Organ Transplantation: Blessing or Curse?

Symposium Features PLU Alumni

Pacific Lutheran University alumni distinguished in a variety of professions will discuss "Organ Transplantation, A Blessing or Curse" Friday, Nov. 1, at 3:30 p. m. in Eastvold Chapel during the 1968 Homecoming weekend.

Two featured speakers are Dr. Lloyd M. Nyhus, (B. A. '45) the Warren H. Cole professor of surgery and head of the department of surgery at the University of Illinois; and Dr. William O. Rieke, (B. S. '53) professor and head of the department of anatomy, University of Iowa School of Medicine.

Participating as panelists are Dr. M. Roy Schwarz ('58), assistant dean of the University of Washington School of Medicine who will act as moderator; Dr. Erving Severtson ('55), graduate of the University of Washington Law School and a prominent Seattle attorney. Dr. Alfred Stone, pastor of the United Lutheran Church in Seattle will also participate on the panel.

The speakers and panelists will call upon their respective fields of knowledge to shed light upon the medical, moral, legal and psychological implications of the subject.

"This is a topic of great interest within the general as well as the medical community," Jon Olson, alumni director explained. "The implications adherant within the topic could affect each one of us as techniques become refined and it behoves us to become aware of the implications. The Alumni Association feels that we have people within the association uniquely qualified to discuss the subject."

'Inspector General' A Delightful Farce

"The Inspector General," written by Nikolai Gogel, is being presented by the Alpha Psi Omega Chapter at Pacific Lutheran University Oct. 24-26.

A satirical farce, "General" portrays the political corruption of a small town in bygone Russia. The mayor, played by Bob Hasselblad, is a corrupt politician, along with School Superintendent Lukitch (Jim Derch), Hospital Commissioner Flipovitch (Lew Rhoe), and the judge, Lypkin Typkin, played by Donn Olson. Between them they have set up a comfortable life that is suddenly interrupted by the appearance of what is supposed to be an Inspector General.

Hlestokov (the H is silent), the pseudo inspector, characterized by John

Erickson, takes full advantage of the situation and gives them their money's worth of corruption in return.

Others in the cast make up the local gentry: Tricia Tuggle, Suzanne Mince, Elizabeth Erickson, Rosie Eppley; the town's folk: Fred Rynearson, Barb Kohl, Bob Ayres, Gary Van Hoy, Al Meeds, Denise Moores; and the servitude: Dan Hill, Linda Larson and Al Bexton.

The performances are held in the PLU Classroom Building, room 200, at 8 p.m. Tickets are on sale weekdays from 12-5 p.m. at the Eastvold Auditorium box office, and will also be available at the door prior to the performances, 75 cents for adults; 50 cents for students.

PLU Surprises Linfield; Halstead Stars In 7-7 Tie

"We showed no fear; I think we will give anyone a good game," Coach Roy Carlson remarked after his fired-up Knights held undefeated Linfield to a 7-7 standoff Satruday at Franklin Pierce Stadium.

"The play was just tremendous," he added, praising both offensive and defensive lines. On defense, he had special praise for end Ben Erickson and halfback Jack Irion. Stan Pietras, linebacker, "did a tremendous job for a freshman," according to Carlson.

On offense, conference rushing leader Dave Halstead and freshman quarterback Rod Bolek were among the standouts.

PLU's offensive burst in the first quarter Saturday was probably its best of the season. Taking the ball on their own 33-yard line following the opening kickoff, the Lutes marched to the Linfield ll-yard line before giving up the ball. The drive featured a 41-yard run by Halstead.

Linfield had the ball for three plays before punting to the Lutes who began their only scoring drive on Linfield's 41. The drive featured a 12-yard pass from Bolek to Halstead and another Halstead scamper, this one for 29-yards and the score.

Another first quarter Knight drive ended at the Wildcat 26.

The second and fourth quarters were defensive battles. In the third quarter, Linfield scored on a 12-play, 60-yard drive featuring 21 and 17-yard runs by quarterback Lenn Gann, a 10-yard aerial to Bob Murphy and a 17-yard scoring strick to John Sadowski.

Linfield's star split end, Bob Murphy, came within one pass reception of a conference record against PLU, snatching 11 for 120-yards. The record is 12, held by several players including the Lutes' Vic Eaton.

Halstead's first quarter heroics gave him 109-yards rushing in the first half and 139-yards for the entire ball game. He still leads the league with 405-yards in 88 carries through five games.

The Hillsboro, Ore., sophomore enjoyed his second 100-yards plus effort of the season. As a result, he has been named cocaptain for the Lutes' Oct. 26 clash with the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

The tenacious Knight defense held Linfield to minus one yards rushing during the first half Saturday. Leading the charge were ends Ross Boice and Ben Erickson; line-backers Fred Minch and Bill Tye. Gann was throw for three losses totaling 26-yards, and Wildcat reserve quarterback Tony Mauze was hit twice for minus 15-yards.

Defense was a Knight team effort Saturday. 19 players helped out, led by Neil Bryant, Bill Tye and Ben Erickson.

Coach Carlson announced three changes in his starting lineups following the Linfield game. Grant Spencer has replaced Vic Eaton at offensive right end; Ben Erickson has moved ahead of Rick Johnson at defensive end; and Fred Moe will start in place of Skip Miller at Corner linebacker.
