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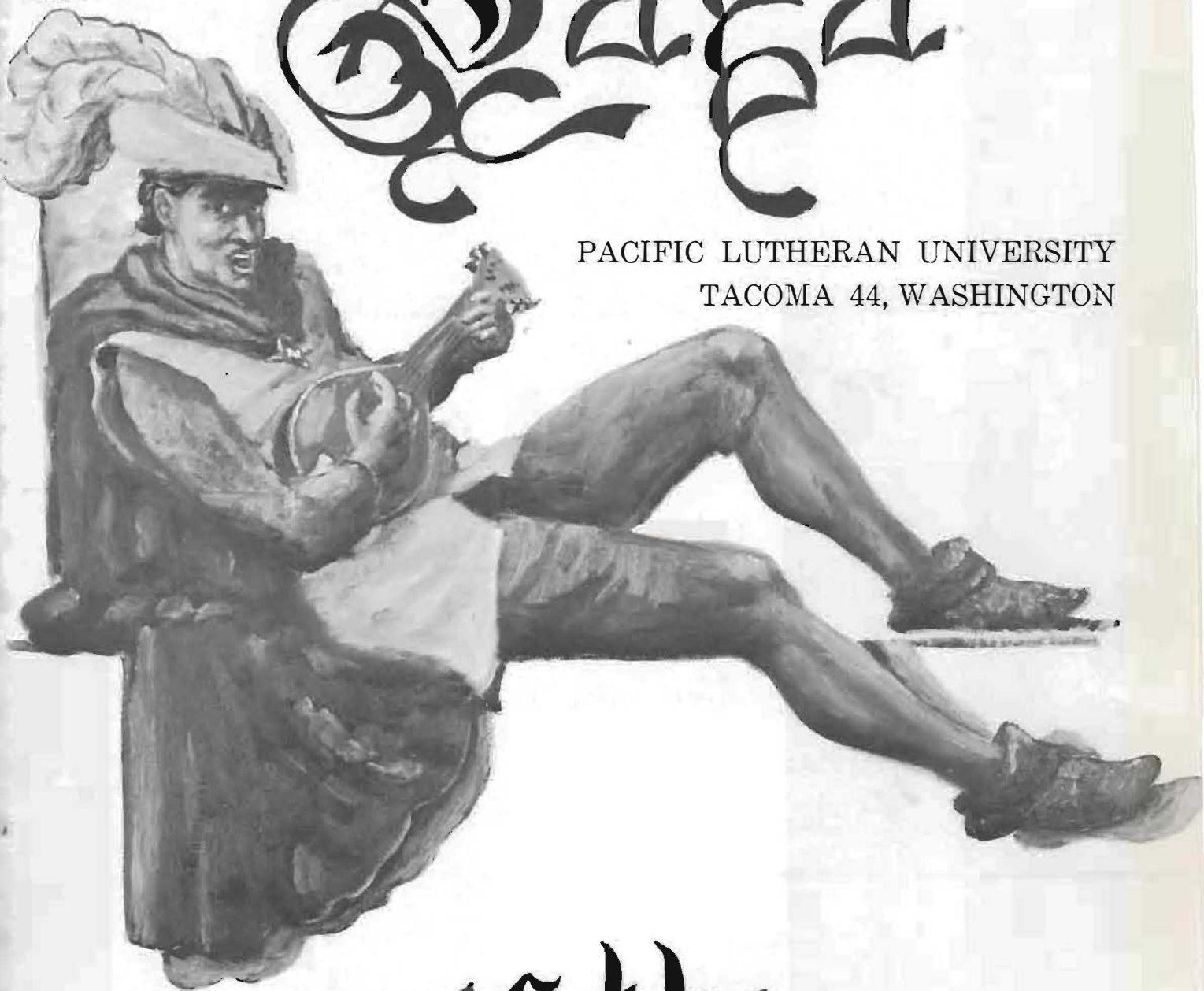

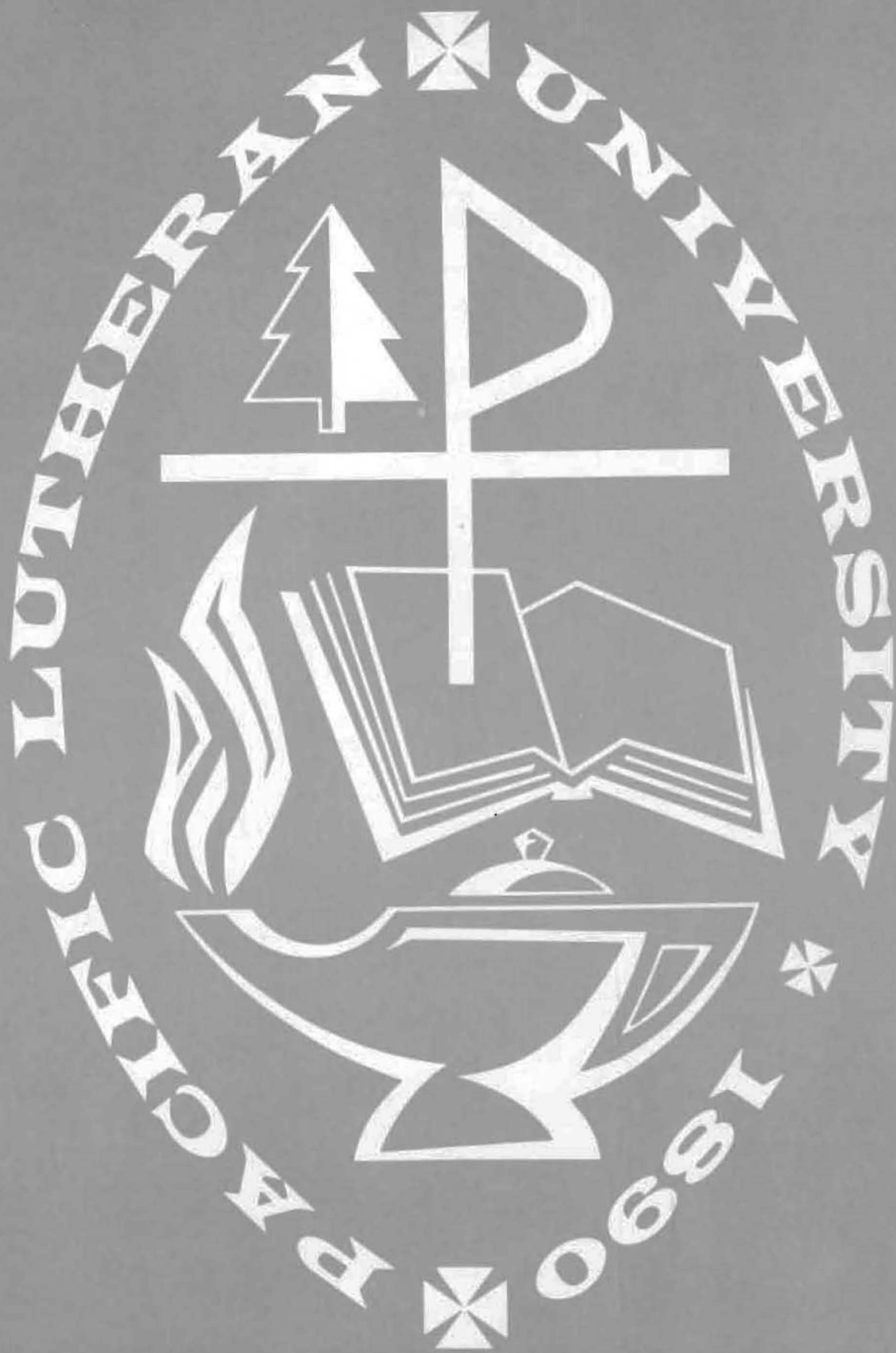

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Foreword

In this seventieth year of Pacific Lutheran's history, many changes came to our campus. The goal of University status for which courageous men of vision and faith had so diligently worked was realized as Pacific Lutheran College became Pacific Lutheran University. The beautiful, well-equipped Tacoma-Pierce Administration Building was dedicated. The University's athletic teams went forth to their collegiate wars under the banner of Knights as the Gladiator nickname died with PLC.

To capture the flavor of this great year, the SAGA chose to feature the new PLU Knight, symbolic of the Renaissance period of relearning and emblematic of the University's goal to educate Christian men and women for service to God and man.

The new University Seal was also chosen to further illustrate the University Year theme as the design incorporates elements which symbolize the University's heritage and function. The elliptical shape, adapted from the style of the seal of The American Lutheran Church symbolizes the close relationship between the University and the Church, which owns and encompasses the school. The ellipse is an ancient Christian sign which indicates the relationship between God and man. The name of the institution and the date of its founding are appropriately placed along the border. Central to the design is the ancient "Chi Rho," a sign designating Jesus as The Christ, and drawn from the cross of Calvary. The "Chi Rho" is planted in the book, which stands both for the Bible and for the chief tool of the student. The lamp of learning is traditional in the Western Civilization which is our heritage, and symbolizes man's search for free knowledge and wisdom. The flame of the lamp illuminates the book. The Evergreen tree, perhaps the greatest natural resource of the Pacific Northwest, ties the University to its locale, and is symbolic of the abundance of the natural surroundings, as well as man's dependence upon it.

Much is new, much remains, and it was the sincere desire of the staff of the 1961 SAGA to capture this "University Year" and record it for you on the pages of this book. May this 1961 SAGA be a credit to the students of a beloved institution . . . Pacific Lutheran University.

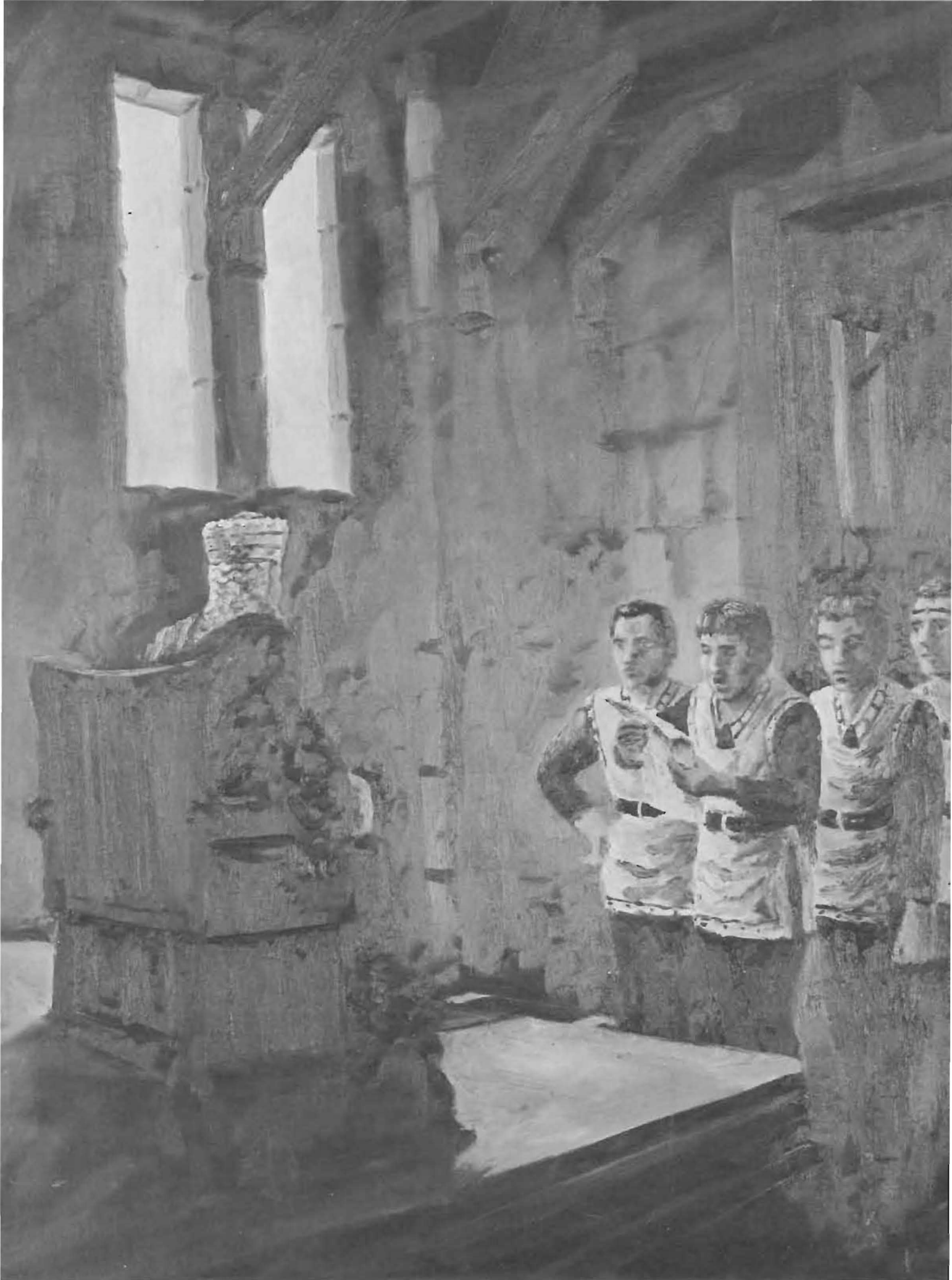

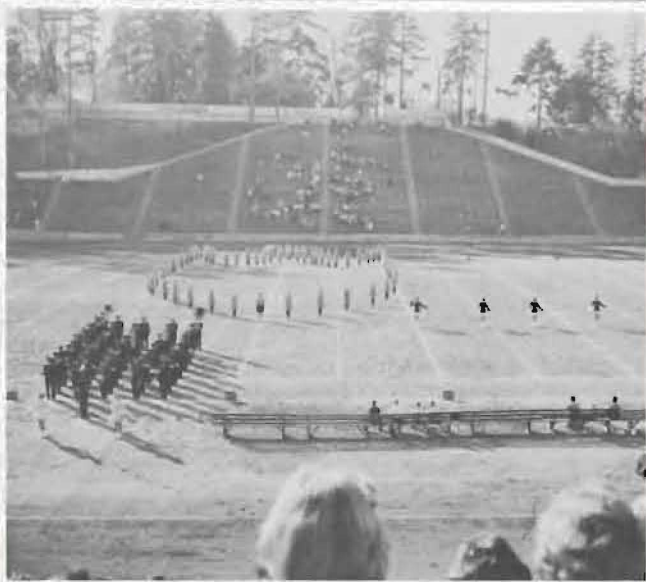
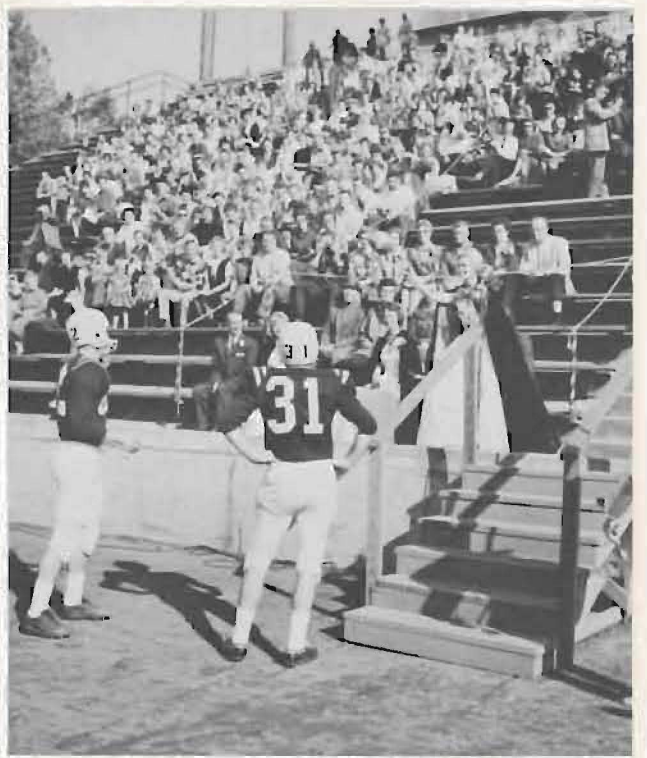




POWDER-PUFF GAME

University year activities sped past quickly, and spring found PLU students in the usual flurry before final exams.

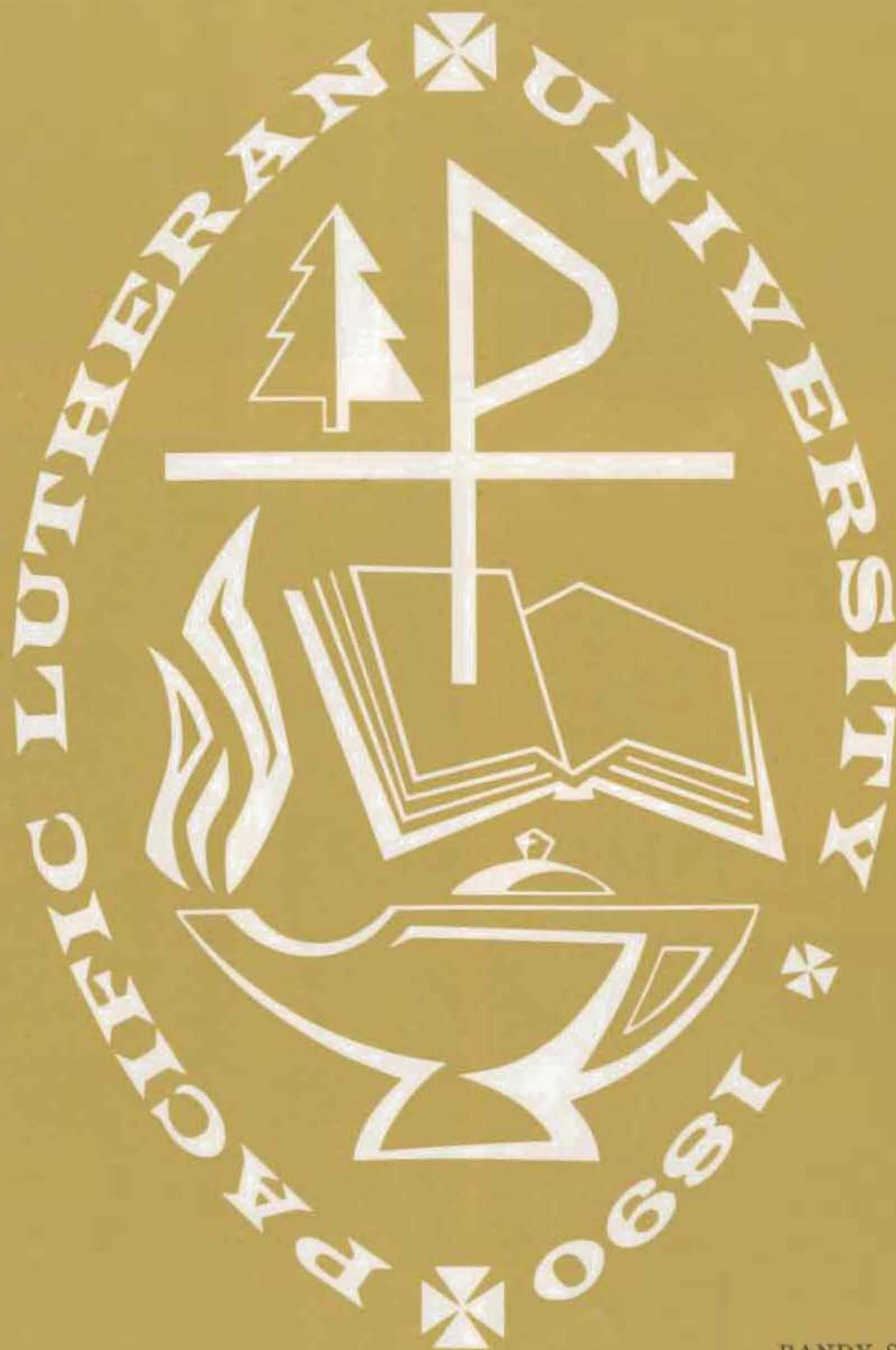
The Spring AWS Awards program brought happy tidings to many returning women students, as scholarships were announced, Tassels pinned, and Spurs tapped.

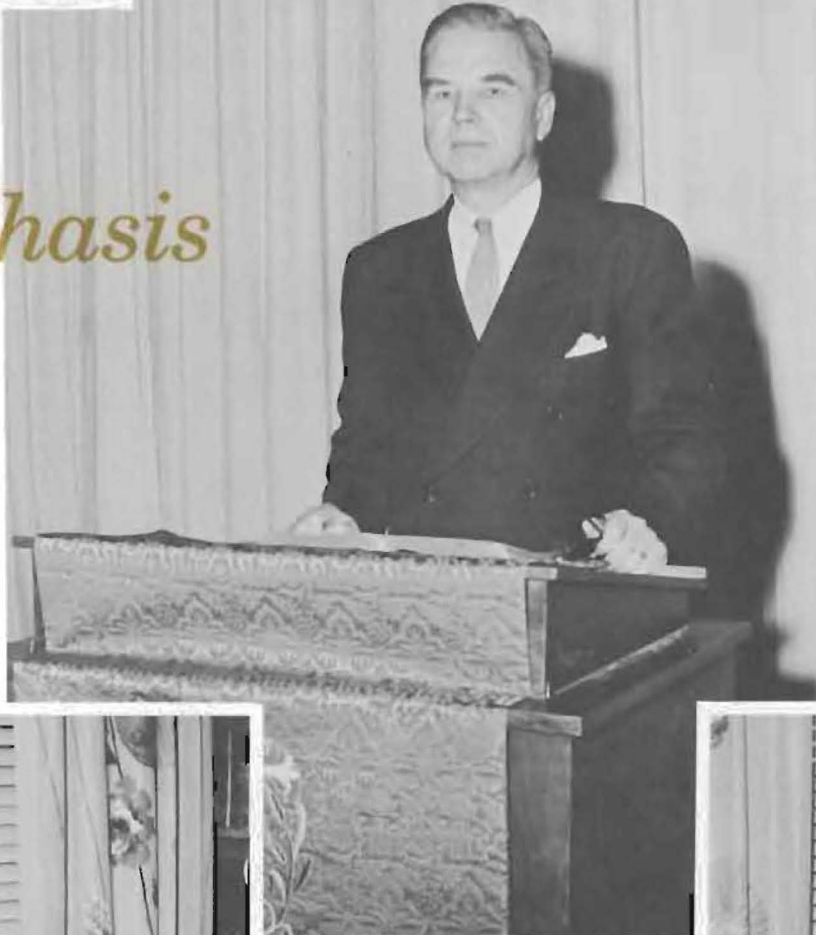

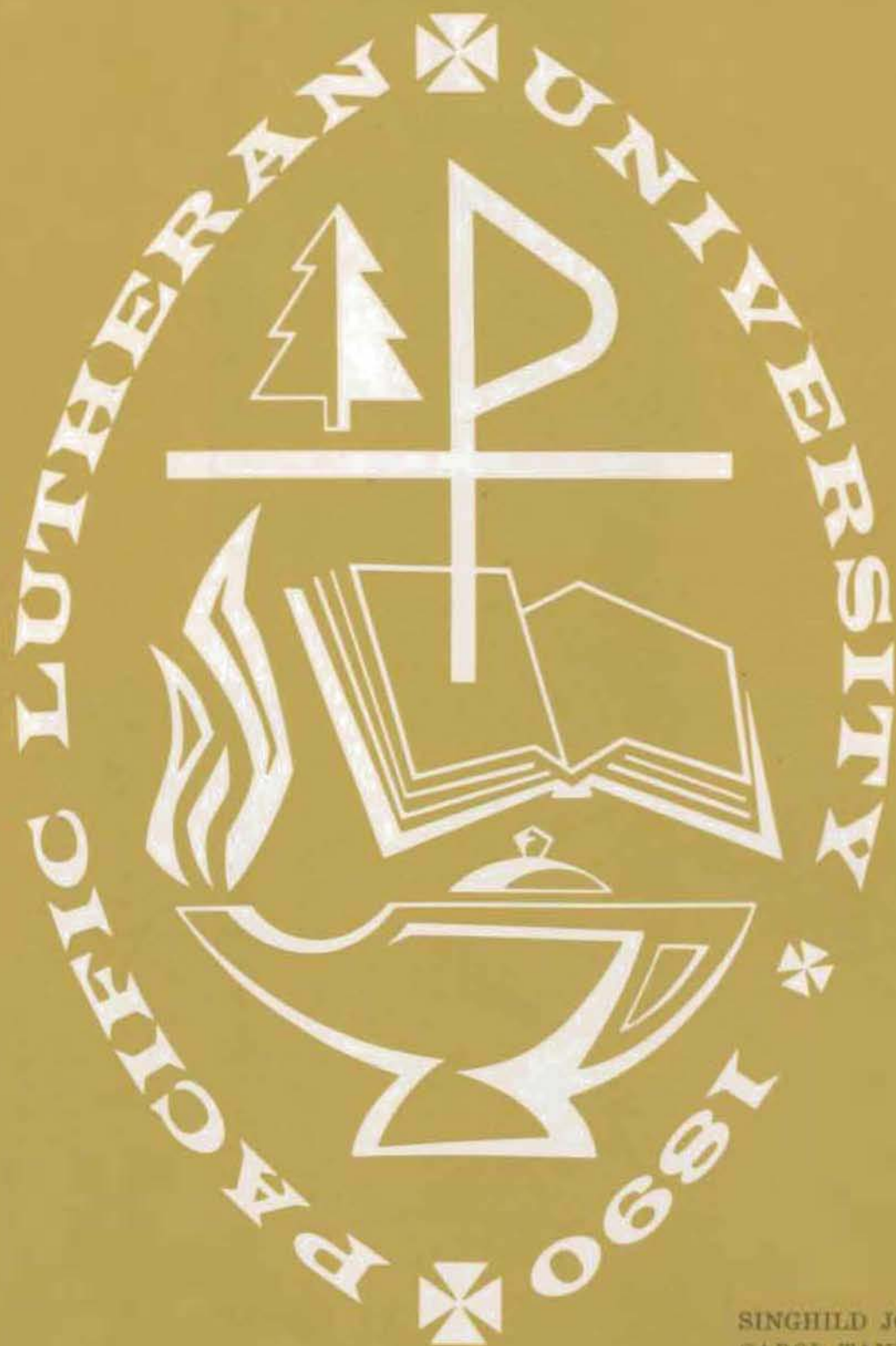

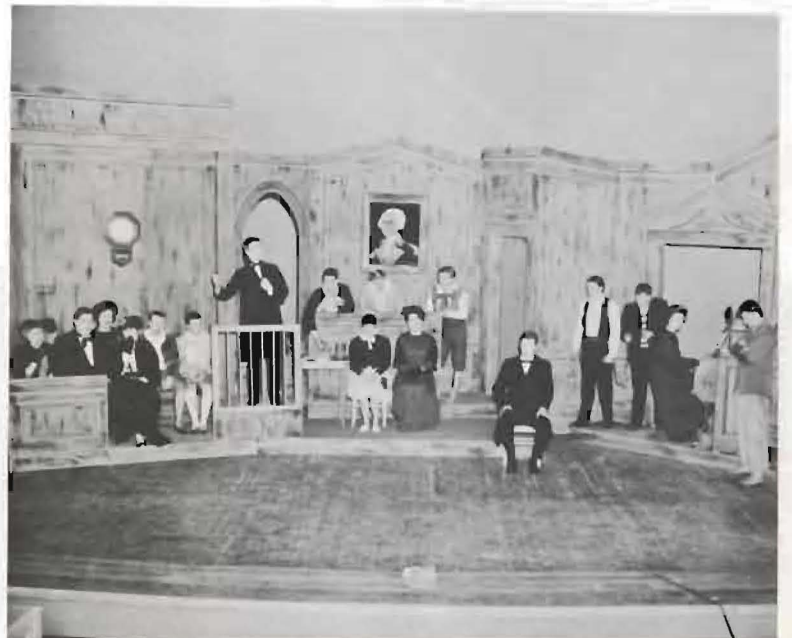

The forensic squad finished the 1960-61 season with a total of 16 first places won during the year by seven of the squad members. Also garnered were 19 second and 22 third place honors during a season which saw P.L.U. debaters traveling from Oregon to Oklahoma in the course of attending six major tournaments.

The Western Speech Association Tournament was held in Corvallis, Oregon, during November where P.L.U. competed with 58 other colleges and universities from the 13 western states. Local tournaments attended included those held at Seattle Pacific College, the University of Puget Sound and P.L.U.'s own fall Practice Tournament. The Tournament of Champions held at Linfield College in Oregon saw P.L.U. placing high in both senior and junior division Sweepstakes ratings with students entered in Lincoln-Douglas (1-man) and Oxford (2-man) Debate plus the many individual events such as Oratory, Impromptu and Extempore speaking but also variety events such as Salesmanship, Interview and Radio Speaking.

The highlight of the season was the final tournament held in Stillwater, Oklahoma, which seven Pi Kappa Delta members attended. It was the bi-annual national Pi Kappa Delta Tournament and Convention which was attended by 148 colleges and universities from all over the United States. The P.L.U. squad made a fine showing, the woman's squad receiving a rating of Superior (the highest rating) and the men's squad receiving a rating of excellent.

Losing only two senior members this year, the squad looks forward to a full and successful 1961-62 forensic season.

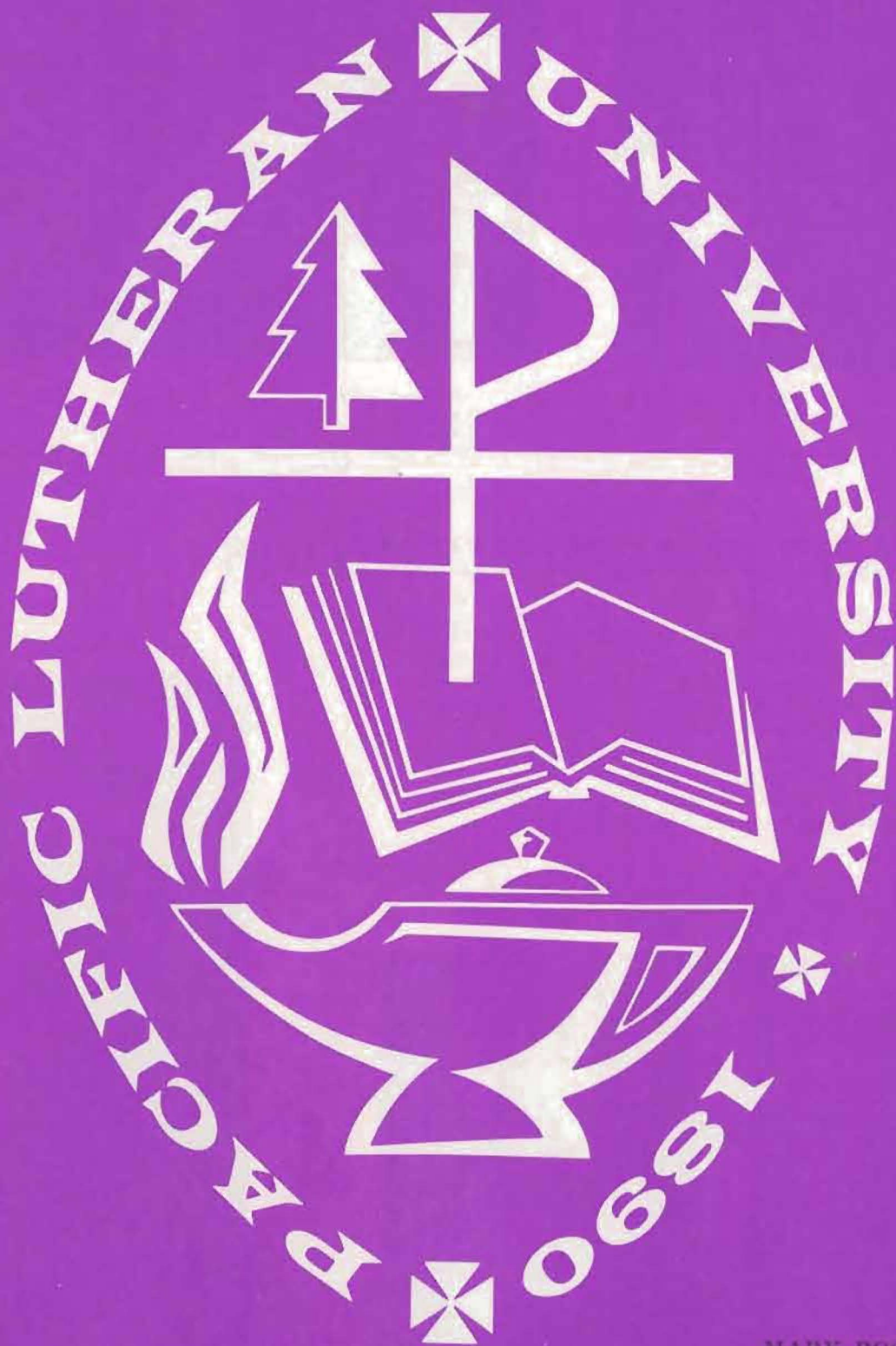

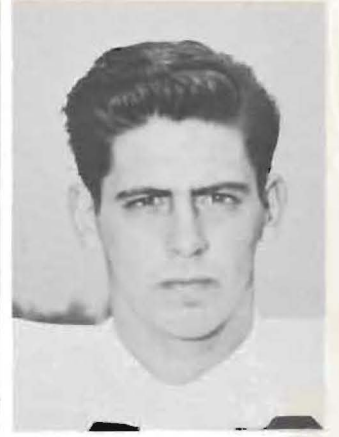

BOTTOM: White-clad defenders pursue All-Evergreen Conference halfback, Bruce Alexander, pivoting to avoid final tackler.

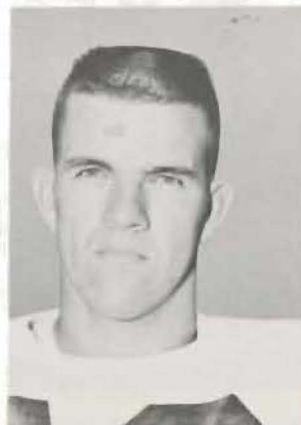


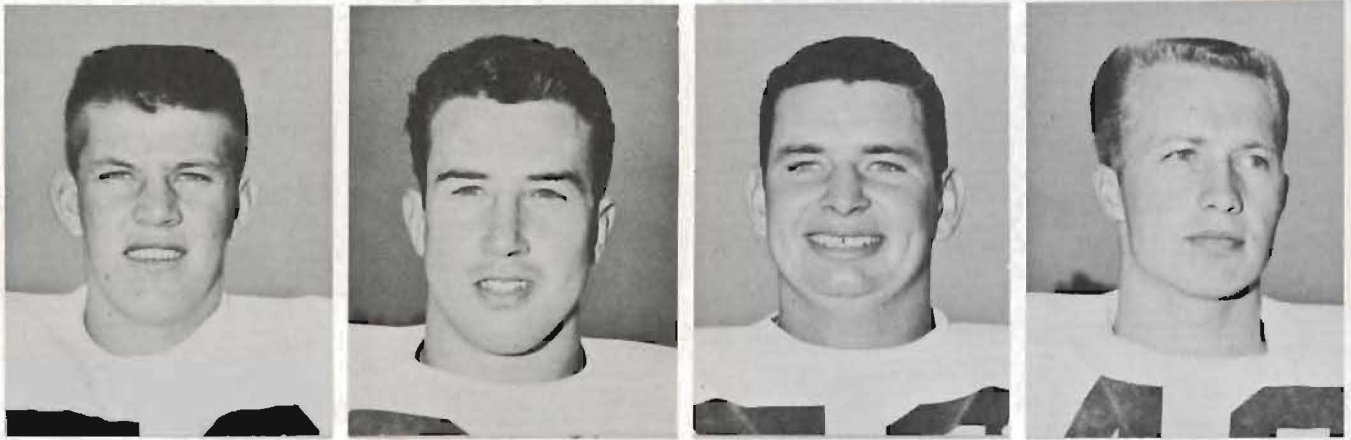

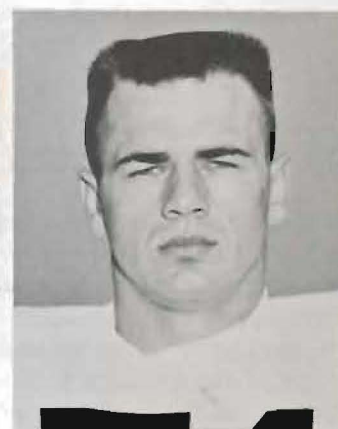


Co-Captains Bruce Alexander, 31, and Lou Blaesi, 82, stand by as official tosses coin.

PLU Knights Bring Home Totem Pole

Outplaying their cross-town rivals in all departments, Pacific Lutheran brought the Totem Pole trophy, emblematic of the Tacoma collegiate championship, back to the Parkland campus for the first time since 1955 with a 13-0 victory over the University of Puget Sound. 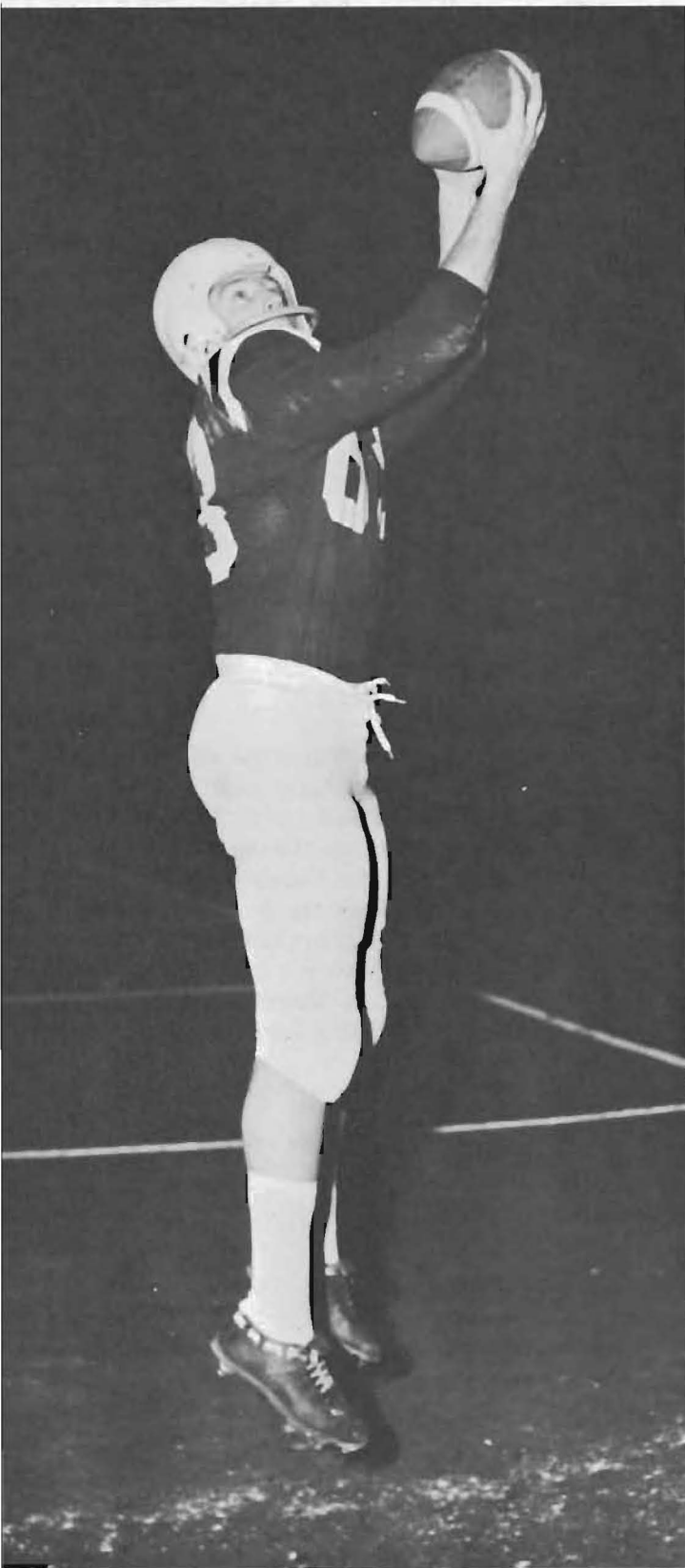

Eastern Washington College stopped two fourth-period drives by Pacific Lutheran to hang on for a 14-13 victory in the Knights' last game of the season. Lute quarterback, Doug McClary, completed nine passes during the battle to set a new school record of 76 passes completed during a season. "Mac" also set a new school record during the tilt in total offense with 985 yards in nine games. PLU beat the Savages in everything but the final score, picking up 18 first downs compared to Eastern's 8 and outgaining them from scrimmage 317 to 171 yards. The Lutes scored early in the second period when Bruce Alexander went over from nine yards out. Gary Nevers ran the extra point over. The Lutes took a 13-7 lead in the third quarter when McClary went over from the one after a 68-yard drive. The conversion try failed. Eastern's Savages bounced right back to score the game-winning touchdown and conversion.

Post Season Honors

Evergreen Conference coaches selected two Knights to the circuit's first team all-star units. Junior Dave Bottemiller was picked at end for the second consecutive year and senior halfback Bruce Alexander was given a spot in the defensive backfield. Lutes picked for honorable mention all-conference were Lou Blaes, end; Norm Juggert, and Don Keppler, guards; and Doug McClary and Gary Nevers in the backfield. Keppler and Alexander landed positions on the Associated Press Little West Coast honorable mention team, and Keppler topped off his career at PLU by being awarded honorable mention by the A.P. Little All-America team. At the football banquet which closed the season, the players selected quarterback Doug McClary and defensive guard John Makes as next year's co-captains.



Post Season Analysis

The Pacific Lutheran University Knights enjoyed their best win-loss record since 1957, winning three tilts while dropping six. Season scores are a grim reminder that games are not won on strong statistics. The Knights found themselves losers of two games by one point and two games by one touchdown, while the rushing and passing statistics sheet showed a wide margin in favor of PLU.

This year the Pacific Lutheran "gridders" have proven that they can play winning football against Evergreen Conference rivals. A strong corps of freshmen, and an experienced unit of sophomores and juniors seem to be an indication that through ability and experience games lost this year by close margins will be won next year by wide margins.



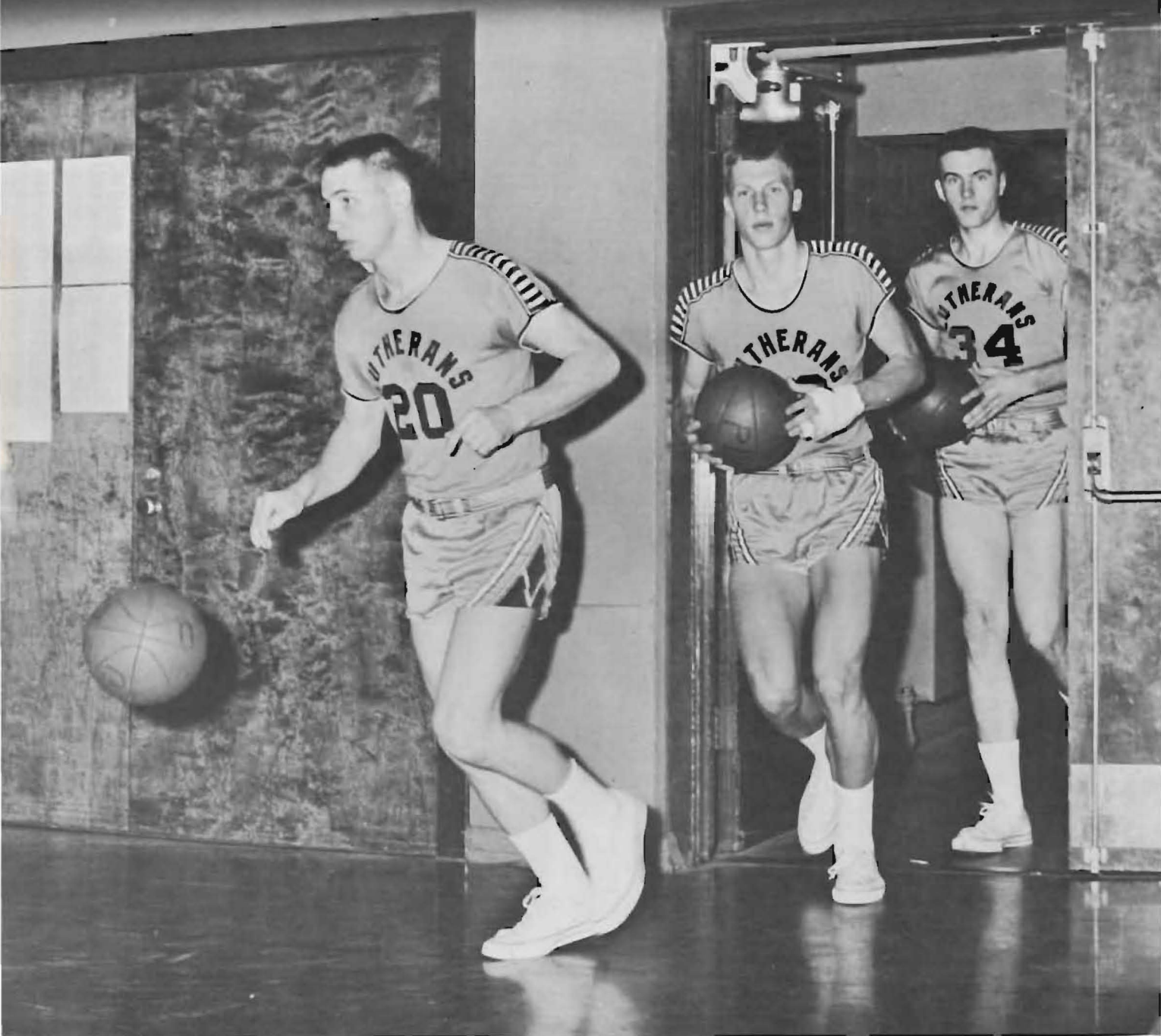

After only three seasons, Coach Gene Lundgaard has accumulated a truly fine record. Some of the highlights of the past three years were: one Evergreen Conference championship and one co-championship, second place in the National NAIA Basketball Tournament in Kansas City, and national recognition as a basketball power. Not to mention outstanding individual efforts, which include a first team NAIA All-American selection, two all-tournament Kansas City selections, three all-time Evergreen Conference selections, and numerous spots on Evergreen Conference All-Star Teams.

"Arm chair" experts did not pick the Lutes to establish any additional honors this year. The basketball team set out to prove otherwise, winning nine games in a row against creditable opponents. The Lutes enjoyed a successful enough season to tie for third place in the Evergreen Conference and to be picked for the seventh straight year to participate in the District One NAIA playoffs.

Non League Basketball

After getting off to a nine-game winning streak during the practice season, the Lutes failed to find the same success during league play. Among the practice victories were the mythical TAC Tournament championship and second place in the Chico (Calif.) Invitational Tournament. Gene Lundgaard's five defeated St. Martin's 60-47 and Pederson's Fryers 82-71 in the TAC affair. At Chico, the Lutes lost out to Pasadena College 83-63 in the finals after defeating Humboldt State 67-60 and Cal Poly of Pomona 102-87. During the three days Norm Dahl and Bruce Alexander displayed basketball that earned them berths on the all-tournament team. Bob Jacobsen came off the bench to score 20 points in the Cal Poly game as five players hit in double figures. Alexander tallied 50 points in three games and Dahl accounted for 40. At home, PLU defeated Willamette 90-66 as Dahl hit for 20, and Linfield 82-77 behind Dahl's 22 markers. Next came the annual Oregon invasion where a 22 point performance by Dahl again told the story against Lewis and Clark as PLU won 76-70. The next night Dahl and Jacobsen teamed to drive past Linfield 65-58. During the latter part of the campaign the Knights hosted traveling Montana State and Redlands. Dahl tallied 21 but his effort was not enough as Montana State pulled out a narrow 73-70 victory. Ralph Carr hit for 20 and Dick Nelson 17 as the Lutes roared past Redlands 97-80 in one of the exciting games of the season. In the practice finale, Seattle Pacific showed surprising strength in downing the Parkland five 91-85. Dahl had 24 this night.

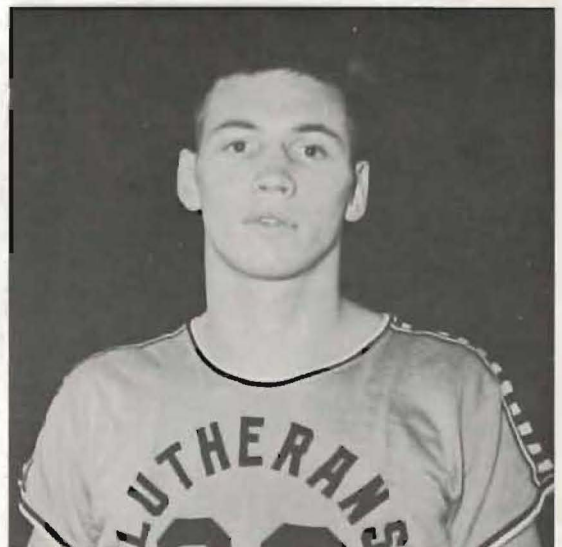
Knights and Wildcats Split 75-68, 78-66

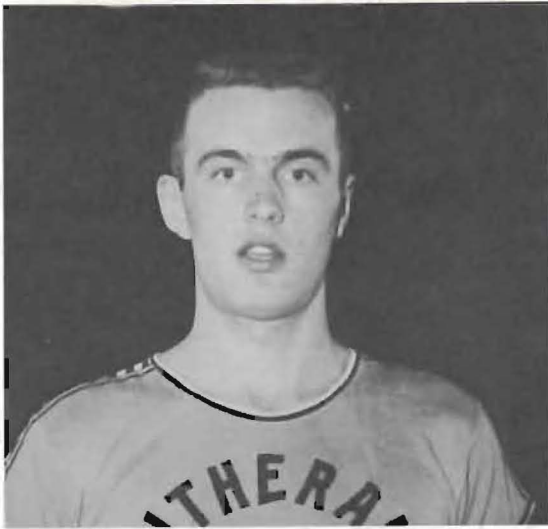
Knights Split with Pirates 76-65, 68-65

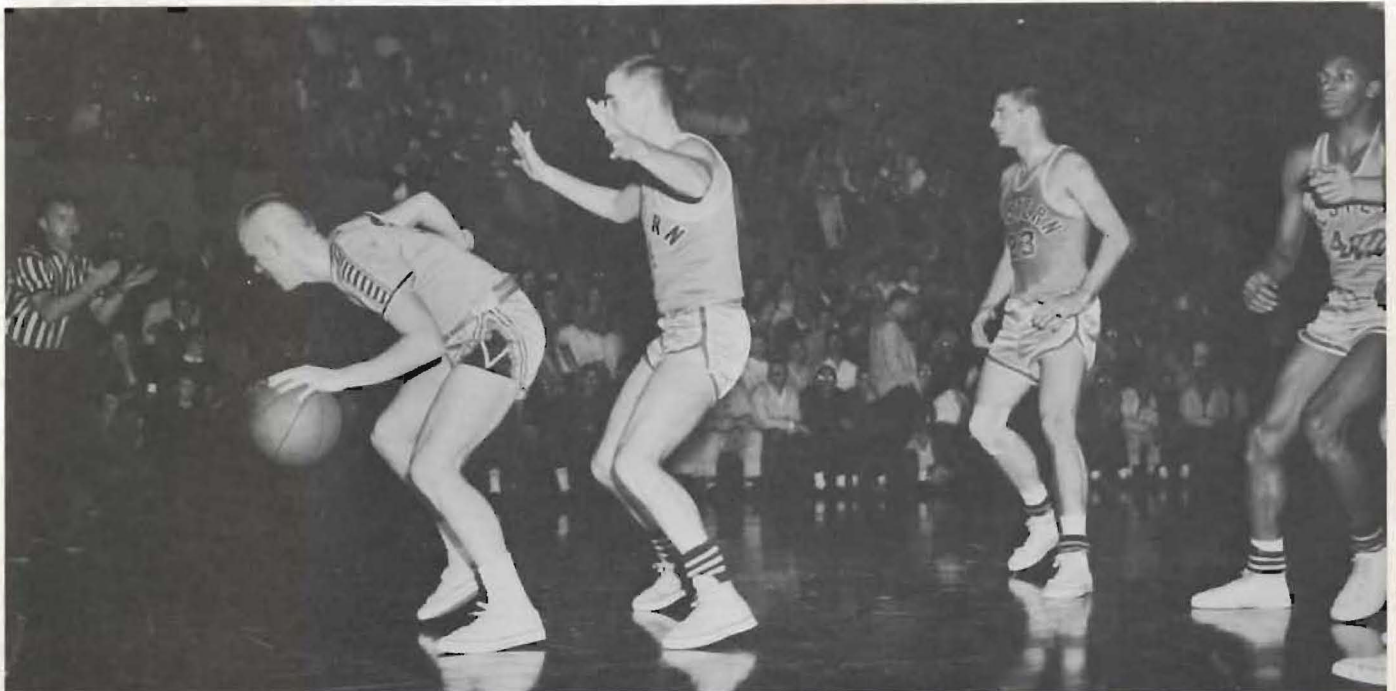

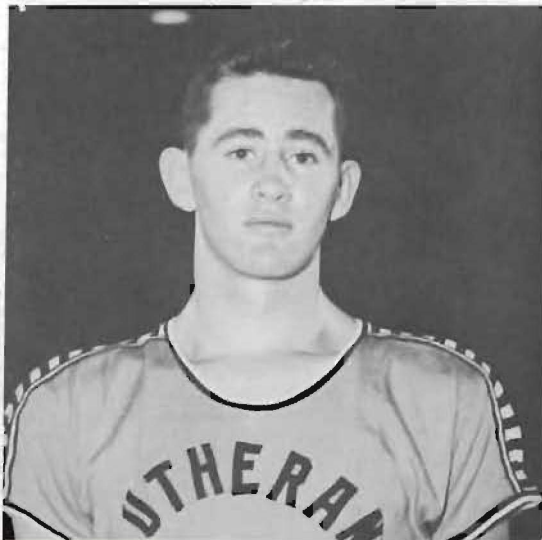
Dick Nelson Starts to Drive

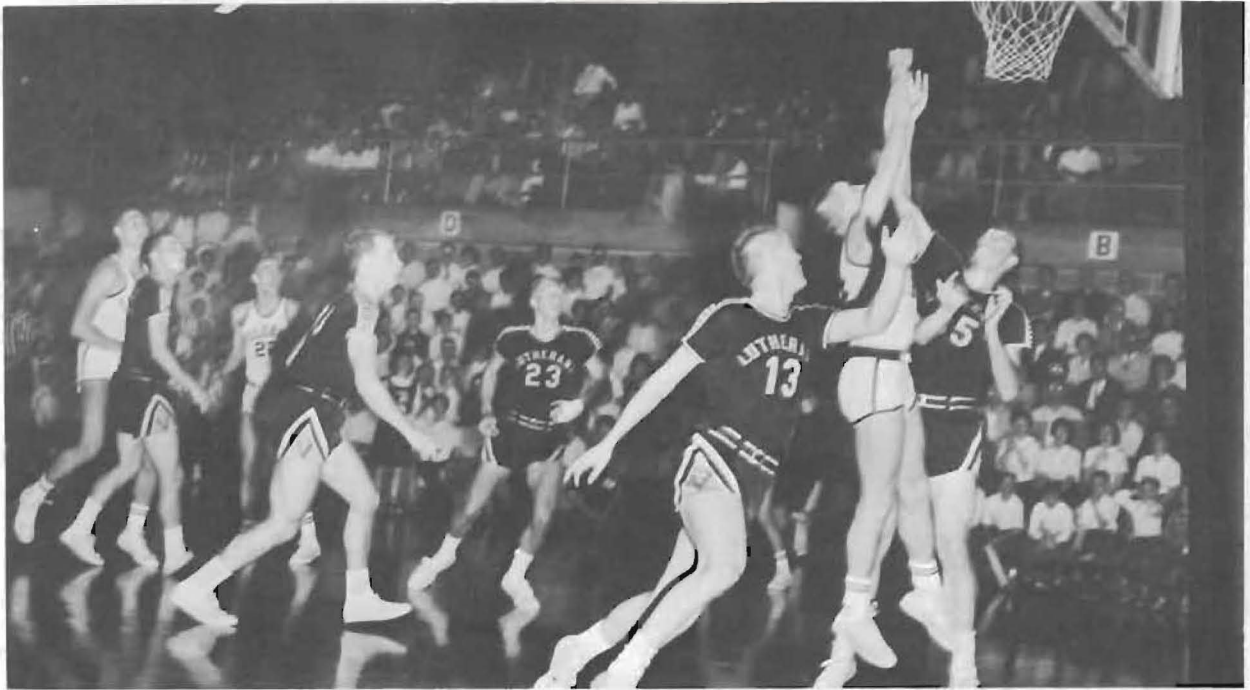

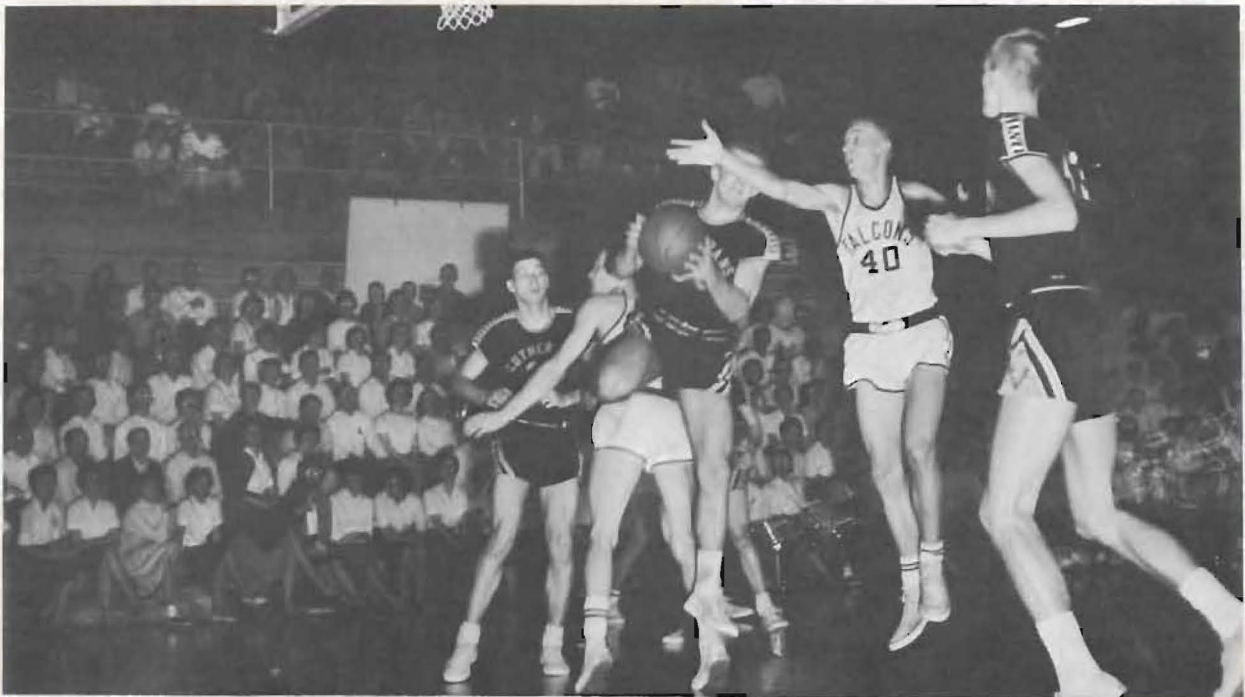

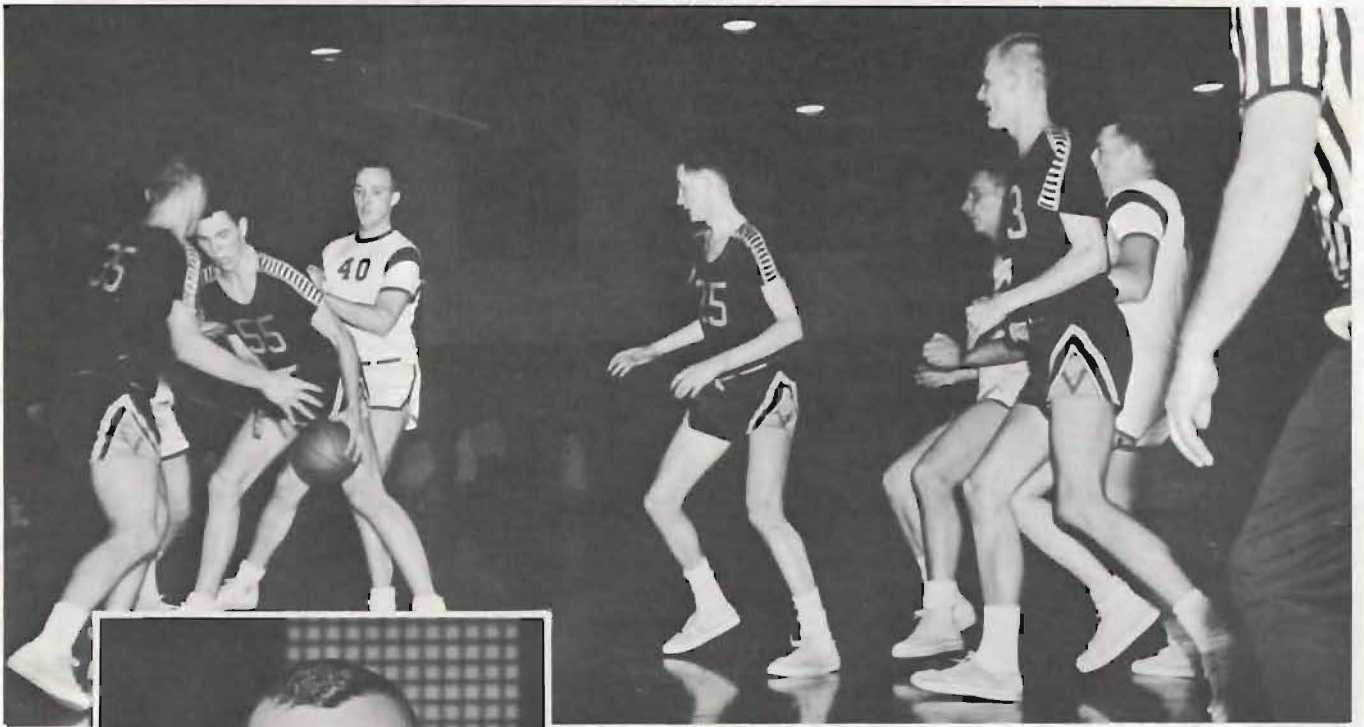
SPC tops PLU in NAIA playoffs

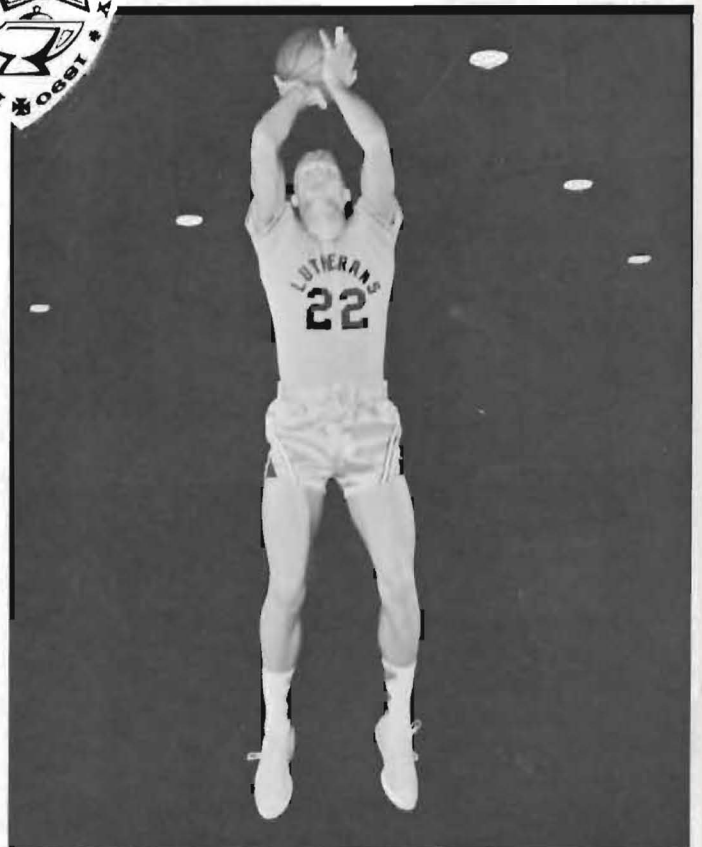


POST SEASON HONORS

Norm Dahl was the only unanimous choice to the 1960-61 All-Evergreen Conference team picked by the league's coaches and athletic directors. Dahl was a senior and a three year starter for coach Gene Lundgaard's Lutes. The team captain this year, he led the squad in scoring with 354 points for an average of 14.8 per game and in rebounding with 287. Dahl was also given a first team spot on the all-tourney team in the Chico State Tournament and was named to the second team Northwest Labor News All-Washington State team. Bruce Alexander, another Lute senior, was also named to the all-star team at the Chico Tourney. 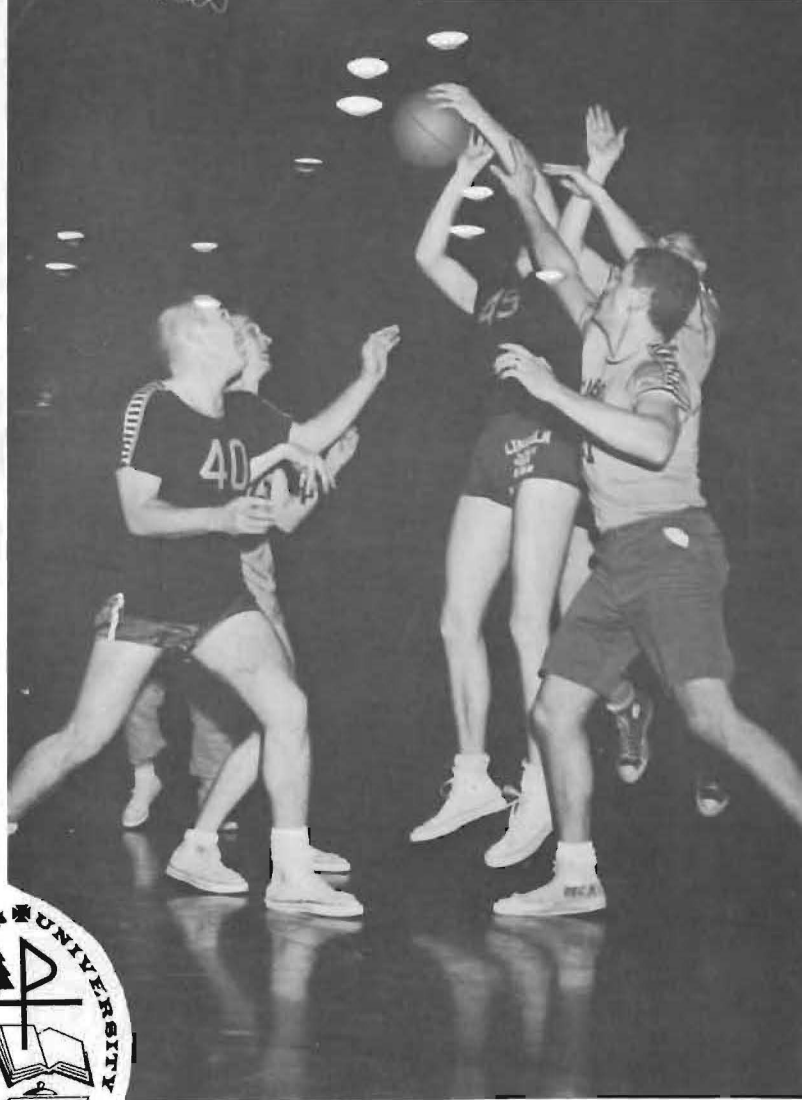


Evergreen Wins Aroma Bowl

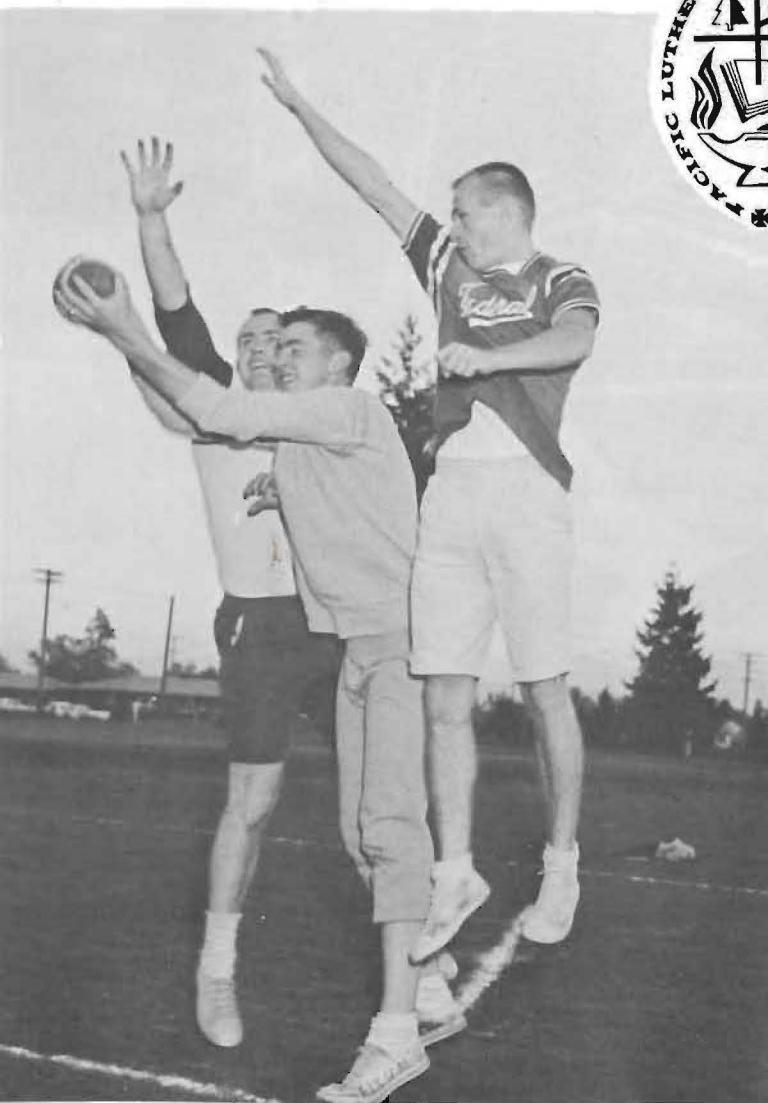

Third Floor and Evergreen tied for the Softball Championship with 9 and 1 records.

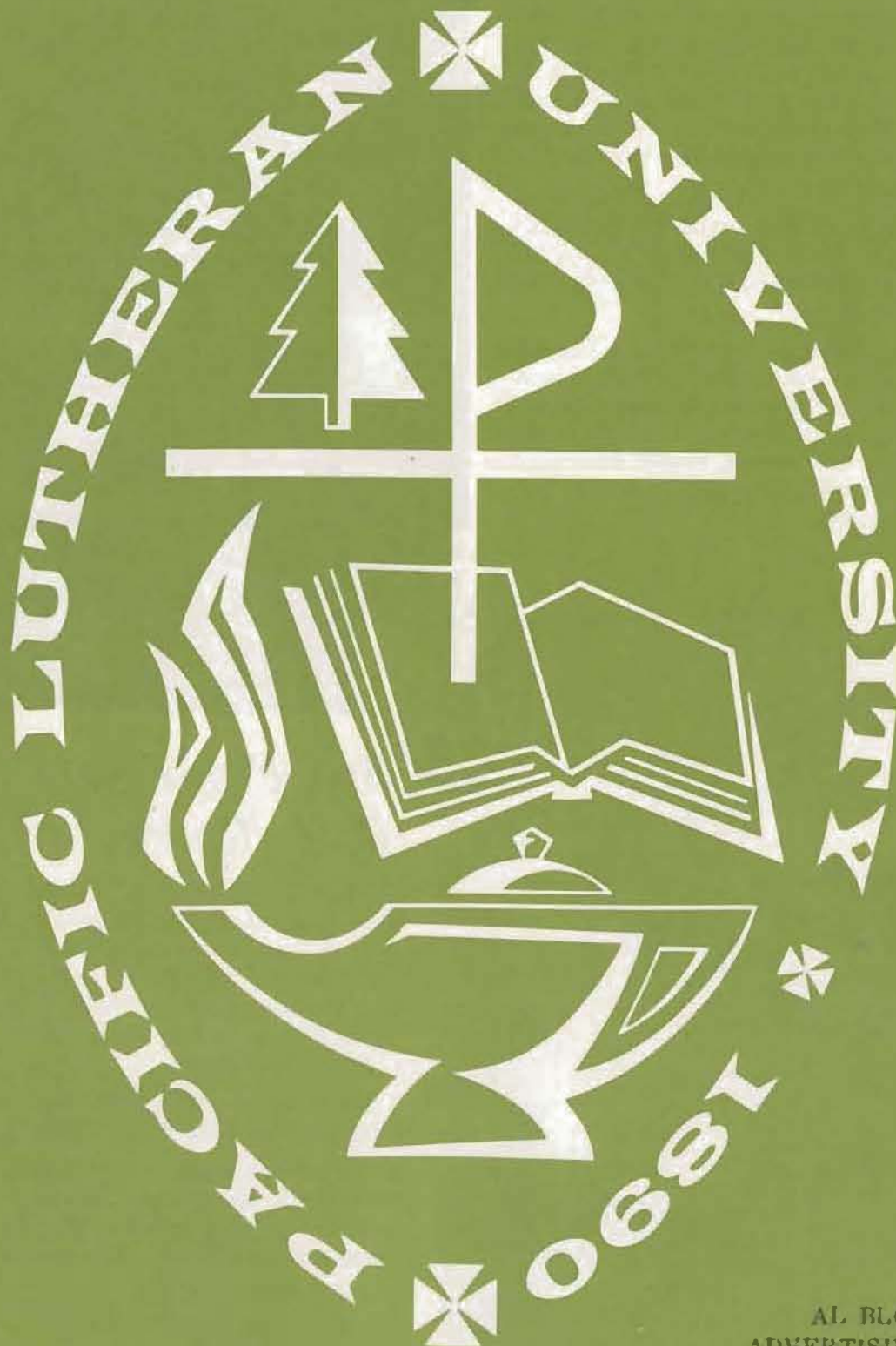

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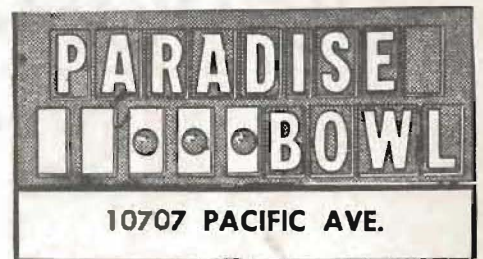

THE CHAPEL-MUSIC-SPEECH BUILDING

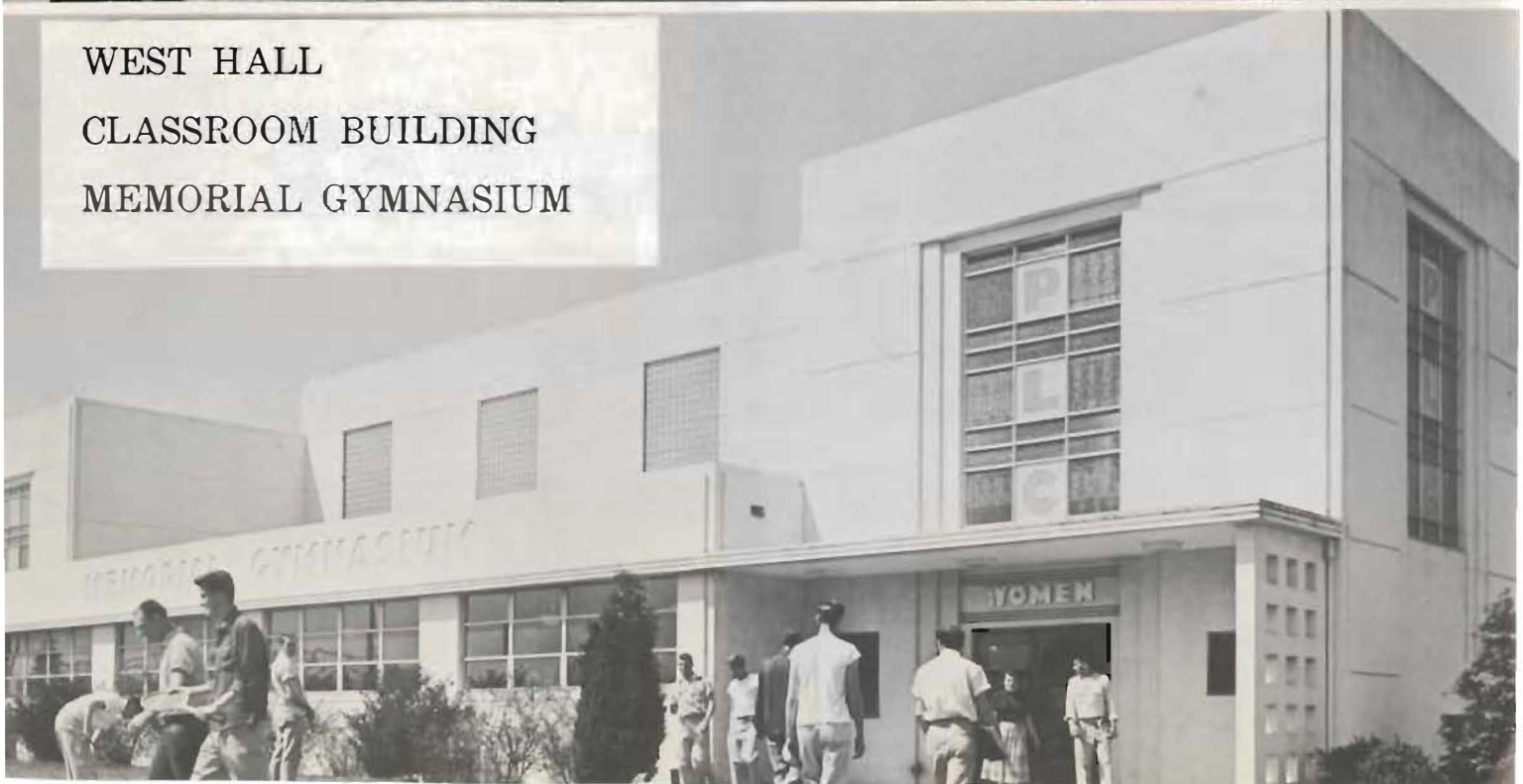

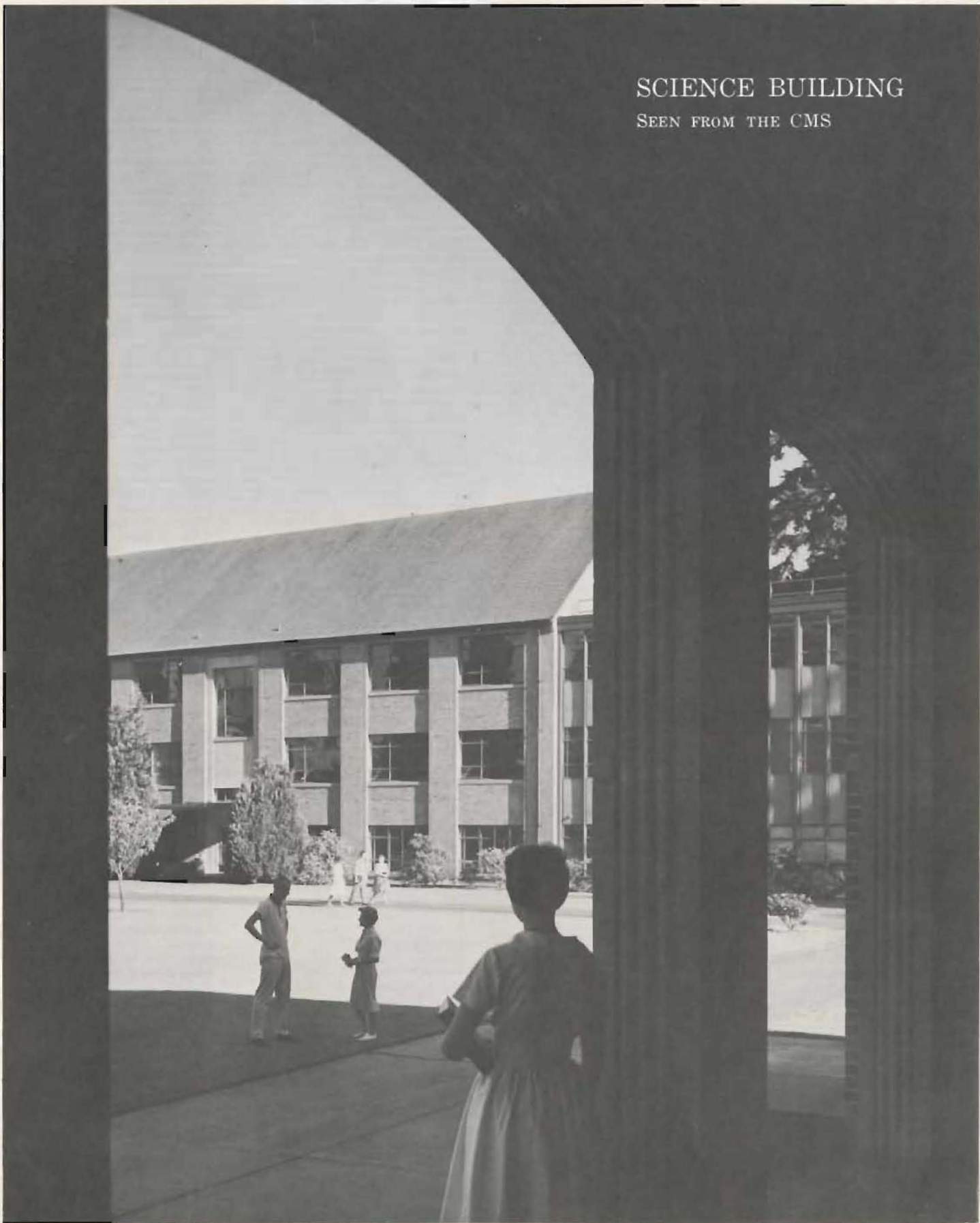
