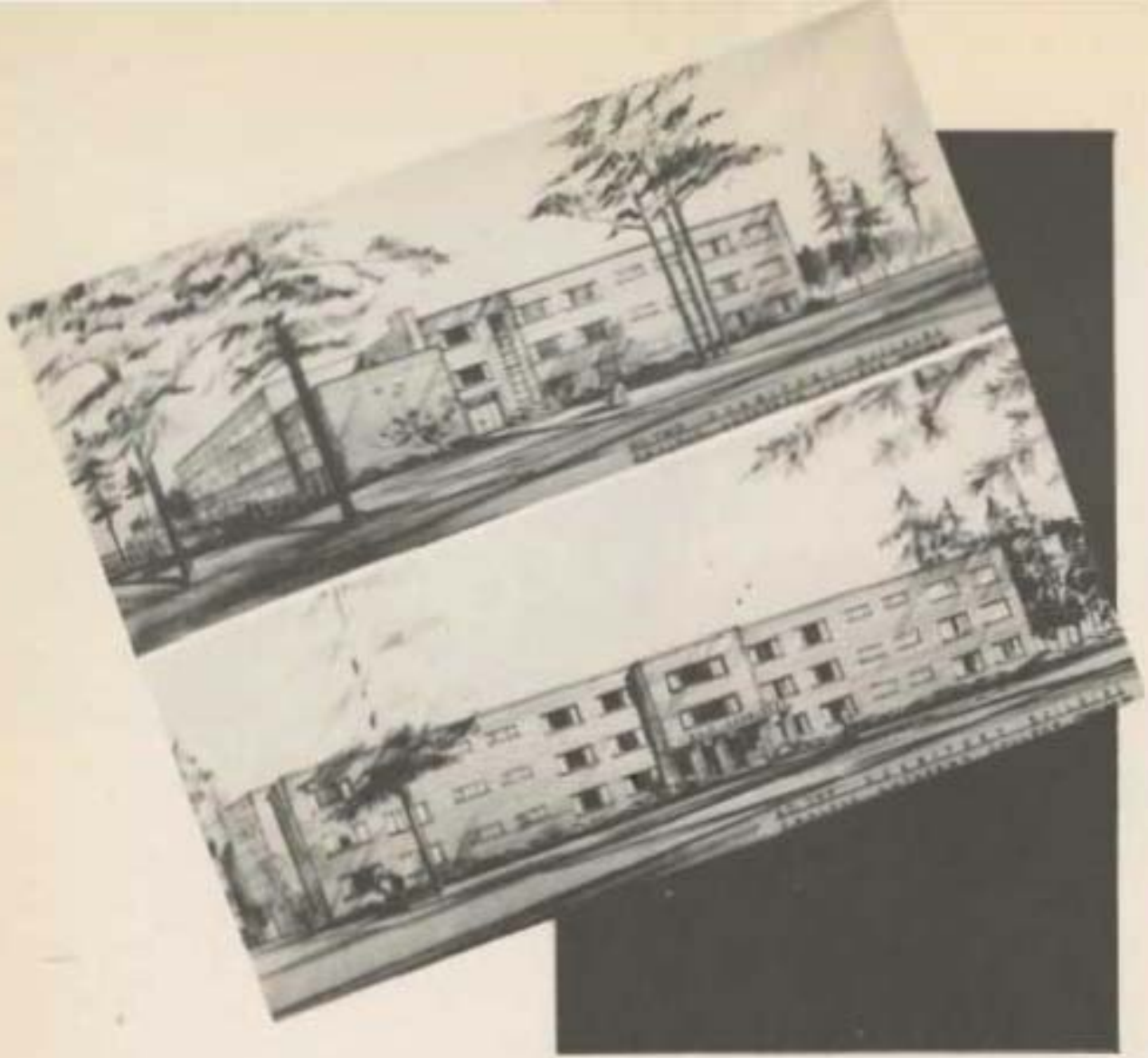

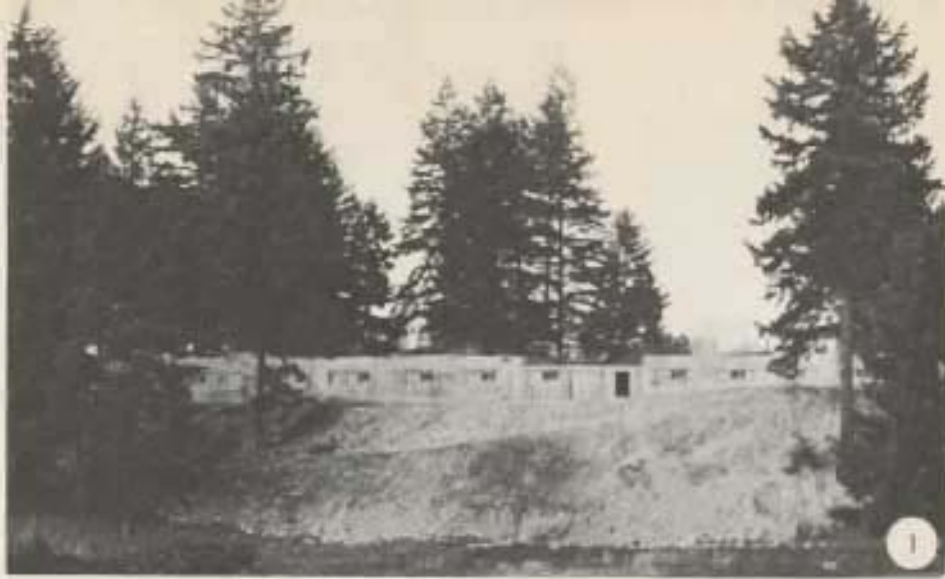

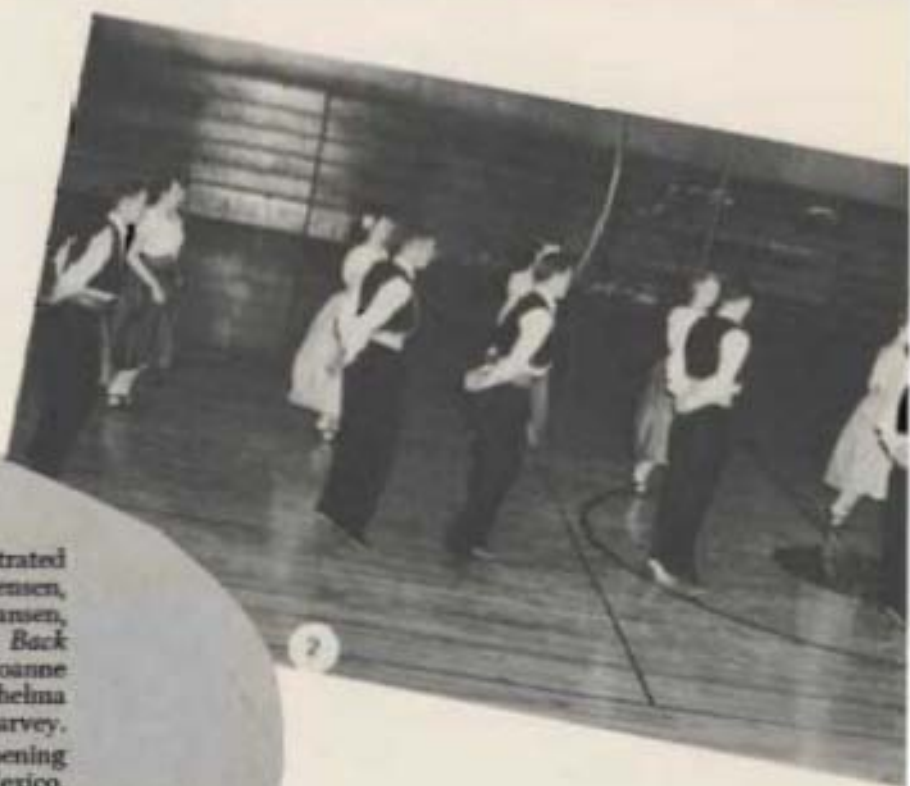

The Third Annual Festival of Music and Drama was held on the campus of Pacific Lutheran College May 6, 7, and 8, 1954.

Thursday evening's concert by the famed Polish born pianist, Jakob Gimpel, opened the festival. Something a little different Friday afternoon was the "Afternoon with Luise Rainer and Jakob Gimpel." Completely impromptu, they chatted amiably about music, art, drama, the stage, and presented a few piano selections and interpretative readings. Maxwell Anderson's "Joan of Lorraine," with Miss Rainer in the title role, supported by a twenty-two member student cast, was given Friday evening. The Seattle Symphony Orchestra, Dr. Stanley Chapple conductor, presented two concerts on Saturday. The matinee performance included a symphonic program, plus the festival chorus, singing the coronation scene from "Boris Godounov" by Moussorgsky. Perhaps the most impressive concert of the entire festival was Saturday evening when the 125-voice chorus, with the symphony and soloists, presented Mendelssohn's "Hymn of Praise."

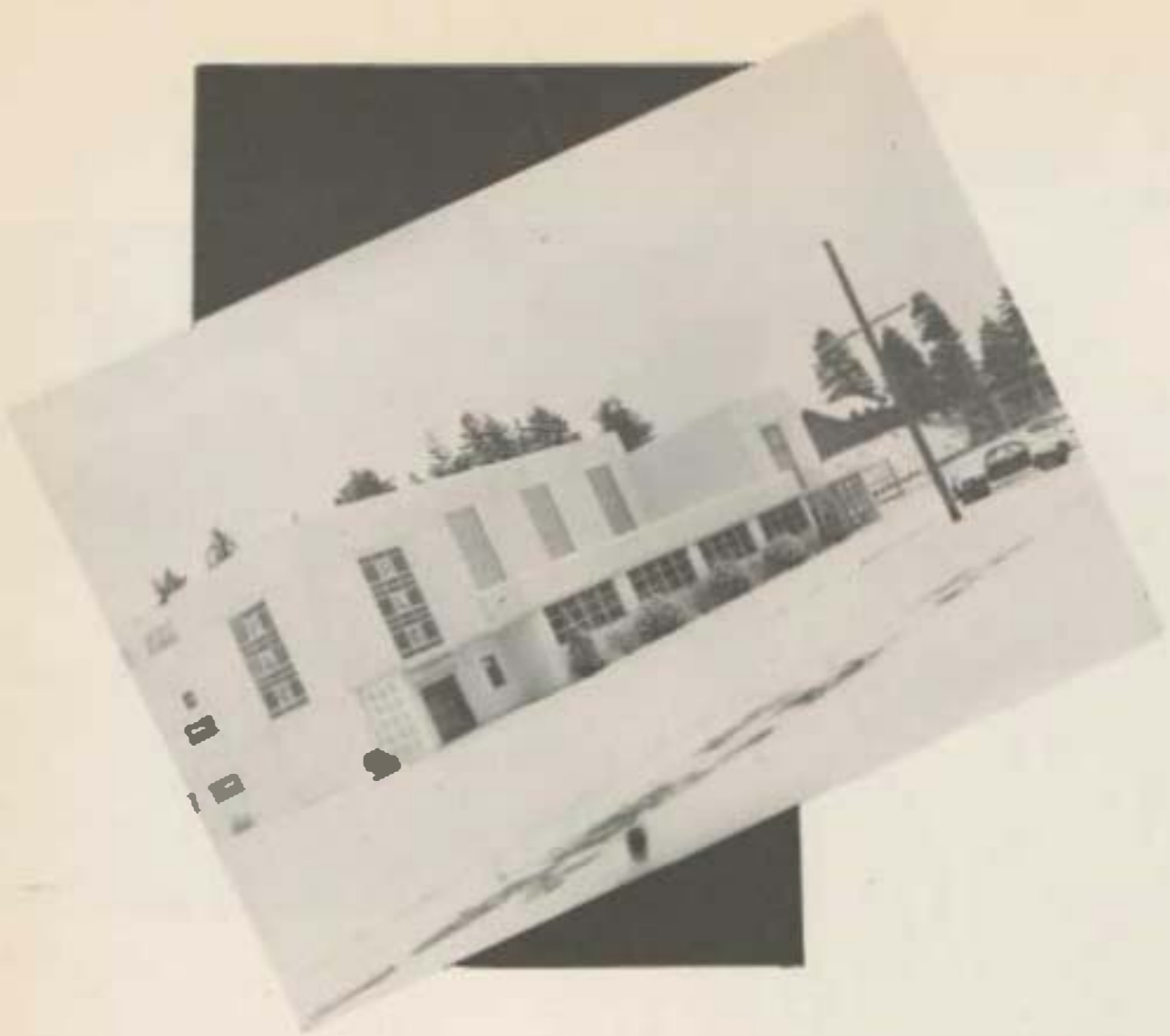

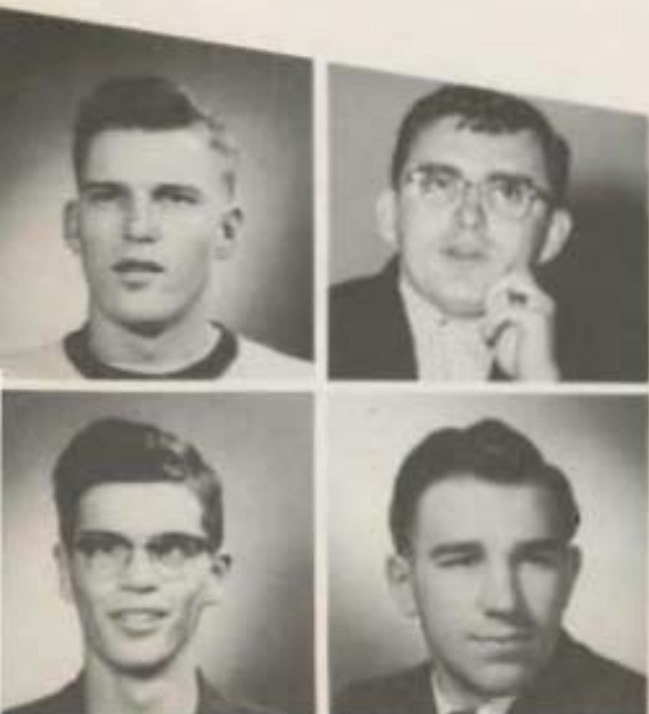
# Football

Starting out the 1953 grid campaign with three losses to Humboldt State, the College of Puget Sound, and Western Washington, the Pacific Lutheran College Gladiators came back to finish out the season with a three won-six lost record, placing fourth in the Evergreen Conference play.

Led by co-captains Jim Ball and Doug McGrath, and ably assisted by half-back Ron Billings, once again chosen for the Little All-American team, the Lutes took three out of six in the conference. Two of the three losses were heartbreakers as the difference between victory and defeat was but a single point.

Under the guidance of head coach Marv Harshman and assistant coaches Mark Salzman, Art Swanson, and Ole Magnuson, the Lutes provided the fans with many a thrill, definitely the most outstanding being the final minutes of the Whitworth game, when the highly favored Pirates were upset by the never-say-die Glads, 7-6. This loss forced the Pirates to settle for a tie in the conference championship with the CPS Loggers, who drubbed the men from Parkland in the final game of the season, 27-0, forcing the Lutes to relinquish the highly coveted Totem Pole Trophy to the cross-town rivals.

New to football circles this year was the limited substitution rule which allowed a player to enter the game only at designated points. Players who often before played only on defense or offense were now required to master both.

Opening the 1953 season against the Humboldt Staters from Arcata, California, at Lincoln Bowl, the Lutes lost the first game of the season, coming out on the short end of a 7-0 score.

PLC didn't waste any time in getting rolling in the game. Taking the ball, they marched 60 yards from their own 27 to the Humboldt 13 before the Lumberjack defense stiffened. The long gainer in the drive was a 25-yard pass from Karwoski to Billings.

In the third quarter an intercepted pass set up what proved to be the only score in the game. Frank Karwoski rushed hard deep in his own territory, threw the ball hurriedly into the flat where it was picked off and returned by a Lumberjack defender to the Lute 9-yard line. A few plays later, on a short pass, Humboldt scored and converted for the final tally. This was the only time the Staters got within the 30-yard line of the Gladiators.

The game was almost a defense struggle throughout. The Lutes had 97 yards rushing, while Humboldt made 53 yards through the air and PLC 52 yards.

Taking advantage of several Lute fumbles and misplays, the College of Puget Sound scored a 20-0 victory over the Gladiators on the CPS field in the King's X game, the annual non-conference affair between the two cross-town rivals.

Actually the game was a lot closer than the score would indicate. It was only after CPS held a 13-0 lead that the Loggers staged the game's only long and sustained touchdown drive, a 70-yard march which ended a minute before the final gun.

The first half was scoreless with PLC actually dominating play as is indicated by five first downs piled up by the Glads compared to none for the Heinrich men. The tables turned in the second half though, and aided by a pair of pass interceptions and a partially blocked punt, in the fourth.

The Lutes only sustained drive was to the Logger 32-yard line, but a fumble at that point erased the chance for a score.

Standouts for the Glads were tackle Bill Borden and quarterback Frank Karwoski who made a sensational save in kicking a punt when the ball was hiked over his head.

Coach Mary Harshman chalked off another year as basketball mentor at PLC by bringing his team to the number two spot in the Evergreen Conference with an 8-4 record. In the Washington State NAIA Tournament the Lutes bumped the Gonzaga Bulldogs, but missed the trip to the national finals in Kansas City by losing to the Whitworth Pirates.

Paced by center Garnet Lund, who was high scorer for the season with 347 points, the Lutes amassed a total of 18 wins against 10 losses. Only four of these set-backs came on the local maples and these were to Seattle U., CPS, and two to the champions—Whitworth.

To add to their records, the Lutes took the city championship for the fourth straight year. In the first meeting between PLC and CPS the Loggers fell 72-61, but they were soon to avenge this with a slim 65-64 victory over the Parklanders. Then in the deciding clash on the Logger court, the Lutes smuck by their arch rivals, triumphing 80-77 in a double over-time.

Three seniors will be lost by graduation—center Garnet Lund, forward Bob Ross, and guard Ron Billings. Lund and Ross were the two top scorers on the team with 347 and 310 points respectively, and will be long remembered for their fine work under the boards. Billings showed fine, especially on defense, many times stealing the ball from the opposing team and encouraging the fans with his never-say-die hustle.

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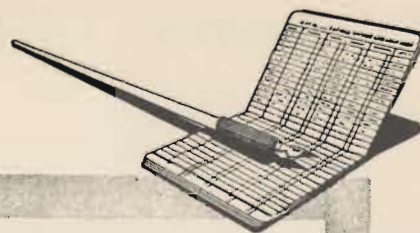
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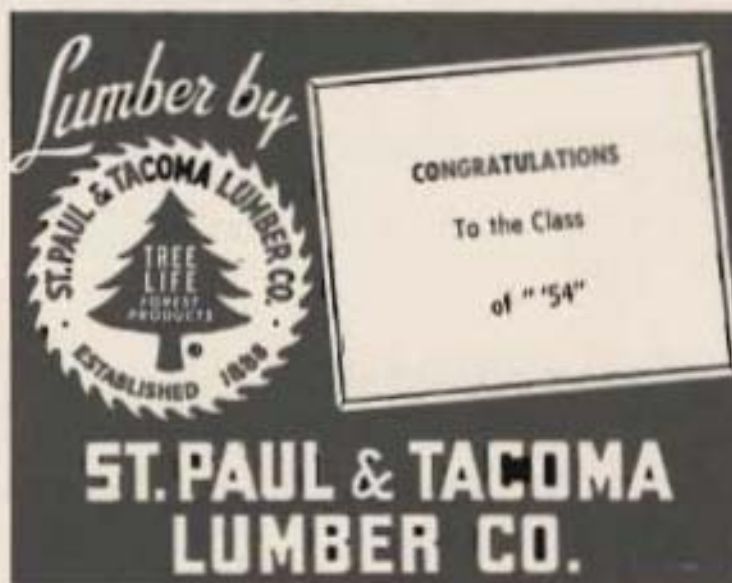
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
